

It's ALL About that Bass (Base)

OK. I admit it. I'm a Meghan Trainor fan. I love walking in the early morning to her songs - it's a beat thing. But this song always makes me smile and pick up my walking pace a bit. Plus it's got pretty good lyrics and I can identify 'cause I sure ain't no size 2 and my booty shakes whether I want it to or not (hehe :o)). And oddly, while listening to this snappy tune while the sun rises, I often let my mind wonder to ... of course, basket bases. This month's newsletter theme is borne.

Getting a good base for your basket is key - whether it's a wood base or a woven one. So sit back, get your cup of coffee or glass of wine (depending on the time of day), and read on. Because it's all about that base. Oh, and if you would like a little background music, crank it up my friend, 'cause it's Meghan time and "It's All About that Bass" (click it for the YouTube link).

Working with Wood Bases:

- * Choose a good supplier for your wood bases. There are many options for standard sized bases. Before buying 24 from a new supplier, order 2 of different types of wood or shapes. Check the slot size and measure the base for accuracy. That way you will know what to expect when you order 24. My two faves for *custom* sized wood bases are Basket Bases by Rusty and Basket Bees (hi Debbie!). They are *consistently* good. This is important because you know what to expect when you have an unexpected custom basket request.
- * For goodness sakes, sand your darned base. I don't know how many baskets I have picked up at craft shows and the base is either rough as a cob or has saw marks in it.
- * Gonna get feedback here probably *In my opinion*, I *prefer*, (qualifiers there folks) to not only sand my base (and handles), but to also stain it and give it a polyurethane seal.







The picture of basket on the far left was #13 (where has the time went?) on my chronological list of baskets woven. The twill weave with the *pine* base is one that I weave quite often (usually on a 10x15 base). Do you see a difference? Which would you pay more money for? Which looks more luxuriant? This is the same type of wood base different preparatory treatment!

How many spokes are required for an even layout on a wood base?

This was posed as a question recently on Facebook regarding a 6" round base. While I have always just used the "stick 'em in and see what looks good" approach, I was surprised to see a scientific formula for it. This is copied and pasted from The Country Seat's website ... "Measure the circumference of the base. Multiply by .25 (for 1/4" space between spokes) and round this off to the next highest number (ex: 6.25 becomes 7). Subtract this number from the circumference and divide the balance by the width of the reed for the spokes (ex: 1/2" = .5). Remember, you want to have an even number of spokes for start stop weaving, odd number for continuous weave so you may have to subtract one spoke from your total."

Even spoke placement is key for an evenly woven basket. I like to make a library of templates using recycled USPS Tyvek mailing envelopes (these are tear and water resistant). Trace your base shape and fold it in half. Clip the corners. Unfold it and fold the other way lining up the clips and clip once more. Repeat as many times as you choose making sure to line up the previous clips. Mark your template with the base size, width of spokes used and number required, even a particular pattern used. Your library of templates will save you time and effort when placing spokes. This works for *ANY* shape of base.

Tip: If your wood based basket will have a handle, choose the handle spokes with are at the *ENDS* of the wood grain for the best finished basket look.

OK ... you've got the basics on a woven rectangle and square bases. We'll cover round baskets in another newsletter. Now it's time to explore *accentuating* the base. Adding dyed reed to your spokes and/or fillers can create an entirely different look. Adding diagonal spokes is another idea. These pictures are of bases to inspire you to experiment.
