Birding Shrub of the Month

Cape Honeysuckle (Tecoma capensis)

Can be planted year round (in good sun), and will flower in summer. This shrub reaches about 2m, and is great for sunbirds. It is good for insects too, and you will get a blast of colour for good measure. Plant it and supplement with Elaine's Nectar Feeders and orange or strawberry nectar mix.

Bird of the Month

Arrow-marked babbler (Turdoides jardineii)

We have noted that our babblers are becoming increasingly visible as the winter approaches, even though we tend to only have 4 to 6 at a time. The bird is insectivorous, and so as expected it loves Elaine's Birdgrub, and aggressively competes at the feeder. They are gregarious, and we generally hear them coming from at least 50m away. The Arrow-marked babbler has received the place of "Bird of the Month" for brightening up the first cold days of 2017.
