



## Stitch suggestions for Wildflower Bouquet



You can take two different approaches with this pattern and get two different, wonderful outcomes.

One approach is to fill in all of the petals, stems, and leaves with the satin stitch and stem stitch. You can also use the detached chain stitch for some of the smaller tear drop shaped leaves. This method is shown in the example photo included in this guide. You will also see in that guide that I chose to vary the colors of the petals. This is something that you can do, or you can keep a monotone palette. I also love to outline all of the parts of the pattern with two strands of black thread using the backstitch after I finish filling them all in to give it a more defined look.

Another approach, which is faster and a bit more simple, is to use a **backstitch** over all of the lines with three to six strands of black thread. You can choose how many strands that you want to use depending on the thickness you prefer for your stitch. I wouldn't go any less than three or you may have difficulty covering the lines of the pattern.
