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### President Report

2015 was a year of achievements and successes like no other. Craft ACT championed Australian craft and design to national and international audiences. The many innovative and diverse programs and projects presented increased the organisation's reputation as one that is spear-heading change in the ACT.

One of the exciting stand-outs was Stepping Up: The Australian Ceramics Triennale. Canberra came alive in July with ceramics with over 38 exhibitions - a snapshot of current and contemporary Australian ceramics from every state and territory. Twenty-three international artists and key industry leaders visited, networked, made connections and shared their skills. Many had not been to Canberra and we hosted them in our nation's capital at its finest. As part of this great celebration of ceramics Craft ACT launched its inaugural survey exhibition series, Janet DeBoos: A Survey.

DESIGN Canberra was another standout and all indicators rose from the previous year. Reinforcing it is Canberra's most significant design event and after only two years parallels other international design festivals that have taken many years to build. In collaboration with government and private sector partners it is now time to review and set a new strategy for a truly national event.

Collaborations, new connections, building audiences and creating opportunities to support sustainable practice remained high priorities in 2015. Audiences flocked to the ceramic market, Market Place, held in partnership with the National

Gallery of Australia as part of The Australian Ceramics Triennale and the Living Artist open studios were a DESIGN Canberra favourite. Our valued partnership with ACT Parks and Conservation Service presenting the international artist-in-residence program continued, and new partnership with National Archives of Australia and Rolfe Classic BMW were forged.

The year saw tumultuous change within the broader Australian arts sector, with twenty-five percent of funding taken from the Australia Council and placed with the Ministry for the Arts to administer the newly formed Catalyst funding program. This came at a time when the Australia Council was undertaking a major review of the Australian arts ecology and was in the final stages of inviting arts organisations to apply for six year funding after a lengthy expression of interest process. The review of the sector ceased as did the six-year funding

initiative. As a result the Australia Council underwent an internal restructure and, with substantially less money available, a four-year funding application process was opened to arts organisations. Small to medium size arts organisations and artists will be most affected by these changes and the impact will be felt in mid-2016 when the outcomes of the funding submission are announced.

The Visual Arts and Craft Strategy [VACS] funding was moved from the Ministry of the Arts to the Australia Council and a review of VACS was undertaken. Craft ACT was invited to apply and was successful, receiving VACS funding for the next four years.

A proposal to host the National Craft Initiative (NCI) major craft and design conference in Canberra was submitted and Craft ACT was one of three organisations to present to the selection panel.



Although the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV) was selected, it was a major achievement for Craft ACT. *Parallels – Journeys into Contemporary Making*, was presented by the NGV in partnership with the network of Australian Craft Design Centres (ACDC).

## Farewell to the CEO/Artistic Director

2015 was also the year that Avi Amesbury, CEO/Artistic Director resigned and will step down from the position after the 2015 Annual General Meeting in March 2016. Her strong vision for Canberra, its craft and design practitioners and the sector more broadly has seen Craft ACT emerge as a strong national organisation with a global reputation. Under her leadership Craft ACT has developed from a much smaller, embryonic organisation into a local flagship with a national and international reach. Over the last few years, with initiatives like DESIGN Canberra, its impact has extended more broadly than the arts area into creative industries and issues of public space and urban design. It has become both a highly successful arts organisation and an organisation of significance related to the future directions of the ACT economy.

Membership development, supporting early career to established artists, building audiences and strengthening sustainability has been at the heart of Avi's focus over the past seven years.

### Collections

Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centre continues to raise awareness of contemporary craft and design through its collector's program. In 2015 the Craft ACT Curator was successful in placing five art works of three Accredited Professional Members into the permanent collections of Canberra Museum and Gallery and the ACT Legislative Assembly.

Sally Blake's artworks Seed basket (Poa) and Seed basket, (Phragmites Australis) were acquired by the Canberra Museum and Gallery. These pieces were inspired by Sally's time during her 2014 Craft ACT artist-in-residence at Namadgi National Park, *Bogs and fens: artist-in-residence*.

Anita McIntyre's Blueprint for a Capital series Vessel No.1 and Linda Davy's Is it too late?, exhibited in *Stomping Ground*, curated by Craft ACT Curator, Mel George, and hosted in association with *Stepping Up: The Australian Ceramics Association* was acquired by the ACT Legislative Assembly.

Alison Jackson's 10 Vessels 10 Days, ten vessels made over ten days for her solo exhibition at Craft ACT, Table Tools and was acquired by Canberra Museum and Gallery.



# Exhibitions and Public Programs

### Portraits of a Tea Cosy

Craft ACT hosted the incoming travelling exhibition developed by Warwick Art Gallery and toured by Museum and Gallery Service Queensland, *Portraits of a Tea Cosy*, showcasing yarn artist Loani Prior, also known as Queen of Tea Cosies, and professional photographer Mark Crocker.

This exhibition became a destination for Canberrans, providing a catalyst for dialogue on the joy of owning something handmade and it being a family tradition. Audiences included local guilds, the Spinners and Weavers, Embroidery Guild and The Canberra Knitter's and all flocked to see the exhibition.

### **Emerging Contemporaries**

Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centre curates an annual national award exhibition, Emerging Contemporaries to shine a spotlight on the next wave of highly skilled early career craft and design practitioners. This exhibition plays a pivotal role in supporting and transitioning artists into professional practice. As well as selecting local practitioners from the Australian National University, University of Canberra and Canberra Institute of Technology, over the past three years, the exhibition has grown to include Sturt School for Wood, Monash University, The Design Centre Enmore, Charles Sturt University and JamFactory.



#### Bogs and Fens: artists-in-residence

The Bogs and Fens: artists-inresidence exhibition showcased the work of artists Satoshi Fuiinuma (Japan), textile artist and Accredited Professional Member Sally Blake (Canberra), and weaver and sculptor Annee Miron (Melbourne). Each artist responded to the theme of Bogs and Fens inspired by their 2014 residencies at Gudgenby Ready-Cut Cottage in Namadgi National Park and at Nil Desperandum Homestead in Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve, and through their focused research at The Australian National Botanic Gardens.

A complementary exhibition hosted by the Australian National Botanic Gardens showcased the developmental pieces undertaken by the artists giving insights into their research and creative processes. A catalogue was produced focusing on both the residencies, the research period, and the exhibition, and was produced with assistance from ACT Parkes and Conservation Service.

#### Janet DeBoos: A Survey

A Craft ACT curated exhibition, Janet DeBoos: A Survey celebrates the achievements of one of the most influential and iconic figures in the Australian craft movement. The exhibition was the first in a planned series of exhibitions showcasing Canberra and the regions iconic artists, and coincided with Stepping Up: The Australian Ceramics Triennale. The exhibition was guest curated by Peter Havnes and reflected the wide reach of DeBoos' aesthetic, intellectual and technical influences from the 1960s to 2015. The exhibition toured to South Australia and was presented at the JamFactory in Seppeltsfield.

### Stomping Ground

Stomping Ground was curated by Craft ACT Curator Mel George and presented in association with Stepping Up: The Australian Ceramics Triennale offsite at the ACT Legislative Assembly. Featuring the work of nine Craft ACT Accredited Professional

Members it showcased the high calibre of work being produced by ceramic artists in the ACT and surrounding regions. Works from the exhibition were acquired by the ACT Legislative Assembly for their permanent collection.

## BODYWORK: Australian Jewellery 1970–2012

Craft ACT was honoured to present BODYWORK: Australian Jewellery 1970-2012, an incoming touring exhibition from the National Gallery of Australia featuring jewellery from its permanent collection. The exhibition included the work of 42 Australian jewellers exploring jewellery from a number of viewpoints within six broad themes: Romanticism, Interpreting the Vernacular, Encapsulating Nature, Technics, Social Message and Sculpture for the Body and included Craft ACT Accredited Professional Members Robert Foster and Simon Cottrell.

and Canberra Symphony Orchestra cellist, Alex Voorhoeve, investigated light and its relationship to the body, stemming from one of the exhibition's themes. Choreographed using inspiration from the work of Simon Cottrell the performance illustrated the ways in which the body and jewellery pieces adorning the body can together become vehicles to convey specific messages, expression and themes.

Two leading Australian jewellers whose work was in the exhibition, Susan Cohn and Robert Foster each hosted a workshop at the Australian National University School of Art Gold and Silversmithing Workshop. Cohn's workshop, Mapping Your Practice, explored the way artists think about their practice, and to help them understand where it sits within contemporary

craft and design. Foster drew on the historical context of the locket, exploring contemporary manifestations of vessels carried by the body.

The public programs associated with the exhibition engaged over 130 people across the four events.

#### Table Tools

In her first solo exhibition, Craft ACT Accredited Professional Member Alison Jackson presented a new collection of functional tableware vessels and cutlery pieces. The exhibition rationale was informed by research and prototype experimentation melding traditional silver-smithing techniques with contemporary industrial processes. Work from her exhibition was acquired by Canberra Museum and Gallery for their permanent collection and Table Tools won the Canberra Critics Award 2015 for Visual Art.

### Public Program



# International artist-in-residence

## Connect with Your Nature: artists-in-residence

The Craft ACT annual artist-inresidence program highlights Australian craft practitioners and designers internationally and develops links between ACT, Australian and international artists. It builds connections between Craft ACT and international arts organisations, as well as strengthening links to embassies, and cultural, education and research institutions. The residency houses artists in Namadgi National Park as well as facilitating a two week research component in a national cultural institution, giving access to their collections, curators and researchers and contributing to the artist's professional practice.

This year's program, presented in partnership with ACT Parks and Conservation Service and the 2015 research partner, National Archives of Australia, focused on the theme, Connect with Your Nature, which was developed from the 'Healthy Parks Healthy People' philosophy – connecting our national parks

and health with our wellbeing.

### Public Program

The 2015 program engaged over 90 people across five public events. Through workshops, artist talks and an open day the artists shared their knowledge and skills in drawing, tapestry and metal working attracting new audiences to Craft ACT, Namadgi National Park and the National Archives of Australia.

Hingston's workshop, Namadgi Drawing, responded directly to the theme, Connect with your nature, encouraging participants to enjoy a few hours away from the city, 'creatively de-stressing' in Namadgi National Park. The gentle process of slowing down through mindfulness formed the foundation for drawing exercises using simple media, exploring the shapes and textures of the bush. Experimentation also featured in Hatcher's workshop at the ANU School of Art, Textiles in Metal, demonstrating more unconventional ways of working with metal, exploring the use of patterning and oxidization.

Audiences travelled to the historic Gudgenby Ready-Cut Cottage in Namadgi National Park for an open day to share in the artists' creative processes and to enjoy the stunning surrounds of the park. Both artists presented at the ANU School of Art, Art Forum Program and gave an artist talk to staff and friends of the National Archives of Australia on their work and the research component of the residency.

During Heritage Week in April 2016 Hingston will present an artist talk in the Craft ACT Gallery about the work in the resulting exhibition inspired by the 2015 residency.

# Research and innovation

# Embracing Innovation Volume 5

Over the past decade changes in tertiary institutions has seen primary practice-based and practice-led research incorporated into universities research recognition and funding frameworks. In response Craft ACT curates the annual exhibition, Embracing Innovation, which showcases focused research and innovation in craft and design. In 2015 the exhibition attracted international interest with research presented in the Craft ACT Gallery from United States of America and the United Kingdom.

The 2015 exhibition displayed a breadth of innovation and research from across Australia, and internationally ranging from the Boardercross Snowboard Binding Project, a collaboration between designers and researches from the University of Canberra, the Olympic Winter Institute and the Australian Institute of Sport; to the Evapo Breathing Ceramic Skin: aesthetic and performative ceramic tiles by Mehrnoush Latifi and Dr Judith Glover from RMIT University; to Norwood Viviano, Grand Valley State University, Michigan, USA who is adapting automotive computer-aided modelling, such as LiDar scanned data, 3D printing and rapid prototypes to create glass sculptures.

From her opening speech Dr Susan Ostling, Senior Lecturer, Fine Art, Queensland College of Art, Griffith University says,



"Overall these research projects encompass a broad spectrum of materiality and knowledge platforms. Between them, they encompass social histories, glass craftsmanship, teaching and learning, medical design, mathematics, engineering, musicianship, computer modelling, 3D printing technologies, metalsmithing, fabric design and printing, environmental design, ceramics production, sustainability and philosophy."

"...Embracing Innovation Volume 5 brings us the realisation of some recent projects, developed through self-critical and self-reflexive research. All projects visualise or realise through interdisciplinary forms of inquiry,

objects that have pertinence for our time. All objects carry imagination and skill, there is a thoughtful use or application of materials, and ethical considerations are foregrounded, as are relational considerations with users."

### Public Program

Three of the participating artists in *Embracing Innovation Volume 5* gave two demonstrations during National Science Week held at the old Bus Depot Markets. Kraig Grady and Terumi Narushima performed on various microtonal 3D printed flutes and instruments. The work was the outcome of the collaboration between the researchers in music and engineering at the University

of Wollongong. Dr. Fanke Peng, Course Convener of Fashion at the University of Canberra and the founder of the Cross-Culture Design Lab demonstrated how her Wearable Memory research uses memories as a sharing tool for stories and life experiences. It gave audiences a practical experience in making, resulting in a take away prototype.

### Research Partnership


In 2015 the National Archives of Australia partnered with Craft ACT and hosted the dedicated research component undertaken by artists participating in the Artist-in-Residence program. In previous years partnerships have included the Australian National Botanic Gardens, National Gallery of Australia and National Museum of Australia.

These focused research periods are aimed at strengthening sector-wide research capabilities and giving artists access to national cultural institutions collections, archival material, curators and researchers.

### Stepping Up: The Australian Ceramics Triennale

The Stepping Up: The Australian Ceramics Triennale was a sell-out success, attracting 400 delegates from across the globe, bringing together world-renowned keynote speakers, demonstrators, artists and leaders in curatorial practice, education and marketing. It was held in Canberra from 9 to 11 July 2015, with the associated public program commencing on Saturday 4 July to Sunday 12 July 2015, attracting over 8,800 audiences to the various events.

The theme of the conference, Stepping Up, focused on ceramics in the changing word, our role in the future, and making money. It included three days of conference presentations, keynote talks and discussions; a welcome event hosted at Strathnairn Arts; masterclasses presented by Janet DeBoos, Fred Olsen and Juz Kitson; Market Place the ceramic market presented in partnership with the National Gallery of Australia and hosted in Gandel Hall; a trade fair; a film festival; an extensive exhibition program across Canberra showcasing ceramics from every state and territory in Australia; a ceramics-in-schools program; and pop-up events and exhibitions across Canberra.

### Highlights

**Janet DeBoos** was the Master of Ceremonies for the Stepping Up conference.

Craft ACT presented the major exhibition guest curated by Peter Haynes, Janet DeBoos: A Survey in association with the Triennale, attracting over 1400 visitors to the exhibition. The July Issue of Journal of Australian Ceramics sponsored the Triennale with the issue becoming the Stepping Up printed program. Art Monthly Australia July Issue, guest edited by Glenn Barkley, focused on ceramics to coincide with Stepping Up, This dedicated issue focusing on craft is unprecedented for the magazine and over 230 people attended the launch in the Craft ACT Gallery. The Australian Ceramics Film Festival showcased the diversity of Australian ceramics and focused on short films. A series of fundraiser plates where decorated by celebrities, Dr Brian Schmidt; Mia Wasikowska; Hiroe Swen; Gareth Evans; David Pope; G W Bott; Andrew Farriss (INXS); Kate Miller Heidke; Juz Kitson and were auctioned on eBay.



### DESIGN Canberra

DESIGN Canberra 2015 reinforced that it is Canberra's most significant design event. It brings diverse strands of Canberra's identity together to enhance Canberra in an increasingly design-savvy world. DESIGN Canberra showcases a strong design network, raising consciousness about the fundamental application of design in all aspects of daily life and makes Canberra synonymous with excellent, innovative design and business practices. It extends the perception of Canberra as a creative, stylish, contemporary and entrepreneurial city, and is well on the way of being recognised as part of the international calendar of design festivals.

Running over nine days, from 21 to 29 November the festival unfolded in dozens of locations across the city, including national cultural institutions, art centres, museums, galleries, universities, design centres, studios, workshops and businesses. It presented five exciting



event streams – ACTivate, pop-up exhibitions, installations studios and shops; Capital of Culture, exclusive guided design and architectural tours; Living Artist, open studios of local artists and design firms; DESIGN Buzz, conversations and talks; and Exhibitions.

DESIGN Canberra is a Craft ACT: Craft and Design Centre initiative and is managed by the organisation. Craft ACT is in a reputable position to work with and bring a diverse network of key stakeholders together connecting the creative industries, design sector, education and cultural sectors, and artists to audiences and markets, providing great cultural and economic benefits to the ACT.

# New generations — building sustainability



### Craft ACT retail, AGENCY

Launched in 2009, the Craft ACT shop was established to support artists in their professional practice and to provide visitors with the opportunity to purchase high quality, locally made objects of craft and design. Representing over 120 local and national artists, the Craft ACT store has a dedicated client base and regularly supplies federal and local government with high profile diplomatic gifts.

Under the leadership of the Business Development and Retail Manager, Halie Rubenis, the Craft ACT retail outlet was rebranded as AGENCY and relocated to the Ori Building, Lonsdale Street in Braddon. Halie led the fit-out for the store and secured exceptional

community support, creating a new benchmark for selling Australian craft and design in Canberra.

The AGENCY philosophy is to sell a service, an experience and a lifestyle. The store fit out, and the stock, highlights the diversity within the local community and provides an accessible platform for designers and makers to exist and to thrive. Everything in the store is for sale – the fixtures, the shelving units, the lighting.

Halie committed extraordinary efforts to achieve outcomes. In particular, the exceptional work done in the execution of the fit-out and implementing good governance around the development of systems and policies and procedures for AGENCY.

#### AGENCY CO-LAB

The first Craft ACT AGENCY CO-LAB between Alison Jackson and Jon Goulder was launched in October. Together they designed and produced 10 limited edition Cheese Companion sets that couple the experience of good food and good design.

Alison Jackson is a Craft ACT Accredited Professional Member and early career contemporary silversmith with a focus on tableware and wearables.

Jon Goulder is one of Australia's most respected furniture designer/ makers and current Creative Director of the furniture studio at the JamFactory in Adelaide. His work has held a market presence for almost 20 years, and has been collected by all major national and state art galleries.



#### Market Place

Presented in partnership with the National Gallery of Australia, Market Place was a high end ceramic market hosted in Gandel Hall and presented in association with Stepping Up: The Australian Ceramics Triennale. Delegates, as well as selected local and national artists, presented their work to collectors and the public alike during this exciting event. The 2,500 visitors to the market were delighted with a wide array of unique functional products for the home as well as stunning exhibition and sculptural pieces to add to their collections. In conjunction with Market Place, the National Gallery of Australia offered two free guided tours of the Australian Decorative Arts collection. There were also two performances by clay artist, Jihye Min in the Australia Garden.

#### Living Artist

Presented as a key event in the DESIGN Canberra program, the Living Artist open studios showcased the high-calibre of craft practitioners working in the ACT and region. The studio tours provided audiences with insights into how some of Canberra's most accomplished creatives work. It is estimated over \$50,000 was made from direct sales.

#### pod at The Hamlet

Due to redevelopment of the former tyre factory that housed Lonsdale Street Traders, pod was relocated to the new pop-up site, The Hamlet. Pod continued to be a versatile and unique space supporting members, emerging makers, artists, cooperatives, curators, writers and educators. In 2015 pod supported 36 artists and designers, from diverse disciplines and stages in their practice. With the Craft ACT retail outlet, AGENCY, relocating to Braddon and the restraints on human resources pod will not continue in 2016.

The work of Linda Davy and Anita McIntyre was acquired for the ACT Legislative Assembly Collection. Linda's piece, Is it too late? and Anita's work, Blueprint for a Capital Series Vessel no. 1 both featured in the Craft ACT's exhibition Stomping Ground in association with The Australian Ceramics Triennale in July 2015. Amanda Stuart completed a major research project with the National Museum of Australia. She produced a series of artworks that reimagined the Tasmanian Tiger whose furred pelts are now cared for by the Museum.

As a result, a positive ongoing partnership developed with them

#### Media Engagement

Having established beneficial ongoing relationships with the media, most notably, The Canberra Times, the organisation received 70 feature articles throughout the year. A number of highlights include a feature on Janet DeBoos as part of the Janet DeBoos: A Survey exhibition, artist-in-residence and

Craft ACT continued its partnership with Artsound FM radio, securing regular interviews associated with the exhibitions program, public programs and special events, including Stepping Up: The Australian Ceramics Triennale and DESIGN Canberra.

Through DESIGN Canberra, the organisation was able to establish a sponsorship relationship with

the regional urban publication BMA. The publications target audience is a younger university and urban youth demographic. This sponsorship deal secured six full pages detailing the festivals program as well as an additional two pages for an editorial feature from the Craft ACT CEO/Artistic Director, Avi Amesbury and a Q&A with Lisa Heiss, a DESIGN Buzz presenter. The increase in visibility ensures brand recognition, increased exposure both locally, regionally and nationally and

continues to reinforce Craft ACT's reputation for excellence in craft and design, across the youth and urban demographics.

#### Digital outreach

In 2015, Craft ACT continued to expand its digital outreach, with subscribers to Craft ACT invitations and e-newsletters increasing significantly with new subscribers gained through The Australian Ceramics Triennale and DESIGN Canberra websites.

There was increased engagement and growth on social media with Facebook fast becoming a key communication tool for the organisation with Craft ACT special project communication strategies focusing on organic social media driven campaigns.

The Craft ACT website continues to play a pivotal role in communicating with our audiences. The website was continually evaluated for effectiveness with ongoing updates, changes and improvements taking place.



A redesigned and simplified blog was launched in August, this aligned the blog with the Craft ACT website and integrated the two to ensure a more user friendly interaction. A customised content management system was developed to allow the system to adapt to the organisation needs as they emerge, capitalising on digital trends and audience engagement.

To coincide with the October launch of the Craft ACT retail outlet, AGENCY and the CO-LAB collaboration, the shop pages of the website were redesigned. This section of the website now functions as a micro site integrated into the main site. The site features three main pages, a landing page, products page and contacts page advising viewers of the new location in Braddon. Product images feature heavily on the new pages, with the products page displaying four key product images, giving viewers a quick insight into what is new instore. Throughout 2016 this section of the website will be developed further and it is envisaged that an e-commerce function will be integrated, allowing for virtual shopping.
