

Evan Sharma is somewhat of an anomaly. Most of the time he's a regular high school student from Canada, but he's also been referred to as one of the most exciting artists in Toronto and had his artwork compared to Picasso's.

Evan is also the creative director of RBLB (Right Brain, Left Brain) streetwear which will launch later this year.

Despite the fact that his work is highly sought after by art collectors from New York, Los Angeles and Dubai, Evan has donated pieces of his art that have raised over \$35,000 dollars for various charities.

RBLB stands for Right Brain, Left Brain, and is an idea that Evan applies to all facets of his life. He is not only an artists, but has completed significant research on how global warming can be lowered through altering the bacteria in the rumen of cows.

Evan works with companies like VibeArts which helps underprivileged kids get access to art supplies. This is a cause very close to Evan's heart.

He says, "I think that access to art is so important because it fuels creativity in many other areas of life."

Apart from his regular charitable contributions, Evan has raised funds for the United Way, for various hospitals and for his local school. To show his support for the Canadian Olympic Team, Evan donated a painting that he created at 7000 feet and the money raised from that went towards the team.
