Our Heathcote Community Sports Club believe that the Heathcote area should have a petanque court of its own and that our residents and our neighbouring communities should not have to go beyond the valley to find one. So, over the past few weeks a group has been busy establishing a fullsized ground (terrain), purchasing equipment and working towards a big, friendly French-flavoured celebratory petanque launching on the club's new-season opening day early in October.

We do not participate in competitions and tournaments, so players are not subject to any pressures. Our goals are enjoyment; we play purely for fun, companionship and good healthy outdoor exercise.

We are now playing 'casually' on the new terrain on (fine) Sunday afternoons between 1.30-3.30 pm until the end of September and all are invited to come along and try their hand at the game; you are assured of a warm and friendly welcome, friendly coaching assistance is available to all new-to-the-game visitors. # HEATHCOTE VILLAGE COMMUNITY GARDEN SOUP & MOVIE SCREENING UPDATE





On a cold and wintery evening a soup and movie night was held in St Mary's Village Hall. The purpose of this was to celebrate the village garden and discuss its future over some wonderful homemade soup and bread and watch an inspiring movie together.

It was fantastic to see how many people came on the evening (we estimate around 50) and re-connect at a time of year when many of us want to hibernate at home.

A very warm thank-you to everyone who attended the Edible Paradise screening and conversation about the future of the community garden. Thank you for making it productive, and it was a good start for further conversations. Thanks also to all those who were so forthcoming in providing delicious homemade soup and bread including Hannah from the wonderful new Craft Café and Maka from the fabulous Bohemian Bakery. Michael Reynolds from the Food Resilience Network supported us to facilitate a conversation around this. Thanks Michael for your ideas, knowledge and support.

Edible Paradise is a movie about the 'birth of the food forest movement' in New Zealand and it was good foodfor-thought about what we might like to see in Heathcote Valley. The basic design of a food forest includes seven layers: canopy trees, shrubs, perennial vegetables and herbs, root crops, ground covers and vines/climbers. There is a wealth of information about food forests on the internet if you'd like to find out more about them.

Points that arose from the evening and from following conversations:

The potential for a Heathcote Valley food forest and the existing community garden are two separate entities, and the future of the community garden and whether a food forest is wanted and needed in Heathcote Valley is yet to be established.

There was acknowledgement that the community garden served an important role in the community postearthquake. The bricks used in the raised beds were from the now-rebuilt Valley Inn.

It was felt the energy in the meeting seemed to be more directed toward exploring a food forest than continuing with the existing community garden.

Backstory - support for the garden has dwindled in the last few years and it is not sustainable in its current form. There was/is no appointed coordinator, and there are no plans at present to continue

with the community garden unless a coordinator can be found, or a group of people that would like to work together to coordinate the garden.

A food forest may be considered a more sustainable option for 'community gardening' in terms of meeting the needs specific to the Heathcote community. These needs could include community connection and access to a local food source that has varieties of heritage crops that are not found in our own back yards. It is worth considering that while a food forest is intensive to begin with, the long-term maintenance could be lower.



Could involvement with a food forest be more favourable for many time-poor community members who have their own gardens to contend with, yet want

that community connection that comes from meeting together to grow food? This may mean monthly working bees instead of the weekly gardening sessions that were organised for the community garden - and would be even less frequent at times.

### Discussion points - we need your feedback!

- Given the struggles the community garden has had, is
- reviving the garden and/or starting a food forest sustainable? Could Heathcote Valley have both a community garden AND
- a food forest? Or do we focus on one of these options. Does the community garden and/or food forest need coordinators?
- How do we recruit a coordinator for the food forest?
- How do we recruit a coordinator for the community garden? Who wants to be part of a core team to continue working on this?
- What specific skills and time can you give to these projects? Are there a few kind souls available to tend to the community garden over the next few months while we figure a way forward?

### LONELY PLANET GUIDES TO HEATHCOTE This term the senior students at Heathcote Valley School have been busy creating

This term the senior students at Heathcote Valley School have been busy creating Lonely Planet guides to Heathcote. Through interviews with familiar valley faces and plenty of research they have found out some great information. The students have selected some of their favourite local spots to write about and included some fun facts.

We'd like to share some excerpts with you.

The valley is an amazing place with great scenery and amazing cuisine. Heathcote was founded by Sir William Heathcote in 1867 on December 9th. The valley includes the Maltworks dairy, cafe and barber shop. It also has an art gallery owned by Andrew Lyons and the Valley Inn tavern with amazing food.

### The Art Gallery

The art gallery has all kinds of art, including paintings, carvings, sculptures, glass art, pottery and much more creative things. For almost 40 years Andrew has been making shapes in his



workshop. Andrew has held many jobs over the years from postie to building sets for TVNZ. Andrew said that he really enjoys making sculptures and other art, he has been drawing, painting and making things from a young age. He makes all the pieces in his gallery and has always wanted to be a sculptor.

In 2011 his art gallery was destroyed by the earthquake, it took him 16 months to rebuild the gallery. For his art Andrew likes to use recycled materials. He buys a lot of timber from wrecked houses and he also uses driftwood and stone from old buildings.

If you have walked past the gallery you would have seen a gorilla. Its name is Dandelion and it took him two months to make working 8 to 10 hours a day. Andrew gets inspiration from everywhere, mainly nature, but sometimes from a magazine or a newspaper or even from a new word he might hear.

The valley has amazing views and something for everyone like the original Bridle Path walk where the settlers walked and made their way to Heathcote from Lyttelton, come to Heathcote, there's something for everyone.

### A guide to Heathcote Valley

In Christchurch, on the northern banks of the peninsula, lies a beautiful place, nestled in between the other valleys: Heathcote.

Set in the stunning Port Hills is a wonderful place to live, Heathcote Valley, with it's amazing community, architecture and landscapes, you must see what is lying in wait for you.

### The Valley Inn Tavern

A key part of Heathcote Valley's history is the local pub, the Valley Inn. The rebuild in 2011 was a huge change for the building, being welcoming, reassuring and built to last, it took in lots of old locals.



Rising up from the rubble was a big

challenge but they then got back into business, the locals taking on the ANZAC breakfasts once again and starting up meat raffles to fundraise for Heathcote Valley School. The significant 133 year old well in the pub stands in the building after the earthquake damage and is a very memorable piece to the building.

### Some History around the Valley Inn

The original pub was built in 1862 on Bridle Path Road and then rebuilt on the present site in 1877, and much to everyone's despair half of the building came tumbling down in the 2011 earthquake but then was rebuilt again and still stands now.

The Valley Inn Tavern has won several awards for outstanding architecture and is a favourite location in the valley.

At the Valley Inn there are some deal nights like:

- Fish and chips on Monday
- Steak night on Tuesday
- Schnitzel night on Wednesday.

The valley Inn provides a safe, family friendly restaurant and bar and I would definitely

recommend it to all.

# LONELY PLANET GUIDES TO HEATHCOTE

When you think of Heathcote Valley what do you think of? Maybe you don't know too much about Heathcote apart from that it is close to Sumner? Or maybe you've lived here for 25 years and know all 1,983 people that live in the Valley. Whoever you are, no matter how long you've lived here there is always something new you can learn.

The Valley is a beautiful place where the sun nestles itself in the valleys and pours through the small suburb, the hills are crowded with breath-taking rock formations. Here everybody knows everybody and everybody looks out for everyone. News travels fast and people try and socialise as much as possible whether that be at the pub over a pint of beer or drinking a latte that the Heathcote Valley school barista team has brewed up. Every morning hundreds of people take a challenge and go for a morning jog or a cup of coffee. At night people meet up with old friends over a drink at the pub. My favourite place in Heathcote is the cricket club. I think it is a special place in the Valley. The Cricket Club sums up the valley on its own and here's why.

### The Heathcote Cricket Club

I would say the Heathcote Cricket Club is definitely one of

the main places in Heathcote because of the community spirit. If you have ever been to the cricket club on a Friday night you will know what I am talking about. The pavilion has a bar inside so parents buy a drink and go sit down on the grassy bank talking and laughing with friends while the younger kids play small practice games and older teams train for Saturdays.



The Heathcote Cricket Club manages to get

everyone involved in a special sort of way. Nobody is left out and everybody new is welcomed warmly to the sort of family the Heathcote Cricket Club is. 25% of the Heathcote community is involved in the Cricket Club in some way or another but an astonishing 90% of kids in Heathcote play for the Cricket Club which really shows how the cricket club manages to include everybody in a way like no other. The Cricket Club is also successful with the senior team recently being promoted to the top division in Christchurch.

The Club also has a plethora of young talent with two under 19 New Zealand players coming from Heathcote Cricket Club. The Club is growing at a tremendous rate with 15-20 new junior members a year on average and 10-15 new senior members a year. The Cricket Club is important to the community as it acts as a hub for the local and wider community. It is a place for people to gather, participate in sports, and socialise. The Club also represents the Heathcote community when playing in other parts of Christchurch and Canterbury. It encourages inclusion and activities for all generations. It is good to get outside and participate in team sports. But it's not only for boys with the Cricket Club also boasting both senior and junior women's teams. The Heathcote Cricket Club prides itself on includingeverybody with any ability and managing to embrace everybody into



the game of cricket like no other. It

also gives entertainment with the senior team playing at the beautiful Heathcote domain almost every week. Sitting on the bank and watching the cricket over a picnic with family on an amazing sunny Saturday is a pleasant experience to say the least.

Hopefully this guide provides you with a bit more knowledge around the Heathcote Cricket Club and what it is about.

The bottom right corner of the world hides a small valley with great attractions including Upshot a fantastic cafe.

Heathcote Valley is located on the western side of the Port Hills and on the north end of the legendary rail and road tunnels. With all its great attractions including The gondola, the cricket club, the bowls club, the community library, the dairy, and its brand new cafe it's hard not to realise why no one ever wants to leave.

### Upshot

Upshot, located on 131 Bridle Path Road was the first fully fair-trade roastery in Christchurch. As Upshot is a cafe they do have a signature drink and signature dish which are a classic flat white and a delicious bacon toastie.

Before the tragic 2011 earthquakes, Upshot was originally located on 18 Station Road where Upshot first opened on the 5th of January 2005.

So how did Upshot become a thing? It sends an email to the Council from your email address, including the incident type, notes, address of incident, photo, and contact details.

The report is then allocated to the relevant Council department.

The more information provided, the better we can help isolate and investigate the issue.

# AN UPDATE ON THE HEATHCOTE VALLEY PIPELINE/LYTTELTON HARBOUR WASTEWATER PROJECT

A

Kia ora from the Lyttelton Harbour Wastewater project team.

We're well underway installing the Heathcote Valley pipeline that will connect Lyttelton Harbour's wastewater system with the main Christchurch treatment plant in Bromley.

So far we've laid 900 metres of the pipeline and on track to complete the project in early 2020. We would like to take the opportunity to thank the community for their patience while we complete the Heathcote Valley pipeline. Our contractors, Fulton Hogan, are working hard to minimise any disruption this work is causing you, so if you have any concerns please come and have a chat. You can ring Fulton Hogan on 0800 342 48457 or call Council on 03 941 8999.

### Mauger Drive

We've now installed over 400 metres of pipeline along Mauger Drive and are opening up the road in 200 metre sections, laying the pipeline, then closing the road up behind us.

We finished digging the deepest section of Mauger Drive, on the intersection with Warner Place. The trench was 4.5 metres at its deepest point to allow us to get under the large stormwater pipe. Due to wet weather and ground conditions we have experienced some delays. Over the coming weeks, our contractors will gradually reduce the trench depth and then we'll be able to move faster and return your road to normal.

At our last community information session in June we spoke about why we made the decision to trench down Mauger Drive, instead of going straight down Scruttons Road. This route was chosen to avoid the state highway network.

NZTA have a decision process which doesn't allow services such as wastewater pipelines in motorways unless there are exceptional circumstances. As there was a viable alternative route for the utility directly adjacent, in CCC controlled land, this request was denied.

### **Port Hills Road**

Works on Port Hills Road are expected to begin on 2 Sontember 2010, We will com

September 2019. We will continue to open the road up in 200m sections to lay the pipeline. We will start from the corner of Mauger Drive and work up Port Hills Road to Bridle Path Road.

During the hours of 7am – 6pm, a stop/go system will be in place on Port Hills Road from the corner of Mauger Drive to the roundabout, covering the length of the active site. At night the road will be returned to two lanes. As the works progress, the traffic management will move along Port Hills Road to minimise disruption. All residents affected will receive a works notice. We encourage any residents with property access requirements to call Fulton Hogan on 0800 342 48457 (0800 FHCIVILS) or 027 604 9335.

Access to the local shops will remain open at all times while we lay the pipeline along Port Hills Road. You won't be able to park on the road, but there's parking available onsite at the Maltworks shopping complex. All business owners will be kept up to date throughout construction.

From the roundabout to the playground one lane traffic will be in place at all times. This will be managed by traffic lights. Where the road narrows the road will be closed off and detours in place down Flinders Road. Traffic management will be in place so you'll know where to go and we'll work with residents to ensure they have access to their houses during this time.

Don't worry if the road looks rough – our teams will be constantly inspecting the surface and filling potholes.

The trench will be resealed as we progress up the road. We'll be resealing the full road carriageway in the areas north of the roundabout that are in poor condition. This will be done within weeks of the pipe being laid, weather permitting.

The road surface will be replaced with the same chip seal treatment that is currently in place.
