

SCARECROW BASKET by LARA LAWRENCE



8 x 12 Sharp D Handle (I use EZ WEAVE)

Cut 7 - 1/2" FF stakes each 17" in length and place spaced evenly across the handle.

Fold the stakes up around the handle base and begin weaving.

2 rows - 11/64" FO (cut approximately 21" in length)

9 rows - 1/2" FF (cut approximately 22" in length) Each row slightly decreases in length due to handle shape.

2 rows - 11/64" FO (cut approximately 20" in length)

1 row - 7 mm FF (this is the rim row) (cut approximately 20" in length)

Rim the basket with 2 pieces of 1/2" FF reed (cut approximately 20" in length)

Lash the basket with 11/64" FO.

FOR THE DECORATIONS:

Cut a rectangle shape from burlap (I use green or brown) for the hat. Fold it over to make a cone shape and glue the edges down with craft glue. Glue raffia onto front top of basket for "hair". Glue the burlap hat onto top front of basket above "hair". Glue on two button eyes, a triangular shape piece of orange burlap for the nose, and a small bow at the bottom edge of basket. I use rusty wire to make the mouth. Add pip berry and decorate as you please.

LIGHTED WOVEN WREATH by LARA LAWRENCE



Styrofoam Wreath (12" preferred) #6 Round Reed 1/4" FF Reed Wood Candle Cup with attached Wood Pin

Battery Powered Candle
Pip Berry and Bow made from Homespun, Burlap, or Fabric Ribbon

Cut 3 pieces of #6 round reed for the ribs of the wreath by laying one piece on the front near the top, one near the middle, and one near the bottom (inside) edge of the wreath. Cut these about 2" longer where they meet. Secure the ribs to the front of the wreath using a large cable tie, metal pins, or tape. This will be removed after you weave some.

Begin weaving with 1/4" flat by going over and under the ribs and wrapping around the back of the wreath. You have to overlap your weave slightly to keep the weaving on the top of the wreath wider than at the bottom. I do my overlap on the back side. This will let the reed sit slightly over the previous woven piece. This will allow your weaving to correctly meet up when you are finished. Continue wrapping being sure to keep the top coming out further than the bottom. Pack as you go.

Place an angle cut on both ends of the three ribs to meet together and finish your weaving. This may be tricky but it does not have to look perfect because this is where the bow will go. Insert the candle down into the wreath and secure with glue. Add pip berry, tie on, and bow. Insert the candle and enjoy your wreath.

It's Out of Control! Reed Storage Tips

You've opened it and now it's completely out of control. You have clipped the ribbons that bind and unleashed the beast. It's never, ever going to go back into that handy, tightly wound, and compact circle. What do you do now - because you don't just have one opened - you have 25 opened. I've gathered many ideas from weavers across the country and I hope there's a tip here that helps you organize your weaving studio (I love calling it that. It makes my windowless basement weaving nook sound so upscale.)

Whatever method of storage you choose, keep your reed DRY. Storing damp reed will cause it to mildew and mold. Extreme heat will also cause your reed to become brittle.

My favorite is a pegboard with hooks. Then I can see at a glance what sizes and colors I have. Old coat hangers from yard sales work well too. Also, wood coat / hat racks are a good idea. *Patricia DeMatteo*

I store mine in big Rubbermaid bins with lids, labeling them on top and side with duct tape. It keeps the reed dust and moisture free. Kay Marguardt

I use the rolling carts on wheels, they have three drawers and are semi-clear. Adele Lankford

I put Silica packets in every bin. The little packets are free and found in new shoes, purses, etc. *Towanda Brown*

I use cable ties putting one around the ends at the beginning and then a few more where the shorter pieces are. I may have 4-5 ties for the length of the reed. You can tighten the ties as reed is used. *Gale Brom*

I rewind and secure with little girl hair ties (the ones with balls on each end) and pony tail ties for the even end of the bundle. *Mary Jo Heineman*

Velcro cable ties work great and label the ends with key tags. I then hang coils from metal shower curtain hooks on pegboard. Sandy Salada

I use pipe cleaners to tie up the reed. They are inexpensive, reusable, and come in bright colors. *Karen Burdette*

I recoil the reed and put it in plastic grocery bags. Label the bags and hang them on either pegboard, a hanging rod, or basket tree. *Karen Buskirk*

I use five gallon buckets with lids. Mark each one on the outside with size. They stack beautifully and are easy to carry. Use silica gel water absorbing packets in each bucket. *Carol Zeller*

I use under bed totes that roll out easily, out of site - but easy access. Judy Ronan

I use office file boxes or ream paper boxes. Both have handle holes for easy carrying and are made of cardboard so the reed breathes. *Anette Meier*

I purchased an IV pole at a yard sale and it works perfectly for holding "in use" reed. As the pole is adjustable, the center can be unscrewed, pole let down to working level, insert reed then push pole to its full extension, and then reed hangs down for easy accessibility. Faye M. Bushey

Put furring strips horizontally in the room and drill holes at an angle to fit dowel rods into. Hang reed according to size. *Annette Barnard*

There are several baskets that I make that require short pieces of reed. I cut the tops off 2-litre bottles (or milk gallon jugs) and label them. When I have a short piece left over, I measure and trim it to desired length, then drop in the appropriate bottle. When I'm ready to make those baskets, I just have to count out the number of pieces I need. *Kim Girard*

I have a narrow closet in which I placed several tension shower rods. Some rods are for unopened coils and some for "open and using". *Sue Ann Allen*
