



# A Ceremony for the Celebration of the Anniversary of the Birth of Brother George Washington

FEBRUARY 22, 1732

## INTRODUCTION

This ceremony is written for the purpose of honoring Brother George Washington, and is suitable for performance – with adjustments as needed – in a tiled lodge of any degree. This ceremony may also be performed, with minor adaptations, at a dinner or open event.

Washington's Birthday is a Federal holiday in the United States, celebrated on the third Monday of February. His actual date of birth is February 22, 1732. This observance should be performed as close as possible to those times.

## PREPARATION

If the lodge room includes a painting or bust of Washington, it is appropriate for it to be highlighted in some way prior to the opening of the lodge. For example, a wreath could be added to it for the occasion, or a table placed before it to display flowers, a candelabra or an electric lamp. Contact the George Washington Masonic National Memorial gift store to obtain an appropriate image of Washington for lodge display, if needed.

Note: Regulations and lodge practices vary. This ceremony is a template, which should be adapted to the procedures of your jurisdiction prior to any performance. Please contact your appropriate Grand Lodge representative with questions.

CEREMONY

*The Worshipful Master may begin by having the lodge called from labor to refreshment according to ritual specified by his jurisdiction.*

WM (rising): Brethren, the time has come for us to honor the memory of Worshipful Brother George Washington, the first President of the United States. As we reverently celebrate the anniversary of his birth, I call upon each brother present to mark well his many virtues as a man and a Mason.

WM: Brother Secretary.

Sec. (rising): Worshipful Master.

WM: It is my will and pleasure that you read the Masonic roll of George Washington.

Sec.: Born, February 22, 1732.  
Entered, Fredericksburg Lodge, at Fredericksburg, Virginia,  
November 4, 1752.  
Passed to the Degree of Fellow Craft, March 3, 1753.  
Raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason,  
August 4, 1753.  
Elected to serve as Charter Master of Alexandria  
Lodge N<sup>o</sup> 22, December 27, 1788.  
Called to the Celestial Grand Lodge, December 14, 1799,  
Age 67, and for 47 years a Brother of the Craft.

(Secretary is seated.)

WM: Brother Senior Warden.

sw (rising): Worshipful Master.

WM: You will please that East that you now rehearse Brother Washington's record of achievement.

sw: Appointed Commander-in-Chief of the Continental Army,  
1775.  
With final victory of the War of Independence, resigned  
his commission, 1783.  
President of the Constitutional Convention, 1786.  
Unanimously elected first President of the United States, 1788.  
Unanimously reelected to his second term as President of the  
United States, 1792.  
Retired from the Presidency and returned Mt. Vernon, 1797.

(Senior Warden is seated.)

wm: Brother Junior Warden.

JW (rising): Worshipful Master.

wm: It is my will and pleasure that you speak to Brother  
Washington's undying legacy.

JW: Our illustrious Brother Washington was a man of unparalleled  
character, as exemplary in private as he was in the public eye. In  
the language of Freemasonry, he was a just and upright Mason,  
ever walking and acting according to the noblest principles of  
our Craft. It is only natural that many have regarded his life  
as a "perfect ashlar," a true exemplification of all of the moral  
attributes of a sincere and authentic Master Mason.

As one of our forebears in the Craft so fittingly expressed:  
Washington "was indeed a paragon in Freemasonry, an  
exemplar of its virtues and its graces. There is no degree of  
moral improvement suggested by Masonic teachings to which  
he did not aspire, and few to which he had not attained."

Brother Washington was indeed, as we all aspire to be, a "living  
stone," and to the glory of the Great Architect of the Universe,  
he remains the cornerstone of the American civilization . . . and  
not only so for our society, but also for those of other nations

who have followed us into the manifold blessings of freedom, liberty and equality.

So is he now and so shall he ever remain American Freemasonry's "grand exemplar," whom countless Freemasons seek to emulate in their own lodges and their own communities. In the mystic tie, his exalted merits live on, met with our inalienable regard! So we honor Brother Washington, exalt his memory, and with heart and tongue celebrate his inestimable legacy to all humanity.

(Junior Warden is seated.)

WM: General Henry Lee's eulogy to George Washington, the friend of Masonry, of his Country and of Man:

"First in war — first in peace — and first in the hearts of his countrymen, he was second to none in the humble and enduring scenes of private life; pious, just, humane, temperate, and sincere; uniform, dignified, and commanding, his example was as edifying to all around him as were the effects of that example lasting. To his equals he was condescending, to his inferiors kind, and to the dear object of his affections exemplarily tender; correct throughout, vice shuddered in his presence, and virtue always felt his fostering hand; the purity of his private character gave effulgence to his public virtues."

As we culminate our celebration of the birth of our Brother George Washington, let us ever bear in mind his great works, and above all give thanks to the Supreme Architect of the Universe for his life.

Brother Chaplain.

Chaplain: Worshipful Master.

WM: Let us pray.

Chaplain: Most holy and glorious Lord God, thou Great Architect of heaven and earth, we ask Thy blessing and we give our thanks for your servant George Washington. We are thankful all that he did as a man, as a Freemason and as the father of our nation. May we always be worthy and grateful for his legacy and may remain free to celebration the birth of such a good man. Amen.

Resp. So mote it be.

\* These words are a traditional toast to Washington and King Solomon, and may be omitted here to be performed later at the festive board as an actual toast at the lodge's discretion.

WM: To Solomon, the luminary of the East,  
and to Washington, the glory of the West –  
May the rays of their virtues strike LIGHT  
to the soul of every Freemason.” \*

(appropriate pause)

- (all are seated)

If the brethren are at refreshment, the Worshipful Master now restores the lodge to labor according to normal procedure.
