Fever Tree (Vachellia xanthophloea)

The tree is large, but is suited to pavement verges, and larger gardens. It requires plenty of water, grows quickly, and causes great pleasure to every garden and bird lover!

Environmental Chirps

Bird of the Month

Spotted Dikkop (or Thick-knee) (Burhinus capensis)

The amazing bird that lives in the back of your garden, (and you didn't know it!)

"Our" Dikkop calls at 4am. An eerie screech that reminds you of a night in the Kruger National Park.

These birds clean the garden of insects and spiders, but also eat lizards, eggs, and even mice.

This is not a small bird, and the most amazing thing is that they are so capable of hiding in your garden by day, simply by finding a place under cover, lying still, and relying on superb camouflage.

Sadly, we know of no birding product to attract this magnificent animal, you simply need a conducive garden environment.
