
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Overview

President Report

2014 was the year that Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centre brought its artists and makers into Canberra's streets and public places. We began a new conversation with our city and its communities about design and craft. This has resulted in a new awareness of the value of a rich cultural life in making Canberra and its region a vibrant and innovative place.

DESIGN Canberra is the standout event which brought the artists, their work and practice to new audiences and created new connections with the design professions, business and government. There are many other areas of new connections and growth, including the pod outlet in Lonsdale Street which gave both emerging and midcareer artists visibility while the Artist-in-Residence programme extended to include international wood artist Satoshi Fujinuma from Japan. A beautifully executed exhibition programme engaged and surprised visitors to the gallery space, while the partnership with the Museum of Australian Democracy at Old Parliament House saw artists working to create work which resonated with and responded to Australia's political and national history.

2014 was also a year to plan and review. The management committee looked at our strategic plan against the major changes at the Australia Council which will see new funding systems and goals to make the arts enrich daily life. We are confident that Craft ACT, through its strong network of artists and designer makers has an important role to play in supporting artistic excellence and bringing the work to local, national and international audiences.

Looking forward, 2015 will be a year of innovation and growth as we move into a new retail space, work on the Australian Ceramics Triennale and the second DESIGN Canberra. Explaining and demonstrating our work will be a focus as the Australia Council reviews its key organisation support.

I want to thank my fellow Board members and record my appreciation of the executive team who are passionate, creative and effective. Executive Director Avi Amesbury is one of Australia's outstanding arts managers and a pleasure to work with however demanding and pressing the deadlines. I would also like to thank the DESIGN Canberra project team of Mel George and Yasmin Masri and departing curator Anne Radimin in particular. It is a strong and vibrant team and I also thank Gwenyth Macnamara, Jess Oliver and Thea McGrath in making 2014 such a success. Our partners in events and festival are true collaborators in sparking and developing creative practice.

I am passing on the role of President to Graham Humphries for 2015. Graham has been a champion for Craft ACT as we develop our new connections and conversations and I thank him for his support.

Collections


Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centre continues to raise national awareness of craft and design through its collector's program. In June 2014 Craft ACT was approached to recommend an Australian designed gift for Prime Minister Tony Abbott to present to the President of Singapore, Dr Tony Tan Keng Yam, during his visit to Australia.

Accredited Professional Member, Gilbert Riedelbauch's uniquely designed piece, **Centre square red**, was selected by the Prime Minister's office. As a contemporary designer Riedelbauch works with a variety of materials and processes and the selected work was formed by a combination of digitally controlled and manual processes.

Craft ACT and the Museum of Australian Democracy at Old Parliament House formed a partnership to showcase contemporary craft and design in the Museum. The project, *Beyond the Veneer: a fresh look at the Prime Minister's Suite*, gave five selected artists unprecedented access to the iconic Prime Minister's Suite room and to create new work in response. Dr Dianne Firth was selected for the project and her art quilt, **Plant Trees**, was acquired by the National Gallery of Australia.

Elements of Place: artists-inresidence was a ground-breaking exhibition, featuring Craft ACT's first Aboriginal artist-in-residence, textile artist and Gumbayngirr woman Ceretha Skinner, and the first international artist-inresidence, renowned UK textile artist Michael Brennand-Wood. The exhibition displayed new work made in response to their residing in the Namadgi National Park in 2013, presenting cultural interpretations between countries and nations; between the European and Aboriginal history, between environment, heritage and the arts, and between communities.

The catalogue was produced with assistance from ACT Parks and Conservation Service.



Flagging our future

A Craft ACT initiated project and presented as part of DESIGN Canberra, *Flagging our future* was a collaborative partnership with the Australian National University, University of Canberra and Canberra Institute of Technology. Students from the textile, industrial design and fashion faculties innovatively repurpose the Centenary of Canberra flags and banners, to create new artworks and design pieces. It brought together the three institutions, forging new links and showcasing the various strengths of students from a range of design disciplines.

The project attracted a Chief Minister's Prize which was awarded to Reuben Bokaba for his design *Canberra Autumn Winds*, and is on display at the ACT Legislative Assembly for the duration of 2015.

Creative Licence

Craft ACT acquired the remaining Centenary of Canberra number plates and invited fifteen craft and design practitioners to create artworks which innovatively reinterpreted, reused and repurposed these number plates into designed artworks which responded to Canberra as Australia's only designed city. The exhibition was curated by Craft ACT Curator and Exhibition Manager, Anne Radimin and was held in conjunction with DESIGN Canberra. It was one of the hero exhibitions within the festival to showcase the best of local craft and design.

Beyond the Veneer: a fresh look at the Prime Minister's Suite

The new strategic direction of the Museum of Australian Democracy at Old Parliament House has revitalised the Museum as a new kind of town square for Canberra and the nation. In doing so, a new and exciting partnership has developed with Craft ACT. Craft ACT invited five artists to create works that interprets an aspect of an historical room in the Prime Minister's Suite at Old parliament House and be exhibited in the Prime Minister's Suite.

Bespoke: design for the people

The partnership with the Museum of Australian Democracy was so successful a second exhibition, *Bespoke: design for the people* was co-curated for DESIGN Canberra. Six craft and design practitioners created new work that reflected and responded to the iconic designs of the original furniture at Old Parliament House. In creating the works, each artist considered the notions of political perspective, change, accountability and power in their pieces. The result was a thought-provoking collaboration between design, creativity and Australia's political history. Research and innovation

Embracing Innovations Volume 4

Craft ACT curated the fourth in the exhibition series, Embracing Innovation. The series showcases practice led research in the creative arts with a particular focus on craft and design. The 2014 exhibition displayed a breadth of innovation and research from the Sochi Olympic Skeleton Project, a collaboration between University of Canberra and Australian Institute of Sport, to a thermodynamic ceramic vessel designed to respond to the climate in Canberra, a partnership between ceramicists Linda Davy and Joan Barrass, and academic in the Faculty of Arts and Design, University of Canberra, Stephen Barrass.

Embracing Innovations Volume 4 presented an opportunity for exhibiting artists, Carlos Montana Hoyos, Erica Seccombe and Dr Stephen Barrass to speak about their research projects in the 'Speakers' Series' during National Science Week. The talks were held at the Australian National University.

"We are witnessing a rise of new economic models and changes to traditional models of consumption where design plays a central role in the development of processes and products which can contribute to economic development. From bespoke products sold in local markets to sophisticated systems for the distribution of crafted products, to the online networks which contribute to the promotion of these outputs, new partnerships between practitioners and technology are creating both personally meaningful outcomes and scalable, profitable creative services. At no other time in history has such a public connection between global citizenship, traditional and emerging "making" skills and knowledge production been so viable."



The Centenary Time Capsule Off-site exhibition in the Canberra CBD

The Centenary Time Capsule was a gift from Canberra CBD Ltd to the city of Canberra. Project managed and curated by Craft ACT on behalf of Canberra CBD Limited, the Capsule featured 100 carefully selected items that together tell the story of what life was like in the 100 years preceding 2013 for future generations. The 100 items convey Canberra's cultural and social life and included stories from across the community including local artists, businesses, community groups, institutions and government.

These unique objects were on display in a pop up space in the CBD for viewers to see before they were sealed into the Capsule. Local artist Geoff Farquhar-Still created a Canberra Centenary Column in which the time capsule is housed. This is placed on City Hill and marks the first of many significant sculptures to be placed on this symbolic site, in the commercial heart of the nation's capital.

Craft, science and the environment

Bogs and Fens: artist-in-residence

The Craft ACT annual artist-inresidence program highlights Australian craft practitioners and designers internationally and develops links between Australian and international artists. It houses artists in the Namadgi National Park as well as facilitating access to national cultural and research institutions and their collections. curators and researchers. It strengthens the artists' areas of professional practice through extended research periods. Craft ACT hosted three artistsin-residence in 2014 - its second international artist, renowned wood turner Satoshi Fujinuma (Japan), textile artist and Accredited Professional Member, Sally Blake (Canberra), as well as weaver and sculptor, Annee Miron (Melbourne). The residency is a partnership between Craft ACT and ACT Parks and Conservation Service and in 2014 this partnership was extended to include the Australian National Botanic Gardens, where the research component was undertaken, and the Australian National University facilitating the workshops.

Each artist held workshops, presented artist talks and hosted an open day which increased public awareness of and engagement with craft and design.

The Bogs and Fens: Artist-in-Residence forum investigated the interplay between craft, science and the environment. Hosted at the Australian National Botanic Gardens, it attracted enthusiasts from all three sectors [craft, science



and environment]. This one-day forum explored the program theme of the environmental protection of bogs and fens and involved the three artists-in-residence and other speakers including: Professor Geoffrey Hope (keynote speaker, Emeritus Professor, Department of Archaeology and Natural History; Visiting Fellow, Fenner School of Environment and Society at the ANU College of Asia and the Pacific); Avi Amesbury (Executive Director, Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centrel: Brett McNamara (Regional Manager, National Parks and Catchments Region, ACT Parks and Conservation Service); Dr Judy West (Executive Director, Australian National Botanic Gardens]; Lydia Guja (Seed Conservation Biologist); David Whitfield (Ranger, ACT Parks and Conservation Service]; Michael Doherty (Plant Ecologist, CSIRO Land and Water Flagship). A panel discussion concluded the event, with lively debate involving the panel and the general public on the many ways in which craft, science and the environment overlap and work towards common goals.

The 2014 artist-in-residence program was presented in partnership with ACT Parks and Conservation Service, Australian National Botanic Gardens and The Australian National University. The program was supported by Arts Residencies ACT, an artsACT initiative.

Public Program

Participants of the **Bogs and Fens:** Artist-in-Residence Open Day hosted by Sally Blake and Annee Miron enjoyed a day-trip to Nil Desperandum, Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve to see and hear about the artists' work. International artist-inresidence, Satoshi Fujinuma, hosted an open day at Gudgenby Ready-Cut Cottage, Namadgi National Park. The **Bogs and Fens: artists-inresidence**, Sally Blake, Satoshi Fujinuma and Annee Miron all presented artist talks at the Australian National Botanic Gardens (ANBG) for the Friends and staff. Annee Miron also gave a lecture at the Australian National University (ANU) Art Forum.

Annee Miron and Sally Blake presented a one-day workshop at the Australian National Botanic Gardens during the Bogs and Fens: Artistin-Residence program. Participants worked with the artists to learn about natural plant dyes and to experiment with techniques for fabrics dyeing, as well as learning the crafts of knotting and weaving with rope and other materials. Participants of the Bogs and Fens: Artist-in-Residence program two-day workshop hosted at the Australian National University School of Art Furniture Workshop, learnt the fascinating techniques and processes used by international artist, Satoshi Fujinuma.

DESIGN Canberra

DESIGN Canberra drew 24,000 visitors to 101 events presented by 460 participants in a ground breaking collaboration between educational and collecting institutions, artists, designers, architects, manufacturing and retail business at both local and national levels.

DESIGN Canberra was a four-day festival of craft and design-inspired public events, exhibitions and forums held across Canberra. It was an invitation to local, interstate and international attendees to 'change the way you think' about Canberra and about the place of craft and design in everyday life.

The inaugural DESIGN Canberra was held from 20 to 23 November

2014. In its first presentation, the festival established itself as the most important event on the ACT design calendar and signalled its potential to become a major event for Australia.

The ACTivate series brought a burst of energy and colour to empty shopfront in the CBD with pop-up exhibitions, installations, studios and shops by some of Canberra's most exciting designers. The Capital of CULTURE tours were led by knowledgeable designers, architects and artists, taking audiences on free guided tours around Canberra. The Living Artists open studios provided the public with a unique insight into creative workshop spaces and provided a platform for artists to connect with new audiences and patrons. Design BUZZ lectures and talks were a forum to discuss new ways of creative thinking, design for social change and Canberra's urban future. MODERN market brought together innovative designers and makers from Canberra and across the nation. These events were complimented by a range of exhibitions showcasing some of the most exciting art, craft and design in Canberra's premier galleries.

In so many ways, DESIGN Canberra 2014 greatly exceeded any expectations of a festival in its inaugural year, indicating its considerable potential to grow and broaden its appeal within and beyond the ACT.

Held in the multi-award winning Nishi building in vibrant NewActon, it attracted craft and design enthusiasts of all ages and acted as a platform for stall holders to generate strong sales and increased awareness of their products.

Visitors were delighted with beautifully crafted and designed objects by thirty-five selected artists, designers, collectives and key arts organisations; live music by local performers; stunning views



over Canberra and a hand-crafted 'Post Modern' cocktail. Adding to the atmosphere was a floral installation by Brave Botanics, chocolate tasting by Max Brenner and drawing activities for children at the Kid's Corner, provided by Supertrooper Studio.

Craft ACT member highlights

Sally Blake was selected as the Craft ACT member artist to participate in the 2014 Bogs and Fens: artist-in-residence program. Julie Bradley was the winner of the M16 Artspace Drawing Prize. Alison Jackson's tableware collection, Cheese Tools, was selected to represent & Company in the exhibition, The Other Hemisphere, held at Ventura Lambrate during the Milan Design Week. Alison's works were also exhibited during designEx in Sydney. Alison was a successful applicant for both the Australia

Council for the Arts New Work Grant in the Early Career category and the ACT Arts Fund 2015 Project Funding. These grants will assist the artist with costs in the development, documentation and production of new work for a solo exhibition to be held at Craft ACT in September 2015. Al Munro was successful in her application for ACT Arts Fund's 2015 Project Funding, which will assist her with the costs for a residency and exhibition in Thailand. Kirstie Rea, Gilbert Riedelbauch and Dianne Firth were selected to participate in the group exhibition, Beyond the Veneer, at the Museum of Australian Democracy at Old Parliament house (MoAD). Dianne's work from this exhibition was acquired by the National Gallery of Australia. Monique van Nieuwland won a prestigious commission to design and weave fabrics for costumes and set in the film The Gods of Egypt, to be produced in Sydney's Fox Studios for release in

Communications and marketing

Media partnerships

In 2014 Craft ACT built on the existing relationship with The Canberra Times through a DESIGN Canberra sponsorship agreement to become the festivals only print media partner. This partnership allowed both organisations to capitalise on their mutual interest in promoting Canberra's creative and business sectors.

Through the Artist-in-Residence (AiR) program and DESIGN Canberra an ongoing informal relationship with ABC 666 Local radio forged. This resulted in station staff participation in the AiR public program and Fusion: the art of eating as well as ongoing media coverage of the DESIGN Canberra festival. This relationship continues to be built on, with the possibility of a formal media partnership for DESIGN Canberra 2015 being explored.

Craft ACT tapped into Artsound FM community radio's audience through an arts partnership arrangement. This resulted in the station broadcasting live from MODERN market during the DESIGN Canberra festival. Through the live broadcast, selected stall holders were given opportunity to engage directly with a local audience to promote their practise through radio interviews. The broadcast increased the public's awareness of Craft ACT as an organisation, the DESIGN Canberra Festival and MODERN market.

Media engagement

Ongoing relationships with local print and online media organisations continued to be strengthened throughout 2014 resulting in an increase in feature articles, both printed and online and artist's radio interviews. Craft ACT also received television coverage across the WIN National News network through coverage of the Artist-in-Residence program and DESIGN Canberra. The Centre's increase in visibility will ensure brand recognition, increased exposure both locally, regionally and nationally and continue to reinforce the centre's reputation for excellence in craft and design.

Digital outreach

In 2014, Craft ACT continued to expand its digital outreach, with subscribers to the Centre's invitations and e-newsletters increasing significantly with new subscribers gained through the Triennale and DESIGN Canberra websites. The centre continued to increase engagement growth on social media and through the centres dynamic events blog.

The centre's website continues to play a pivotal role in communicating with our audiences. The website was continually evaluated for effectiveness with ongoing updates, changes and improvements taking place.

November saw the launch of the new dedicated DESIGN Canberra website. The interactive website provides an entry point into the festivals events and encourages a closer connection between audiences and participants.

Twitter and Instagram were added as additional digital communication channels with feeds from each platform appearing on the DESIGN Canberra homepage. This style of communication gives the audience real time engagement and a view into the festivals activities.

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
