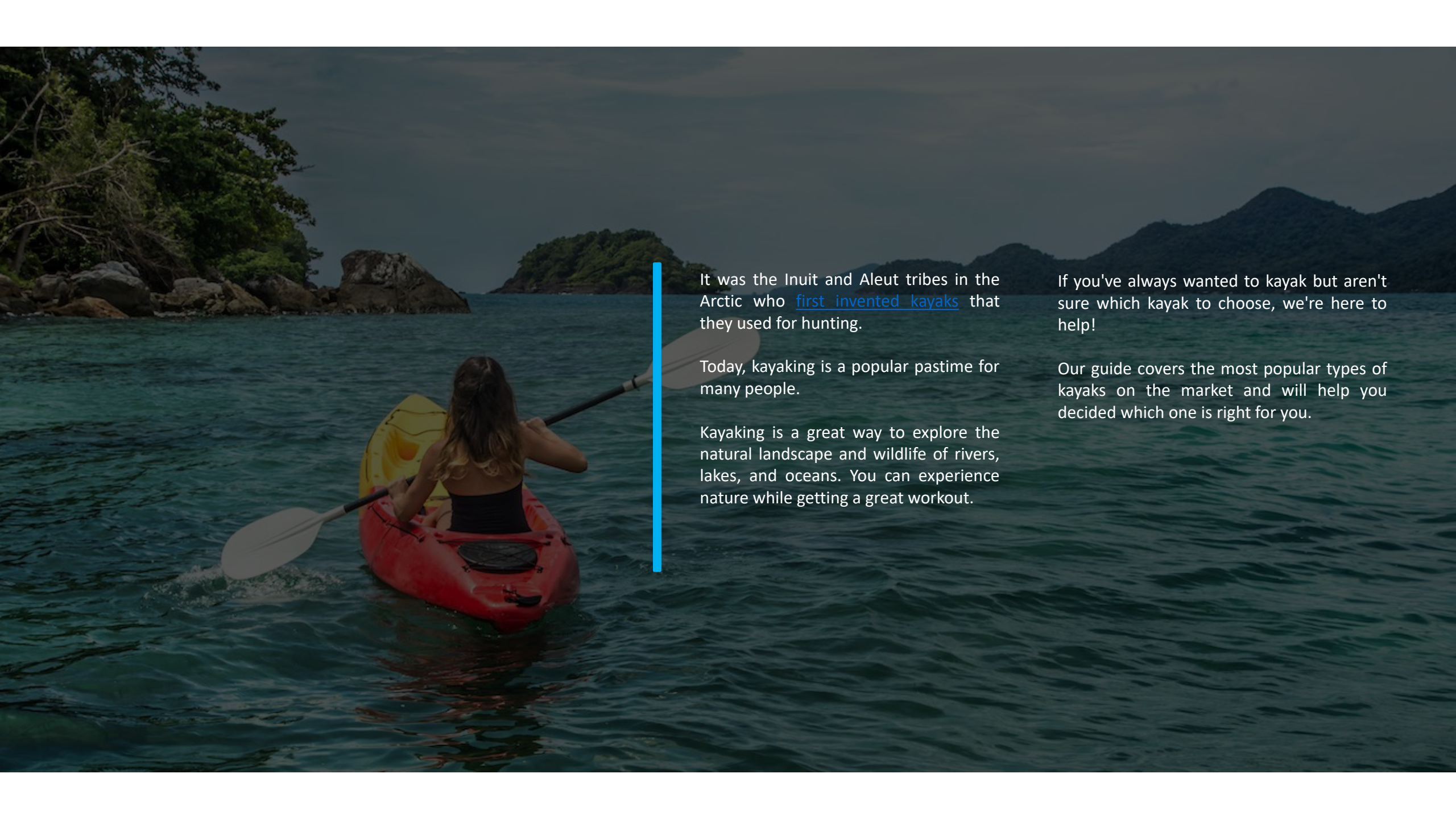

Touring kayaks are also often equipped with rudder systems and spray skirts. These features make them better suited for longer trips.


