How to Use *The Big Book of Bible Story Activity Pages #1*

Welcome to *The Big Book of Bible Story Activity Pages #1*, a learning adventure for the preschoolers in your home or classroom. Your preschooler will be excited to review favorite Bible stories and verses through completing these activity pages.

The 52 Bible story activity pages contained in this book teach Bible stories and verses using skills that preschoolers enjoy using.

How to Use This Book in Your Classroom

Use this book as a fun and meaningful way to review Bible stories and verses.

Every Quarter

At the beginning of the quarter, photocopy and store each lesson's pages in a labeled envelope or folder.

Every Week

Before each class, take out that lesson's page. Become familiar with how the page works. Prepare children's pages if needed by prefolding and then unfolding. When a page requires cutting, depending on the skill level of your class, precut some or all of the cuts.

Tell the story, using a completed page as the illustration. Then invite children to make their own illustration. Before giving children their own pages, demonstrate how to complete the page (cutting, folding, etc.). Seeing your demonstration will provide a visual guide for children.

While children complete their own pages, provide opportunities for children to talk about the scene or action on the page. Let children retell the story action by using the page (moving figures, completing mazes, etc.). Also ask simple specific questions to help children recall the action the page illustrates. For example, begin the story and then ask, "What happened next?" Let a volunteer tell. Involve as many children as possible. In classes where children are just beginning to use words to communicate, suggest a child answer your question by pointing to the appropriate figure on the activity page.



How to Use This Book in Your Home

Use this book with your preschooler to encourage and build your child's spiritual growth as you talk about favorite Bible stories and verses.

Follow these steps for valuable learning and together time.

1. Gather the materials needed for the activity pages.

- For most activity pages, nothing more than crayons or markers is necessary. Scissors, string, tape, glue sticks and/or paper fasteners are needed for some.

2. Keep *The Big Book of Bible Story Activity Pages #1* in a special place.

- Invite your child to tear out and work on one activity page each week.
- Even if your child wants to hurry through the book, encourage your child to only complete one page at a time so that you can take time to review the Bible verse and Bible story presented on each page.
- Keep completed pages in a folder.

3. Review the activity pages together to keep God's Word fresh in your child's life.

- Sit with your child to find and read the activity page Bible story in his or her Bible.
- Read the Bible verse at bedtime. Tell a way you plan to obey the verse. Ask your child to tell, too. Pray together, asking God to help you both obey His Word.
- As your child completes an activity page, look back together at the activity pages he or she has already finished. Review favorite Bible stories and verses.

This Bible learning time at home will create a solid foundation for your child as he or she begins to read the Bible for him- or herself. The time spent on the activity pages and Bible learning will help you and your child build a relationship that will be remembered long after the activity pages are all completed.

Getting the Most Out of An Activity Page

Purpose

Some days, a class of overexcited, rowdy preschoolers can tempt us to plunk down an activity page in front of each one and gratefully take a break. But this resource has great potential for learning if we stay actively involved!

The activity page has a twofold purpose: first, to provide each child with a personalized visual aid to use in reviewing the Bible story; second, to help children think and talk about what the Bible truth means in their daily lives. Not a craft or an art activity, it is an interactive way to reinforce that day's Bible truth.

Participation Tips

How Do Preschoolers Learn?

Young children enjoy the action of the activity pages. And even more, young children learn best as they repeatedly hear and talk about the Bible stories and verses! The activity page provides a fresh way to illustrate and repeat the Bible story, both in class and then at home with family. And with hands and minds busy, children often respond freely and listen eagerly as you guide the conversation. Be sure to use the questions and comments provided on the page.

When Do Preschoolers Need Help?

Try to assist only when a child cannot complete a task. As you get to know the children in your class, you will know which children may need extra help.

If an older child is not interested in doing the activity page, say, "It's OK if you don't want to work on your page right now. But all of us need to sit at the table together." Often, after a few moments, the child will decide that the page is an acceptable activity after all! You may also provide a quiet alternate task, such as drawing on blank paper or looking at books. Send the uncompleted activity page home and suggest that parents may invite the child to work on the page when interest is shown.



Some children may make a few marks on the page and announce, "I'm done." While children should never be forced to complete an activity, there are often questions that can be asked to encourage further participation. "Everyone gets to color the flowers a different color. What color are you going to choose?" "Which picture on your page shows the beginning of the story? The end?" Engage the child about the scene or action on the page or invite him or her to retell the Bible story.

Folding and Cutting

To help a child fold his or her own page, hold the page in the proper position. Then tell the child to press and rub where he or she wants the fold.

When a child does his or her own cutting, hold the page taut for him or her.

Taping and Gluing

To simplify tape use, pull off and stick pieces of tape on the edge of the table, rather than handing a child a roll of tape.

Conclusión



Genesis 25:27-34

Two Brothers

Esau liked to be outdoors. He liked to hunt with a bow and arrow to find food. Jacob was different from Esau. He did not like to go hunting. He did not like to be outdoors. He liked to cook.

Special Gifts

Esau was born before Jacob. That meant that one day Esau would be the family's leader. He would also be given most of the things his father, Isaac, owned. Jacob would only get half as much as Esau. Jacob wanted to get more.

A Hungry Hunter

The boys grew to be men. One day Esau went hunting and was gone a long time. When he got home, he was tired and very hungry! He could smell good food cooking.

Jacob was stirring a pot of stew. Esau said, "Give me some of that stew!"


Conclusión

¿Qué puedes hacer para ser bueno con las personas de tu familia?



Jacob's Tricks

Genesis 27:1-45

Isaac Asks

Jacob and Esau were all grown up now. Their father, Isaac, told Esau, "I am getting old. I want to give you my blessing before I die." (The blessing was a special promise given to the family's new leader.) Isaac wanted Esau to be that new leader. But first, Isaac asked Esau to go hunting and then cook Isaac's favorite food. Esau went out hunting right away!

Rebekah Plans

But Jacob and Esau's mother, Rebekah, wanted Jacob to be the new leader. She told Jacob, "We will get the blessing for YOU while Esau is gone. Do what I say, Jacob."

Isaac was so old that he could not see anything. Rebekah told Jacob to put on Esau's clothes. She put hairy goatskins on Jacob's hands and neck because Esau had a lot of hair. Now that Jacob smelled and felt like Esau, Isaac would think Jacob was Esau! Rebekah made Isaac's favorite meal. She told Jacob to take the food to Isaac. "Pretend to be Esau," she said.

Jacob Lies

Jacob took the food to his father. He then said something that was not true. "It's me, Esau," Jacob said. "I've made your food."

Isaac smelled Esau's clothes that Jacob was wearing. He felt the goatskins on Jacob's hands. The tricks worked. Isaac said, "It sounds like Jacob's voice, but these hands feel like Esau."

Isaac ate and then he asked God to give his son many good things. He asked God to make his son a great leader. He thought he was blessing Esau. But he was really blessing Jacob!

Esau Cries

Soon Esau came home. When Esau found out Jacob had tricked their father, he cried and became so angry, he wanted to hurt Jacob! Jacob had to go away and stay with his uncle. He had to go away for many, many years.

Conclusion

Instead of saying things that are not true, God wants us to tell the truth and be kind to the people in our families. That is a way to show God's love.

Las trampas de Jacob

Génesis 27:1-45

Isaac pregunta

Jacob y Esaú ya eran grandes. El padre, Isaac, dijo a Esaú: “Me estoy poniendo viejo. Quiero darte mi bendición antes de morir”. (La bendición era una promesa especial para el nuevo jefe de la familia.) Isaac quería que Esaú fuera el nuevo jefe.
