Overview

The Centenary of Canberra was celebrated in 2013 and Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centre was successful in attracting centenary funding to deliver Selling Yarns 2: Weaving the nation's story, with over 30 Indigenous communities and 137 Indigenous artists converging on Canberra. Craft ACT was appointed administrator for the Centenary of Canberra - a legacy of design project, to manage the competition to design and manufacture the official memorabilia to commemorate the Centenary of Canberra. Along with presenting our own exhibition and public programs the year-long celebrations were successful in raising awareness and the reputation of Craft ACT, our members and the sector more broadly. In building recognition as a centre of excellence, Craft ACT has firmly placed itself within the





design and industry sectors and will deliver the inaugural DESIGN Canberra in 2014.



President Report

This has been another year of new challenges for Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centre. We began 2013 with the extraordinary situation of having tendered for a retail opportunity which, although not entirely directly successful, leaving us guite flummoxed at the time, the outcome was quite complex. However, the great thing is that we have been able to build on the efforts that went into the preparation, setting up a positive framework for a really busy year, namely the Centenary of Canberra. On behalf of the Management Committee, I would like to acknowledge the maximum effort and dedication that the Craft ACT staff and, in particular, to Avi Amesbury the Executive Director have put into the organisation.

The events at Craft ACT are no longer just about coming along to have a drink and a nibble at exhibitions openings and providing a few opportunities for artists. While exhibitions are still central to our identity, there has been so much more going on. The past year was exemplary. In 2013, the artistin-residence program not only saw our first international artist, Michael Brennand-Wood, but also our first Indigenous artist, Ceretha Skinner. We look forward to seeing the work that will eventuate from the residencies. These residencies are important for building significant relationships with national and regional institutions and international audiences.

The Centenary of Canberra program was spread out over the year and required constant

attention by the staff and raised Craft ACT's profile – especially through the Centenary of Canberra – a legacy of good design program. This has given the organisation a great track record to manage and distribute great local product that was available, not just in our own retail outlet, but in Canberra and online throughout Australia. It was great seeing Sean Booth's brooches on many local celebrities at various functions and also on politicians when interviewed on television. These brooches were also part of the membership package for 2013. I look forward to receiving this upcoming year's brooch designed and made by FIVEFOLD.

Selling Yarns: Weaving the nation's story was a sell-out success with Indigenous textile and fibre artist converging on Canberra from across the country. Presented in partnership with the National Museum of Australia and the Australian National University, and supported by the Centenary of Canberra, it was a truly premier national forum.

Designing a Capital Crafting a Nation was an incredibly stimulating raft of activities including 'conversations', pop up shops, events and exhibitions around the city in the first half of the year. Trying to get to everything was exhausting. Our partnerships with Molonglo Group and Palace Electric Theatre were an important ingredient to making these events possible. As was the very generous support by Bradley Allen Love Lawyers, 2B Advertising and

Design, Manteena Pty Ltd and Fender Katsalidis Architects. Again down at NewActon the inaugural night market MODERN was another exciting evening raising the profile of Craft ACT and members.

Pod, the Craft ACT initiative at the Lonsdale Street Traders, continued to bring in a very different audience which we highly value. Megan Jackson, Tom Skeenham Tara Bromham, Elephant & Rose, Third Bird Design, One ov One, Peter Minson and Fink!'s 20th anniversary were just some of the exciting pop-ups that filled the pod space. These have been really important events for Craft ACT to broaden our profile and location.

One of the great highlights of the year was Fusion: the art of eating. It was not only the food, but the artists and designers who teamed up with chefs, the wine, the venue, the atmosphere and the conversations made it a really brilliant evening looking out over the skyline of Canberra from NewActon. It was a huge effort by staff that was much appreciated and will be talked about for a long time to come

The year was highly successful both in the delivery of the artistic program and contributing to the sustainability of the sector. We thank all the Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centre staff charged with implementing the extremely busy 2013 program of exhibitions and events, an exemplary effort.





Collections





Craft ACT continues to facilitate a collectors program that encourages national, state and territory institutions and collectors to purchase craft and design. The program is aimed at raising awarness of craft and design in Australia and to contribute to the sustainability of the sector. Through the program, revenue is returned directly to artists.

Leaf Cabinet 1 by Catherine Reid

Leaf Cabinet 1 was exhibited at Craft ACT in the exhibition Inhabit – living in design and purchased by the National Gallery of Australia.

In this work, Reid examines the qualities of the Australian landscape and source that it provides for mark making. What to the casual glance may appear monochromatic and undifferentiated is revealed on close inspection to be delicately

coloured and finely detailed. It is a landscape both persistent and fragile, subject to the ravages of fire and drought. Reid's work is characterised by simple repeated trunk-like bead forms that appear to have been through a fire. They have been coiled and burnished, wrapped in thread with copper and salt and then pit-fired in wood shavings, newspaper and wood. The movement of smoke across the surface provides subtle variations of light and shadow. To Reid, the repetitive process becomes a form of meditation, and provides a rhythm and harmony to the whole work.

The five works were exhibited at Craft ACT in the exhibition *Painting* the Hills of Canberra and purchased by the ACT Legislative Assembly.

Created in response to Walter Burley Griffin and Marion Mahony Griffin's grand vision to revegetate or 'paint' the hills of Canberra each in a single colour of flowering native plants, Cathy Franzi imagines the hills in the anticipated colours of pink, yellow, purple, white and red through the medium of ceramics. Using a carving technique reminiscent of linocut printing, Franzi achieves the botanical likeness of the plants as found in Marion Mahoney Griffin's colour-coded botanical notebooks, and her own botanising through the hills of Canberra's nature parks.



Artist-in-residence UK

Through the artsACT initiative, Arts Residencies ACT, and in partnership with ACT Parks and Conservation Services, the 2013 artist-in-residence program launched the inaugural international artist-in-residence. Renowned British textile artist, Michael Brennand-Wood undertook a residency at Gudgenby Ready-Cut Cottage in Namadgi National Park in September 2013, followed by a sustained period of research at the National Museum of Australia and the National Gallery of Australia.

Heritage, arts and the environment

2013 International and Indigenous artist-in-residence

For the first time in 2013 Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centre's artist-in-residence program supported both an international and an Australian Indigenous artist to undertake a residency at Gudgenby Ready-Cut Cottage in Namadgi National Park. The 2013 residency grew in scope to support artists to undertake a two week research period at a national cultural institution in Canberra.

Michael Brennand-Wood, renowned British textile artist, was selected as the international artistin-residence and undertook his research with the National Gallery of Australia and National Museum of Australia. Indigenous textile designer and Gumbayngirr woman, Ceretha Skinner, will undertake her research period with the National Museum of Australia.

An open day was held for each of the artists while in residence so that the community could speak with them about their time in the cottage and experience the beauty of the environment. Michael Brennand-Wood gave an artist talk at the ANU School of Art Forum, ran two one-day workshops and gave a critique session to textile students at the Australian National University School of Art Textile Department.





The inaugural international and Indigenous artist-in-residence program was presented in partnership with ACT Parks and Conservation Services and supported by the artsACT initiative, Arts Residencies ACT, ACTEW Water and the Australian National University.

Selling Yarns 3: Weaving the nation's story was a four day event that presented a conference, a market day, workshops, an exhibition and associated activities program, and launched the inaugural Indigenous Art Film program. It was the premier national forum for Indigenous textile and fibre in the country and was a highlight of the Centenary of Canberra celebrations.

Indigenous artists and elders, and art administrators, came together and participated as speakers, workshop facilitators and market stall holders to share their stories, exchange their knowledge and skills, and to trade. They opened

to other conference delegates and visitors. As Tim Growcott, conference speaker, stated:

"An authentic spirit of reconciliation coursed strongly throughout the four days, with so many stories and examples of practical collaborations and life-changing projects. The conference was a recognition of the important and sensitive work being accomplished by like-minded creators, forging links with the living past and forming models for healing into the future."

The project was a huge success, inspiring artists and creating strategic alliances between Indigenous communities across Australia. There was significant cross cultural engagement and inspiration with international Indigenous artists and culture, paving the way for lasting relationships with opportunities to develop further collaborations and joint projects. Establishing dialogue and sharing cross-cultural exchanges with international artists, curators and researchers has placed Australian Indigenous textile practice within the broader international arena.




Paradox in a Paddock was a solo exhibition by Accredited Professional Member Elizabeth Paterson, exploring space and design in Canberra.


