Proverbs

Many of the proverbs were written by Solomon. He ruled Israel from 970-930 B.C. Some of his proverbs were collected and copied over 200 years later during the time of another king, Hezekiah.

GOD IN ACTION

God wants you to be wise. And He's given you the keys to wisdom in this book.

Proverbs is a collection of short sayings about everyday life. A proverb is not an absolute promise. It's a general statement about how the world usually works. The book of Proverbs is full of good advice that will help you become wise.

What's the first step to being wise? Knowing where to find true wisdom. Proverbs teaches that God is the source of all wisdom. The search for wisdom begins and ends with God. Before there were oceans, mountains, or anything else, God made wisdom (8:22-31). And He shared it with us so we would know how to live (8:32-36).

Wisdom starts with fearing God (1:7). This doesn't mean you have to be terrified of Him. But God wants you to respect Him. He wants you to honor Him and obey His commands. He wants you to count on Him for everything.

A big part of wisdom is remembering that God is in control. He sees everything you do (5:21). He even guides your steps (20:24). A wise person will ask what God cares about—and learn to care about the same things. For example, God cares about the poor, so we should be generous to them, too (14:31).

God gives you a choice: the way of wisdom (9:1-12) or the way of foolishness and folly (9:13-18). If you want to choose the way of wisdom, you can start by reading Proverbs.

PEOPLE IN ACTION

The wisdom of Proverbs is for everyone. But some parts were written especially for certain kinds of people. For example, Proverbs 1-9 gives advice from parents to their sons. Proverbs 31:10-31 celebrates a woman who takes care of her family, runs a successful business, and teaches others how to be wise.

The Book of Proverbs is just a small sample of Solomon's wisdom. Solomon spoke 3,000 proverbs when he was alive (1 Kings 4:32).

The Beginning of Knowledge

1 The proverbs of Solomon, son of David, king of Israel:

- 2 To know wisdom and instruction,
to understand words of insight,
3 to receive instruction in wise dealing,
in righteousness, justice, and equity;
4 to give prudence to the simple,
knowledge and discretion to the youth—
5 Let the wise hear and increase in learning,
and the one who understands obtain
guidance,
6 to understand a proverb and a saying,
the words of the wise and their riddles.
7 The fear of the LORD is the beginning of
knowledge;
fools despise wisdom and instruction.

The Enticement of Sinners

- 8 Hear, my son, your father's instruction,
and forsake not your mother's teaching,
9 for they are a graceful garland for your head
and pendants for your neck.
10 My son, if sinners entice you,
do not consent.
11 If they say, "Come with us, let us lie in wait
for blood;
let us ambush the innocent without
reason;
12 like Sheol let us swallow them alive,
and whole, like those who go down to
the pit;
13 we shall find all precious goods,
we shall fill our houses with plunder;
14 throw in your lot among us;
we will all have one purse"—
15 my son, do not walk in the way with them;
hold back your foot from their paths,
16 for their feet run to evil,
and they make haste to shed blood.
17 For in vain is a net spread
in the sight of any bird,

OBEYING YOUR PARENTS

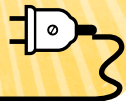
Exodus 20:12; Proverbs 1:8; Luke 2:41-51

"Because I said so." How many times have you heard that? Listening to your parents might seem annoying because you think you know what they're going to say or that they'll just tell you what to do. But Exodus 20:12 and Proverbs 1:8 show us the value of our parents' instruction. Jesus obeyed both His earthly parents (Luke 2:51) and His heavenly Father (Luke 2:49; John 15:10).

Parents don't always give you a hard time or an earful. They often give help and hope. Their guidance is like a bridge that carries you across hard times, providing solid footing across dangerous ground, and lending safety in a storm. Go your own way and you'll be pulled into a racing river of life problems, sink into soggy ground, wander away from values you need, and maybe get lost. But when you trust and follow your parents, following Jesus' example, your steps will be secure.

What rules seem most difficult to obey? Since Jesus obeyed His earthly parents, what does that mean for you and your parents?

- 18 but these men lie in wait for their own
blood;
they set an ambush for their own lives.
19 Such are the ways of everyone who is
greedy for unjust gain;
it takes away the life of its possessors.

The Call of Wisdom

- 20 Wisdom cries aloud in the street,
in the markets she raises her voice;
21 at the head of the noisy streets she cries
out;
at the entrance of the city gates she
speaks:
22 "How long, O simple ones, will you love
being simple?"

- How long will scoffers delight in their
scoffing
and fools hate knowledge?
- 23 If you turn at my reproof,¹
behold, I will pour out my spirit to you;
I will make my words known to you.
- 24 Because I have called and you refused to
listen,
I have stretched out my hand and no one
has heeded,
because you have ignored all my counsel
and would have none of my reproof,
- 26 I also will laugh at your calamity;
I will mock when terror strikes you,
when terror strikes you like a storm
and your calamity comes like a whirlwind,
when distress and anguish come upon you.
- 28 Then they will call upon me, but I will not
answer;
they will seek me diligently but will not
find me.
- 29 Because they hated knowledge
and did not choose the fear of the LORD,
would have none of my counsel
and despised all my reproof,
therefore they shall eat the fruit of their way,
and have their fill of their own devices.
- 32 For the simple are killed by their turning
away,
and the complacency of fools destroys
them;
but whoever listens to me will dwell secure
and will be at ease, without dread of
disaster.”
- 9 Then you will understand righteousness and
justice
and equity, every good path;
for wisdom will come into your heart,
and knowledge will be pleasant to your
soul;
discretion will watch over you,
understanding will guard you,
delivering you from the way of evil,
from men of perverted speech,
who forsake the paths of uprightness
to walk in the ways of darkness,
who rejoice in doing evil
and delight in the perverseness of evil,
men whose paths are crooked,
and who are devious in their ways.
- 16 So you will be delivered from the forbidden²
woman,
from the adulteress³ with her smooth
words,
who forsakes the companion of her youth
and forgets the covenant of her God;
for her house sinks down to death,
and her paths to the departed;⁴
none who go to her come back,
nor do they regain the paths of life.

The Value of Wisdom

- 2** My son, if you receive my words
and treasure up my commandments with
you,
making your ear attentive to wisdom
and inclining your heart to understanding;
yes, if you call out for insight
and raise your voice for understanding,
if you seek it like silver
and search for it as for hidden treasures,
then you will understand the fear of the
LORD
and find the knowledge of God.
- 6 For the LORD gives wisdom;
from his mouth come knowledge and
understanding;
he stores up sound wisdom for the upright;
he is a shield to those who walk in
integrity,
guarding the paths of justice
and watching over the way of his saints.

- 20 So you will walk in the way of the good
and keep to the paths of the righteous.
- 21 For the upright will inhabit the land,
and those with integrity will remain in it,
22 but the wicked will be cut off from the land,
and the treacherous will be rooted out
of it.

Trust in the LORD with All Your Heart

3 My son, do not forget my teaching,
but let your heart keep my commandments,
2 for length of days and years of life
and peace they will add to you.

3 Let not steadfast love and faithfulness
forsake you;
bind them around your neck;
write them on the tablet of your heart.

4 So you will find favor and good success¹
in the sight of God and man.

AB 5 Trust in the LORD with all your heart,
and do not lean on your own
understanding.

6 In all your ways acknowledge him,
and he will make straight your paths.

7 Be not wise in your own eyes;
fear the LORD, and turn away from evil.

8 It will be healing to your flesh²
and refreshment³ to your bones.

9 Honor the LORD with your wealth
and with the firstfruits of all your produce;
10 then your barns will be filled with plenty,
and your vats will be bursting with wine.

11 My son, do not despise the LORD's discipline
or be weary of his reproof,
12 for the LORD reproves him whom he loves,
as a father the son in whom he delights.

Blessed Is the One Who Finds Wisdom

13 Blessed is the one who finds wisdom,
and the one who gets understanding,
14 for the gain from her is better than gain

Ancient Archives

Barns

Proverbs 3:10

In Bible times, animals were not often kept in barns. Instead, at night or during bad weather, they stayed in people's homes in a small area a couple of feet lower than the family's living area. This kept them safe and added extra warmth to the house from the heat the animals' bodies gave off. Barns in Bible times were often pits that were built up with bricks or stones to make a domed top. Farmers would then store their grain inside to keep it dry and safe from animals.

or of the ruin⁴ of the wicked, when it
comes,

Proverbs 3:27

26 for the LORD will be your confidence and will keep your foot from being caught.
 27 Do not withhold good from those to whom it is due,¹ when it is in your power to do it.
 28 Do not say to your neighbor, “Go, and come again, tomorrow I will give it”—when you have it with you.
 29 Do not plan evil against your neighbor, who dwells trustingly beside you.
 30 Do not contend with a man for no reason, when he has done you no harm.
 31 Do not envy a man of violence and do not choose any of his ways,
 32 for the devious person is an abomination to the LORD, but the upright are in his confidence.
 33 The LORD’s curse is on the house of the wicked, but he blesses the dwelling of the righteous.
 34 Toward the scorners he is scornful, but to the humble he gives favor.²
 35 The wise will inherit honor, but fools get³ disgrace.

A Father’s Wise Instruction

4 Hear, O sons, a father’s instruction, and be attentive, that you may gain⁴ insight, for I give you good precepts; do not forsake my teaching.
 3 When I was a son with my father, tender, the only one in the sight of my mother,
 4 he taught me and said to me,
 “Let your heart hold fast my words; keep my commandments, and live.
 5 Get wisdom; get insight; do not forget, and do not turn away from the words of my mouth.
 6 Do not forsake her, and she will keep you; love her, and she will guard you.

7 The beginning of wisdom is this: Get wisdom, and whatever you get, get insight.
 8 Prize her highly, and she will exalt you; she will honor you if you embrace her.
 9 She will place on your head a graceful garland; she will bestow on you a beautiful crown.”
 10 Hear, my son, and accept my words, that the years of your life may be many.
 11 I have taught you the way of wisdom; I have led you in the paths of uprightness.
 12 When you walk, your step will not be hampered, and if you run, you will not stumble.
 13 Keep hold of instruction; do not let go; guard her, for she is your life.
 14 Do not enter the path of the wicked, and do not walk in the way of the evil.
 15 Avoid it; do not go on it; turn away from it and pass on.
 16 For they cannot sleep unless they have done wrong; they are robbed of sleep unless they have made someone stumble.
 17 For they eat the bread of wickedness and drink the wine of violence.
 18 But the path of the righteous is like the light of dawn, which shines brighter and brighter until full day.

UNLOCK IT

WHY SHOULD I DO GOOD TO OTHERS?

Proverbs 3:27

We should always try to do good to others because that’s how we show God’s love. When someone asked Jesus what the most important command in the Law of Moses was, He said, “Love the Lord your God.” But Jesus also said there is a second command that’s like the first: “Love your neighbor” (Matthew 22:34-40). An essential way to show your love for God is to love those around you—even if you don’t get anything in return.

- 19 The way of the wicked is like deep darkness;
they do not know over what they stumble.
- 20 My son, be attentive to my words;
incline your ear to my sayings.
- 21 Let them not escape from your sight;
keep them within your heart.
- 22 For they are life to those who find them,
and healing to all their¹ flesh.
- 23 Keep your heart with all vigilance,
for from it flow the springs of life.
- 24 Put away from you crooked speech,
and put devious talk far from you.
- 25 Let your eyes look directly forward,
and your gaze be straight before you.
- 26 Ponder² the path of your feet;
then all your ways will be sure.
- 27 Do not swerve to the right or to the left;
turn your foot away from evil.

Warning Against Adultery

- 5** My son, be attentive to my wisdom;
incline your ear to my understanding,
² that you may keep discretion,
and your lips may guard knowledge.
- ³ For the lips of a forbidden³ woman drip honey,
and her speech⁴ is smoother than oil,
⁴ but in the end she is bitter as wormwood,
sharp as a two-edged sword.
- ⁵ Her feet go down to death;
her steps follow the path to⁵ Sheol;
⁶ she does not ponder the path of life;
her ways wander, and she does not know it.
- ⁷ And now, O sons, listen to me,
and do not depart from the words of my mouth.
- ⁸ Keep your way far from her,
and do not go near the door of her house,
⁹ lest you give your honor to others
and your years to the merciless,
¹⁰ lest strangers take their fill of your strength,
and your labors go to the house of a foreigner,
¹¹ and at the end of your life you groan,
when your flesh and body are consumed,
¹² and you say, "How I hated discipline,
and my heart despised reproof!
¹³ I did not listen to the voice of my teachers
or incline my ear to my instructors.
¹⁴ I am at the brink of utter ruin
in the assembled congregation."

- ¹⁵ Drink water from your own cistern,
flowing water from your own well.
- ¹⁶ Should your springs be scattered abroad,
streams of water in the streets?
- ¹⁷ Let them be for yourself alone,
and not for strangers with you.
- ¹⁸ Let your fountain be blessed,
and rejoice in the wife of your youth,
¹⁹ a lovely deer, a graceful doe.
Let her breasts fill you at all times with delight;
be intoxicated⁶ always in her love.
- ²⁰ Why should you be intoxicated, my son,
with a forbidden woman
and embrace the bosom of an adulteress?⁷
- ²¹ For a man's ways are before the eyes of the LORD,
and he ponders⁸ all his paths.
- ²² The iniquities of the wicked ensnare him,
and he is held fast in the cords of his sin.
- ²³ He dies for lack of discipline,
and because of his great folly he is led astray.

Practical Warnings

- 6** My son, if you have put up security for your neighbor,
have given your pledge for a stranger,
² if you are snared in the words of your mouth,
caught in the words of your mouth,
³ then do this, my son, and save yourself,
for you have come into the hand of your neighbor:
go, hasten,⁹ and plead urgently with your neighbor.
- ⁴ Give your eyes no sleep
and your eyelids no slumber;
⁵ save yourself like a gazelle from the hand of the hunter,¹⁰
like a bird from the hand of the fowler.
- ⁶ Go to the ant, O sluggard;
consider her ways, and be wise.
- ⁷ Without having any chief,
officer, or ruler,
⁸ she prepares her bread in summer
and gathers her food in harvest.
- ⁹ How long will you lie there, O sluggard?
When will you arise from your sleep?
- ¹⁰ A little sleep, a little slumber,
a little folding of the hands to rest,
¹¹ and poverty will come upon you like a robber,
and want like an armed man.

- 12 A worthless person, a wicked man,
goes about with crooked speech,
13 winks with his eyes, signals¹ with his feet,
points with his finger,
14 with perverted heart devises evil,
continually sowing discord;
15 therefore calamity will come upon him
suddenly;
in a moment he will be broken beyond
healing.
- 16 There are six things that the LORD hates,
seven that are an abomination to him:
17 haughty eyes, a lying tongue,
and hands that shed innocent blood,
18 a heart that devises wicked plans,
feet that make haste to run to evil,
19 a false witness who breathes out lies,
and one who sows discord among
brothers.

Warnings Against Adultery

- 20 My son, keep your father's commandment,
and forsake not your mother's teaching.
21 Bind them on your heart always;
tie them around your neck.
22 When you walk, they² will lead you;
when you lie down, they will watch over
you;
and when you awake, they will talk with
you.
- 23 For the commandment is a lamp and the
teaching a light,
and the reproofs of discipline are the way
of life,
24 to preserve you from the evil woman,³
from the smooth tongue of the
adulteress.⁴
- 25 Do not desire her beauty in your heart,
and do not let her capture you with her
eyelashes;
- 26 for the price of a prostitute is only a loaf of
bread,⁵
but a married woman⁶ hunts down a
precious life.
- 27 Can a man carry fire next to his chest
and his clothes not be burned?
28 Or can one walk on hot coals
and his feet not be scorched?
29 So is he who goes in to his neighbor's wife;
none who touches her will go
unpunished.
- 30 People do not despise a thief if he steals
to satisfy his appetite when he is hungry,
31 but if he is caught, he will pay sevenfold;
he will give all the goods of his house.
- 32 He who commits adultery lacks sense;
he who does it destroys himself.
33 He will get wounds and dishonor,
and his disgrace will not be wiped away.
34 For jealousy makes a man furious,
and he will not spare when he takes
revenge.
- 35 He will accept no compensation;
he will refuse though you multiply gifts.

Warning Against the Adulteress

- 7** My son, keep my words
and treasure up my commandments with
you;
2 keep my commandments and live;
keep my teaching as the apple of your
eye;
3 bind them on your fingers;
write them on the tablet of your heart.
4 Say to wisdom, "You are my sister,"
and call insight your intimate friend,
5 to keep you from the forbidden⁷ woman,
from the adulteress⁸ with her smooth
words.
- 6 For at the window of my house
I have looked out through my lattice,
7 and I have seen among the simple,
I have perceived among the youths,
a young man lacking sense,
8 passing along the street near her corner,
taking the road to her house
9 in the twilight, in the evening,
at the time of night and darkness.
- 10 And behold, the woman meets him,
dressed as a prostitute, wily of heart.⁹
11 She is loud and wayward;
her feet do not stay at home;
12 now in the street, now in the market,
and at every corner she lies in wait.

13 She seizes him and kisses him,
and with bold face she says to him,
14 “I had to offer sacrifices,¹
and today I have paid my vows;
15 so now I have come out to meet you,
to seek you eagerly, and I have found
you.
16 I have spread my couch with coverings,
colored linens from Egyptian linen;
17 I have perfumed my bed with myrrh,
aloes, and cinnamon.
18 Come, let us take our fill of love till
morning;
let us delight ourselves with love.
19 For my husband is not at home;
he has gone on a long journey;
20 he took a bag of money with him;
at full moon he will come home.”
21 With much seductive speech she persuades
him;
with her smooth talk she compels him.
22 All at once he follows her,
as an ox goes to the slaughter,
or as a stag is caught fast²
23 till an arrow pierces its liver;
as a bird rushes into a snare;
he does not know that it will cost him his
life.
24 And now, O sons, listen to me,
and be attentive to the words of my
mouth.
25 Let not your heart turn aside to her ways;
do not stray into her paths,
26 for many a victim has she laid low,
and all her slain are a mighty throng.
27 Her house is the way to Sheol,
going down to the chambers of death.

The Blessings of Wisdom

8 Does not wisdom call?
Does not understanding raise her voice?
2 On the heights beside the way,
at the crossroads she takes her stand;
3 beside the gates in front of the town,
at the entrance of the portals she cries
aloud:
4 “To you, O men, I call,
and my cry is to the children of man.
5 O simple ones, learn prudence;
O fools, learn sense.
6 Hear, for I will speak noble things,
and from my lips will come what is right,
7 for my mouth will utter truth;
wickedness is an abomination to my lips.

8 All the words of my mouth are righteous;
there is nothing twisted or crooked in
them.
9 They are all straight to him who
understands,
and right to those who find knowledge.
10 Take my instruction instead of silver,
and knowledge rather than choice gold,
11 for wisdom is better than jewels,
and all that you may desire cannot
compare with her.
12 “I, wisdom, dwell with prudence,
and I find knowledge and discretion.
13 The fear of the LORD is hatred of evil.
Pride and arrogance and the way of evil
and perverted speech I hate.
14 I have counsel and sound wisdom;
I have insight; I have strength.
15 By me kings reign,
and rulers decree what is just;
16 by me princes rule,
and nobles, all who govern justly.³
17 I love those who love me,
and those who seek me diligently
find me.
18 Riches and honor are with me,
enduring wealth and righteousness.
19 My fruit is better than gold, even fine gold,
and my yield than choice silver.
20 I walk in the way of righteousness,
in the paths of justice,
21 granting an inheritance to those who love me,
and filling their treasuries.
22 “The LORD possessed⁴ me at the beginning of
his work,⁵
the first of his acts of old.
23 Ages ago I was set up,
at the first, before the beginning of the
earth.
24 When there were no depths I was brought
forth,
when there were no springs abounding
with water.
25 Before the mountains had been shaped,
before the hills, I was brought forth,
26 before he had made the earth with its fields,
or the first of the dust of the world.
27 When he established the heavens, I was
there;
when he drew a circle on the face of the
deep,
28 when he made firm the skies above,
when he established⁶ the fountains of the
deep,

29 when he assigned to the sea its limit,
 so that the waters might not transgress his
 command,
 when he marked out the foundations of the
 earth,
 30 then I was beside him, like a master
 workman,
 and I was daily his¹ delight,
 rejoicing before him always,
 31 rejoicing in his inhabited world
 and delighting in the children of man.
 32 “And now, O sons, listen to me:
 blessed are those who keep my ways.
 33 Hear instruction and be wise,
 and do not neglect it.
 34 Blessed is the one who listens to me,
 watching daily at my gates,
 waiting beside my doors.
 35 For whoever finds me finds life
 and obtains favor from the LORD,
 36 but he who fails to find me injures himself;
 all who hate me love death.”

The Way of Wisdom

9 Wisdom has built her house;
 she has hewn her seven pillars.
 2 She has slaughtered her beasts; she has
 mixed her wine;
 she has also set her table.
 3 She has sent out her young women to call
 from the highest places in the town,
 4 “Whoever is simple, let him turn in here!”
 To him who lacks sense she says,
 5 “Come, eat of my bread
 and drink of the wine I have mixed.
 6 Leave your simple ways,² and live,
 and walk in the way of insight.”
 7 Whoever corrects a scoffer gets himself
 abuse,
 and he who reproves a wicked man
 incurs injury.
 8 Do not reprove a scoffer, or he will hate you;
 reprove a wise man, and he will love you.
 9 Give instruction³ to a wise man, and he will
 be still wiser;
 teach a righteous man, and he will
 increase in learning.
 10 The fear of the LORD is the beginning of
 wisdom,
 and the knowledge of the Holy One is
 insight.
 11 For by me your days will be multiplied,
 and years will be added to your life.
 12 If you are wise, you are wise for yourself;
 if you scoff, you alone will bear it.

The Way of Folly

13 The woman Folly is loud;
 she is seductive⁴ and knows nothing.
 14 She sits at the door of her house;
 she takes a seat on the highest places of
 the town,
 15 calling to those who pass by,
 who are going straight on their way,
 16 “Whoever is simple, let him turn in here!”
 And to him who lacks sense she says,
 17 “Stolen water is sweet,
 and bread eaten in secret is pleasant.”
 18 But he does not know that the dead⁵ are
 there,
 that her guests are in the depths of Sheol.

10 The proverbs of Solomon.

A wise son makes a glad father,
 but a foolish son is a sorrow to his
 mother.
 2 Treasures gained by wickedness do not
 profit,
 but righteousness delivers from death.
 3 The LORD does not let the righteous go
 hungry,
 but he thwarts the craving of the wicked.
 4 A slack hand causes poverty,
 but the hand of the diligent makes rich.
 5 He who gathers in summer is a prudent son,
 but he who sleeps in harvest is a son who
 brings shame.
 6 Blessings are on the head of the righteous,
 but the mouth of the wicked conceals
 violence.
 7 The memory of the righteous is a blessing,
 but the name of the wicked will rot.
 8 The wise of heart will receive
 commandments,
 but a babbling fool will come to ruin.
 9 Whoever walks in integrity walks securely,
 but he who makes his ways crooked will
 be found out.
 10 Whoever winks the eye causes trouble,
 and a babbling fool will come to ruin.
 11 The mouth of the righteous is a fountain of
 life,
 but the mouth of the wicked conceals
 violence.
 12 Hatred stirs up strife,
 but love covers all offenses.
 13 On the lips of him who has understanding,
 wisdom is found,
 but a rod is for the back of him who lacks
 sense.

- 14 The wise lay up knowledge,
but the mouth of a fool brings ruin near.
- 15 A rich man's wealth is his strong city;
the poverty of the poor is their ruin.
- 16 The wage of the righteous leads to life,
the gain of the wicked to sin.
- 17 Whoever heeds instruction is on the path to life,
but he who rejects reproof leads others astray.
- 18 The one who conceals hatred has lying lips,
and whoever utters slander is a fool.
- 19 When words are many, transgression is not lacking,
but whoever restrains his lips is prudent.
- 20 The tongue of the righteous is choice silver;
the heart of the wicked is of little worth.
- 21 The lips of the righteous feed many,
but fools die for lack of sense.
- 22 The blessing of the LORD makes rich,
and he adds no sorrow with it.¹
- 23 Doing wrong is like a joke to a fool,
but wisdom is pleasure to a man of understanding.
- 24 What the wicked dreads will come upon him,
but the desire of the righteous will be granted.
- 25 When the tempest passes, the wicked is no more,
but the righteous is established forever.
- 26 Like vinegar to the teeth and smoke to the eyes,
so is the sluggard to those who send him.

but the years of the wicked will be short.

but the mouth of the wicked, what is perverse.
- 11** A false balance is an abomination to the LORD,
but a just weight is his delight.
- 2 When pride comes, then comes disgrace,
but with the humble is wisdom.
- 3 The integrity of the upright guides them,
but the crookedness of the treacherous destroys them.
- 4 Riches do not profit in the day of wrath,
but righteousness delivers from death.
- 5 The righteousness of the blameless keeps his way straight,
but the wicked falls by his own wickedness.
- 6 The righteousness of the upright delivers them,
but the treacherous are taken captive by their lust.
- 7 When the wicked dies, his hope will perish,
and the expectation of wealth² perishes too.
- 8 The righteous is delivered from trouble,
and the wicked walks into it instead.
- 9 With his mouth the godless man would destroy his neighbor,
but by knowledge the righteous are delivered.
- 10 When it goes well with the righteous, the city rejoices,
and when the wicked perish there are shouts of gladness.
- 11 By the blessing of the upright a city is exalted,
but by the mouth of the wicked it is overthrown.
- 12 Whoever belittles his neighbor lacks sense,
but a man of understanding remains silent.
- 13 Whoever goes about slandering reveals secrets,
but he who is trustworthy in spirit keeps a thing covered.
- 14 Where there is no guidance, a people falls,
but in an abundance of counselors there is safety.
- 15 Whoever puts up security for a stranger will surely suffer harm,
but he who hates striking hands in pledge is secure.
- 16 A gracious woman gets honor,
and violent men get riches.
- 17 A man who is kind benefits himself,
but a cruel man hurts himself.
- 18 The wicked earns deceptive wages,
but one who sows righteousness gets a sure reward.
- 19 Whoever is steadfast in righteousness will live,
but he who pursues evil will die.
- 20 Those of crooked heart are an abomination to the LORD,

- but those of blameless ways are his delight.
- 21 Be assured, an evil person will not go unpunished,

the expectation of the wicked in wrath.
- 24 One gives freely, yet grows all the richer;
another withholds what he should give,
and only suffers want.
- 25 Whoever brings blessing will be enriched,
and one who waters will himself be watered.
- 26 The people curse him who holds back grain,
but a blessing is on the head of him who sells it.
- 27 Whoever diligently seeks good seeks favor,¹
but evil comes to him who searches for it.

- 16 A man's gift makes room for him
and brings him before the great.
- 17 The one who states his case first seems
right,
until the other comes and examines him.
- 18 The lot puts an end to quarrels
and decides between powerful
contenders.
- 19 A brother offended is more unyielding than
a strong city,
and quarreling is like the bars of a castle.
- 20 From the fruit of a man's mouth his stomach
is satisfied;
he is satisfied by the yield of his lips.
- 21 Death and life are in the power of the
tongue,
and those who love it will eat its fruits.
- 22 He who finds a wife finds a good thing
and obtains favor from the LORD.
- 23 The poor use entreaties,
but the rich answer roughly.
- 24 A man of many companions may come to
ruin,
but there is a friend who sticks closer
than a brother.
- 19** Better is a poor person who walks in his
integrity
than one who is crooked in speech and is
a fool.
- 2 Desire² without knowledge is not good,
and whoever makes haste with his feet
misses his way.

- 3 When a man's folly brings his way to ruin,
his heart rages against the LORD.
- 4 Wealth brings many new friends,
but a poor man is deserted by his friend.
- 5 A false witness will not go unpunished,
and he who breathes out lies will not
escape.
- 6 Many seek the favor of a generous man,¹
and everyone is a friend to a man who
gives gifts.
- 7 All a poor man's brothers hate him;
how much more do his friends go far
from him!
He pursues them with words, but does not
have them.²
- 8 Whoever gets sense loves his own soul;
he who keeps understanding will discover
good.
- 9 A false witness will not go unpunished,
and he who breathes out lies will perish.
- 10 It is not fitting for a fool to live in luxury,
much less for a slave to rule over princes.
- 11 Good sense makes one slow to anger,
and it is his glory to overlook an offense.
- 12 A king's wrath is like the growling of a lion,
but his favor is like dew on the grass.
- 13 A foolish son is ruin to his father,
and a wife's quarreling is a continual
dripping of rain.
- 14 House and wealth are inherited from
fathers,
but a prudent wife is from the LORD.
- 15 Slothfulness casts into a deep sleep,
and an idle person will suffer hunger.
- 16 Whoever keeps the commandment keeps
his life;
he who despises his ways will die.
- 17 Whoever is generous to the poor lends to
the LORD,
and he will repay him for his deed.
- 18 Discipline your son, for there is hope;
do not set your heart on putting him to
death.
- 19 A man of great wrath will pay the penalty,
for if you deliver him, you will only have
to do it again.
- 20 Listen to advice and accept instruction,
that you may gain wisdom in the future.
- 21 Many are the plans in the mind of a man,
but it is the purpose of the LORD that will
stand.
- 22 What is desired in a man is steadfast love,
and a poor man is better than a liar.
- 23 The fear of the LORD leads to life,
and whoever has it rests satisfied;
he will not be visited by harm.
- 24 The sluggard buries his hand in the dish
and will not even bring it back to his
mouth.
- 25 Strike a scoffer, and the simple will learn
prudence;
reprove a man of understanding, and he
will gain knowledge.
- 26 He who does violence to his father and
chases away his mother
is a son who brings shame and reproach.
- 27 Cease to hear instruction, my son,
and you will stray from the words of
knowledge.
- 28 A worthless witness mocks at justice,
and the mouth of the wicked devours
iniquity.
- 29 Condemnation is ready for scoffers,
and beating for the backs of fools.
- 20** Wine is a mocker, strong drink a brawler,
and whoever is led astray by it is not
wise.³
- 2 The terror of a king is like the growling of a
lion;
whoever provokes him to anger forfeits
his life.
- 3 It is an honor for a man to keep aloof from
strife,
but every fool will be quarreling.
- 4 The sluggard does not plow in the autumn;
he will seek at harvest and have nothing.
- 5 The purpose in a man's heart is like deep
water,
but a man of understanding will draw it
out.
- 6 Many a man proclaims his own steadfast
love,
but a faithful man who can find?
- 7 The righteous who walks in his integrity—
blessed are his children after him!
- 8 A king who sits on the throne of judgment
winnows all evil with his eyes.
- 9 Who can say, "I have made my heart pure;
I am clean from my sin"?
- 10 Unequal⁴ weights and unequal measures
are both alike an abomination to the LORD.
- 11 Even a child makes himself known by his
acts,
by whether his conduct is pure and
upright.⁵
- 12 The hearing ear and the seeing eye,
the LORD has made them both.
- 13 Love not sleep, lest you come to poverty;
open your eyes, and you will have plenty
of bread.

- 14 “Bad, bad,” says the buyer,
but when he goes away, then he boasts.
- 15 There is gold and abundance of costly
stones,
but the lips of knowledge are a precious
jewel.
- 16 Take a man’s garment when he has put up
security for a stranger,
and hold it in pledge when he puts up
security for foreigners.¹
- 17 Bread gained by deceit is sweet to a man,
but afterward his mouth will be full of
gravel.
- 18 Plans are established by counsel;
by wise guidance wage war.
- 19 Whoever goes about slandering reveals
secrets;
therefore do not associate with a simple
babblor.²
- 20 If one curses his father or his mother,
his lamp will be put out in utter darkness.
- 21 An inheritance gained hastily in the
beginning
will not be blessed in the end.
- 22 Do not say, “I will repay evil”;
wait for the LORD, and he will deliver you.
- 23 Unequal weights are an abomination to the
LORD,
and false scales are not good.
- 24 A man’s steps are from the LORD;
how then can man understand his way?
- 25 It is a snare to say rashly, “It is holy,”
and to reflect only after making vows.
- 26 A wise king winnows the wicked
and drives the wheel over them.
- 27 The spirit³ of man is the lamp of the LORD,
searching all his innermost parts.
- 28 Steadfast love and faithfulness preserve the
king,
and by steadfast love his throne is upheld.
- 29 The glory of young men is their strength,
but the splendor of old men is their gray
hair.
- 30 Blows that wound cleanse away evil;
strokes make clean the innermost parts.
The king’s heart is a stream of water in
the hand of the LORD;
he turns it wherever he will.
- 2 Every way of a man is right in his own eyes,
but the LORD weighs the heart.
- 3 To do righteousness and justice
is more acceptable to the LORD than
sacrifice.
- 4 Haughty eyes and a proud heart,
the lamp⁴ of the wicked, are sin.
- 5 The plans of the diligent lead surely to
abundance,
but everyone who is hasty comes only to
poverty.
- 6 The getting of treasures by a lying tongue
is a fleeting vapor and a snare of death.⁵
- 7 The violence of the wicked will sweep them
away,
because they refuse to do what is just.
- 8 The way of the guilty is crooked,
but the conduct of the pure is upright.
- 9 It is better to live in a corner of the housetop
than in a house shared with a
quarrelsome wife.
- 10 The soul of the wicked desires evil;
his neighbor finds no mercy in his eyes.
- 11 When a scoffer is punished, the simple
becomes wise;
when a wise man is instructed, he gains
knowledge.
- 12 The Righteous One observes the house of
the wicked;
he throws the wicked down to ruin.
- 13 Whoever closes his ear to the cry of the poor
will himself call out and not be answered.
- 14 A gift in secret averts anger,
and a concealed bribe,⁶ strong wrath.
- 15 When justice is done, it is a joy to the
righteous
but terror to evildoers.
- 16 One who wanders from the way of good
sense
will rest in the assembly of the dead.
- 17 Whoever loves pleasure will be a poor man;
he who loves wine and oil will not be
rich.
- 18 The wicked is a ransom for the righteous,
and the traitor for the upright.
- 19 It is better to live in a desert land
than with a quarrelsome and fretful
woman.
- 20 Precious treasure and oil are in a wise man’s
dwelling,
but a foolish man devours it.
- 21 Whoever pursues righteousness and
kindness
will find life, righteousness, and honor.
- 22 A wise man scales the city of the mighty
and brings down the stronghold in which
they trust.
- 23 Whoever keeps his mouth and his tongue
keeps himself out of trouble.
- 24 “Scoffer” is the name of the arrogant,
haughty man
who acts with arrogant pride.

for his hands refuse to labor.
- 26 All day long he craves and craves,
but the righteous gives and does not hold
back.
- 27 The sacrifice of the wicked is an
abomination;
how much more when he brings it with
evil intent.
- 28 A false witness will perish,
but the word of a man who hears will
endure.
- 29 A wicked man puts on a bold face,
but the upright gives thought to¹ his
ways.
- 30 No wisdom, no understanding, no counsel
can avail against the LORD.
- 31 The horse is made ready for the day of
battle,

AB 22 A good name is to be chosen rather than
great riches,
and favor is better than silver or gold.

- 2 The rich and the poor meet together;
the LORD is the maker of them all.
- 3 The prudent sees danger and hides himself,
but the simple go on and suffer for it.
- 4 The reward for humility and fear of the LORD
is riches and honor and life.²
- 5 Thorns and snares are in the way of the
crooked;
whoever guards his soul will keep far
from them.
- 6 Train up a child in the way he should go;
even when he is old he will not depart
from it.
- 7 The rich rules over the poor,

- and the borrower is the slave of the
lender.
- 8 Whoever sows injustice will reap calamity,
and the rod of his fury will fail.
- 9 Whoever has a bountiful³ eye will be
blessed,
for he shares his bread with the poor.
- 10 Drive out a scoffer, and strife will go out,
and quarreling and abuse will cease.
- 11 He who loves purity of heart,
and whose speech is gracious, will have
the king as his friend.
- 12 The eyes of the LORD keep watch over
knowledge,
but he overthrows the words of the
traitor.
- 13 The sluggard says, "There is a lion outside!
I shall be killed in the streets!"
- 14 The mouth of forbidden⁴ women is a deep
pit;
he with whom the LORD is angry will fall
into it.
- 15 Folly is bound up in the heart of a child,
but the rod of discipline drives it far from
him.
- 16 Whoever oppresses the poor to increase his
own wealth,
or gives to the rich, will only come to
poverty.

and apply your heart to my knowledge,

30 Those who tarry long over wine;
those who go to try mixed wine.

31 Do not look at wine when it is red,
when it sparkles in the cup
and goes down smoothly.

32 In the end it bites like a serpent
and stings like an adder.

do no violence to his home;
16 for the righteous falls seven times and rises

but the wicked stumble in times of

18 lest the LORD see it and be displeased,
and turn away his anger from him.

19 Fret not yourself because of evildoers,
and be not envious of the wicked,

- 33 A little sleep, a little slumber,
a little folding of the hands to rest,
34 and poverty will come upon you like a robber,
and want like an armed man.

More Proverbs of Solomon

25 These also are proverbs of Solomon which
the men of Hezekiah king of Judah copied.

- 2 It is the glory of God to conceal things,
but the glory of kings is to search things
out.
- 3 As the heavens for height, and the earth for
depth,
so the heart of kings is unsearchable.
- 4 Take away the dross from the silver,
and the smith has material for a vessel;
5 take away the wicked from the presence of
the king,
and his throne will be established in
righteousness.
- 6 Do not put yourself forward in the king's
presence
or stand in the place of the great,
7 for it is better to be told, "Come up here,"
than to be put lower in the presence of a
noble.
- What your eyes have seen
8 do not hastily bring into court,
for¹ what will you do in the end,
when your neighbor puts you to shame?
- 9 Argue your case with your neighbor himself,
and do not reveal another's secret,
10 lest he who hears you bring shame upon
you,
and your ill repute have no end.

- 11 A word fitly spoken
is like apples of gold in a setting of silver.
- 12 Like a gold ring or an ornament of gold
is a wise reprovee to a listening ear.
- 13 Like the cold of snow in the time of harvest
is a faithful messenger to those who send
him;
he refreshes the soul of his masters.
- 14 Like clouds and wind without rain
is a man who boasts of a gift he does not
give.
- 15 With patience a ruler may be persuaded,
and a soft tongue will break a bone.
- 16 If you have found honey, eat only enough
for you,
lest you have your fill of it and vomit it.
- 17 Let your foot be seldom in your neighbor's
house,
lest he have his fill of you and hate you.
- 18 A man who bears false witness against his
neighbor
is like a war club, or a sword, or a sharp
arrow.
- 19 Trusting in a treacherous man in time of
trouble
is like a bad tooth or a foot that slips.
- 20 Whoever sings songs to a heavy heart
is like one who takes off a garment on a
cold day,
and like vinegar on soda.
- 21 If your enemy is hungry, give him bread to
eat,
and if he is thirsty, give him water to
drink,
22 for you will heap burning coals on his head,
and the LORD will reward you.
- 23 The north wind brings forth rain,
and a backbiting tongue, angry looks.
- 24 It is better to live in a corner of the housetop
than in a house shared with a
quarrelsome wife.
- 25 Like cold water to a thirsty soul,
so is good news from a far country.
- 26 Like a muddied spring or a polluted fountain
is a righteous man who gives way before
the wicked.
- 27 It is not good to eat much honey,
nor is it glorious to seek one's own glory.²
- 28 A man without self-control
is like a city broken into and left without
walls.
- 26** Like snow in summer or rain in harvest,
so honor is not fitting for a fool.
- 2 Like a sparrow in its flitting, like a swallow
in its flying,
a curse that is causeless does not alight.

- 3 A whip for the horse, a bridle for the donkey,
and a rod for the back of fools.
- 4 Answer not a fool according to his folly,
lest you be like him yourself.
- 5 Answer a fool according to his folly,
lest he be wise in his own eyes.
- 6 Whoever sends a message by the hand of a fool
cuts off his own feet and drinks violence.
- 7 Like a lame man's legs, which hang useless,
is a proverb in the mouth of fools.
- 8 Like one who binds the stone in the sling
is one who gives honor to a fool.
- 9 Like a thorn that goes up into the hand of a drunkard
is a proverb in the mouth of fools.
- 10 Like an archer who wounds everyone
is one who hires a passing fool or drunkard.¹
- 11 Like a dog that returns to his vomit
is a fool who repeats his folly.
- 12 Do you see a man who is wise in his own eyes?
There is more hope for a fool than for him.
- 13 The sluggard says, "There is a lion in the road!
There is a lion in the streets!"
- 14 As a door turns on its hinges,
so does a sluggard on his bed.
- 15 The sluggard buries his hand in the dish;
it wears him out to bring it back to his mouth.
- 16 The sluggard is wiser in his own eyes
than seven men who can answer sensibly.
- 17 Whoever meddles in a quarrel not his own
is like one who takes a passing dog by the ears.
- 18 Like a madman who throws firebrands,
arrows, and death
- 19 is the man who deceives his neighbor
and says, "I am only joking!"
- 20 For lack of wood the fire goes out,
and where there is no whisperer,
quarreling ceases.
- 21 As charcoal to hot embers and wood to fire,
so is a quarrelsome man for kindling strife.

than hidden love.
- 6 Faithful are the wounds of a friend;
profuse are the kisses of an enemy.
- 7 One who is full loathes honey,
but to one who is hungry everything bitter is sweet.
- 8 Like a bird that strays from its nest
is a man who strays from his home.
- 9 Oil and perfume make the heart glad,
and the sweetness of a friend comes from his earnest counsel.³
- 10 Do not forsake your friend and your father's friend,
and do not go to your brother's house in the day of your calamity.
Better is a neighbor who is near
than a brother who is far away.
- 11 Be wise, my son, and make my heart glad,
that I may answer him who reproaches me.
- 12 The prudent sees danger and hides himself,
but the simple go on and suffer for it.
- 13 Take a man's garment when he has put up security for a stranger,
and hold it in pledge when he puts up security for an adulteress.⁴
- 14 Whoever blesses his neighbor with a loud voice,
rising early in the morning,
will be counted as cursing.

17 Iron sharpens iron,
and one man sharpens another.²
18 Whoever tends a fig tree will eat its fruit,
and he who guards his master will be
honored.
19 As in water face reflects face,
so the heart of man reflects the man.
20 Sheol and Abaddon are never satisfied,
and never satisfied are the eyes of man.
21 The crucible is for silver, and the furnace is
for gold,
and a man is tested by his praise.
22 Crush a fool in a mortar with a pestle
along with crushed grain,

27 There will be enough goats' milk for your

but the righteous are bold as a lion.
2 When a land transgresses, it has many
rulers,
but with a man of understanding and
knowledge,
its stability will long continue.
3 A poor man who oppresses the poor
is a beating rain that leaves no food.

wicked,
but those who keep the law strive against

CONFESS YOUR SINS TO GOD

Ezra 7:1-10, 9:1—10:17; Proverbs 28:13

You didn't mean to brush your bike against Dad's new car. Yikes! He saw the scratch on the driver's door and was not happy. How easy it was to blame your younger brother. How difficult it is to fess up. Besides, white lies are not really lies. Right? Read Proverbs 28:13.

Not owning up to your mistakes can affect others. When Ezra the priest and scribe learned of the sins of the Israelites, he grieved so deeply that he literally pulled out strands of his hair and beard. Ezra then led the people in public confession—and he included himself as an offender of God's ways. Admitting your wrongs to the Lord brings relief to your mind, body, and soul and frees you to live at peace with God and others.

Why is it sometimes challenging to own up to your mistakes? How is confessing your wrongs to your parents or a friend different from confessing to God?

Go sit where the sun is shining directly on you. Feel God's presence as you tell Him you're sorry for your sins. Next, thank Him for forgiveness and a fresh start.

Role of Women in Bible Times
Proverbs 31:10-31

In Bible times, women typically ran the household—they were responsible for cooking, making clothing, and taking care of the children. Proverbs 31 talks about how women often made business decisions—they would buy and sell things to help take care of the household. The cultures around Israel often did not value women, but the Bible makes it clear that women are created in God’s image and are very important to Him.

HOW DO WE KNOW THE BIBLE IS REALLY TRUE?

Proverbs 30:5

The Bible has a lot of stories, and some of them might seem hard to believe (like Jonah and the great fish or the story of Noah and the flood). But every word in the Bible is true (Proverbs 30:5).

One way we can know the Bible is true is by looking at history. The Bible talks about many things you might learn about in history class. We can see how the Bible fits into history. Even though more than 40 different writers wrote the Bible over a period of more than 1,000 years, all the writers agree in the things they say about God and history.

The best proof that the Bible is true is the fact that some of the earlier writers of the Bible wrote predictions, or prophecies, about events and people. Hundreds of years later, we can see in both history and in the Bible that those things came true. (For examples of fulfilled prophecies, see Micah 5:2 and Matthew 2:1-6, Hosea 11:1 and Matthew 2:14-15.)

If some parts of the Bible are true, it makes sense that the rest would be, too!
