2019: The year in review

The Craft ACT story continues to be written: our rich past, vibrant present and optimistic future. You are a part of our story: whether you're a designer, a maker, a collector, a colleague, an educator, a customer or visitor. Craft ACT has touched the lives and built the careers of thousands of people since we were established in 1971.

Craft ACT is one of the longest continuously running visual arts membership organisations in Australia. Our members, staff, collaborators and boards have together played a vital role in sustaining Australia's high-quality studio practice and supporting craftspeople, designers and audiences. This is why it is so important that the work we do together now, secures a sustainable future for Craft ACT not only in our golden anniversary year in 2021, but for many decades to come.

As part of the collaborative process to develop a new strategic plan for Craft ACT, we brought together some of the many people who shape Craft ACT's past and present, to imagine a strong and creative future for the organisation. At workshops with ThinkPlace, we gained new insights and affirmed some existing understanding: craft is dynamic, enduring, entrepreneurial and respectful of tradition, uniting

time-honoured techniques with contemporary interpretations built for the future. Craft ACT supports the contemporary craft practitioner, whose work occupies a unique position between tradition and innovation, thinking and doing, the local and global. What craft is and what it means has evolved: although studies demonstrate most practitioners prefer to define themselves as artists or designer–makers, craft is central to the experience of our growing membership.

The 2021-24 strategic plan for Craft ACT is part of the first chapter of the story of our next 50 years. Craft ACT's vision is to embed contemporary craft, making and design at the centre of everyday life in Australia's capital, a global city of design. We will connect the Canberra region's high-quality studio practice to the world, by fostering innovation, building collaboration and championing a secure future for a valued, creative and essential community of contemporary craftspeople, designers and audiences.

In addition to the strategic planning process, 2019 was a bumper year for Craft ACT and our membership across our four strategic priorities. At the heart of Craft ACT is its commitment to **artistic excellence**,

supporting new work and exhibitions, and promoting member artists nationally and internationally. One of the distinctive dimensions of Craft ACT's artistic program is the respected peer review process in which acclaimed accredited professional members (APM) across craft mediums assess exhibition and residency applications. This ensures a national and global experience shapes our high-quality exhibition program. Respect for Craft ACT's artistic program continues to grow: the 2019 Canberra Critics Circle awards recognised outstanding exhibitions by Craft ACT accredited professional members: Keiko Amenomori-Schmeisser (Folding indigo, 2018), Julie Ryder (The hidden sex), and Gilbert Riedelbauch (Form follows fold). A Craft ACT exhibition curated for DESIGN Canberra, Glass utopia, has been invited to Milan Design Week in 2020. We initiated a dedicated program of essays and speeches to engage critical discourse in craft and design and showcased new trends and research with two academic journals dedicated to Craft ACT programs (Axon and Fusion).

Craft ACT is committed to
embedding Aboriginal and Torres
Strait Islander craft and design
practice into Australian arts and
culture. We promoted a record
number of Indigenous artists in
the gallery, shop, professional

development, public programs, and DESIGN Canberra festival. Accredited Professional Member Jennifer Kemarre Martiniello was selected to feature in the Glass utopia exhibition. Wayne Simon and Krystal Hurst were selected for the DESIGN Canberra auction and signature exhibition HOME:MADE. The Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies (AIATSIS) has committed to collecting the complete works from Craft ACT's inaugural Indigenous Craft + Design Residency and Workshops, featured in the *Emerging contemporaries* 2019 exhibition, Indigenous architect, advocate and lecturer Jefa Greenaway was a keynote speaker at Craft ACT's national design conference, Object Subject. Collaboration is central to all our work and I acknowledge Jennifer's mentorship, the dedication of the participating artists and designers, and the ANU School of Art & Design for hosting workshops.

Connecting contemporary craft and design to new and engaged audiences is a priority at Craft ACT and 2019 brought the work of our organisation to the attention of record audience numbers: from international and diplomatic engagement, to building local, regional and national audiences and artist participation, to media coverage, and scholarly engagement. Our acclaimed artist-in-residence program in Namadgi National Park, supported by ACT Parks and Conservation for well over a decade, continues to invite artists to be cultural interpreters of our landscape. DESIGN Canberra allows us to achieve more for our members across some measures than we do across the whole year: \$190,570 of income was generated for artists and designers during the festival, 5,361 people attended our members' open studios (28 per cent increase), we gained national media coverage for members and featured members in signature events. Significant

acquisitions of outstanding work by Craft ACT members took place throughout the year, with the highlight being the National Museum of Australia's acquisition of Julie Ryder's beautiful glass slides and cyanotypes.

Dynamic and sustainable growth

continued in 2019, ensuring Craft ACT can support our members, staff and community into the future. Given the challenges facing notfor-profit arts organisations, the increased and diversified funding from government, sponsorship and self-generated sources in 2019 is warmly received but should never be taken for granted. Once again a significant amount of time by staff, board representatives and members was invested in applying for and acquitting grants, including the highly competitive Australia Council's four-year funding (2021-24). Our careful financial management and efforts to attract new sources of funding have transformed Craft ACT, which has in turn helped us to remunerate staff appropriately, upgrade infrastructure, promote artists, initiate professional development opportunities and create platforms to showcase craft and design to diverse audiences. We introduced cash prizes for Craft ACT members at the annual Capital Arts Patrons' Organisation (CAPO) awards, increased artist commissions and member professional development, and facilitated a partnership between home.byholly and Girl Nomad Ceramics.

The 2019 annual report shines a light on Craft ACT's vital role in our region's arts ecology and our sector's growth. As always, there is much to celebrate and cherish about Craft ACT and its promotion of Canberra's deep roots in craft and design. I thank everyone who has contributed in the past year, and would like to note a few extraordinary people. The small but mighty Craft ACT team brings so much joy, creativity, passion, cups

of tea and expertise to our work every day and it is an honour to work beside them. Every member of the Craft ACT Board is dedicated, encouraging and a privilege to learn from. Outgoing President Graham Humphries has been an inspiration, a friend and educator and although I know he will remain connected to Craft ACT, I will miss his regular support and guidance. I'd like to thank the ministers and the dedicated staff at the Australia Council and artsACT who support Craft ACT not only through relevant Federal and ACT Government funding but in a multitude of ways, as well as the many generous sponsors who connect us with likeminded people.

Finally, I thank each and every member of Craft ACT for their support and note in particular the members who participated in our 2019 program of exhibitions, residencies, committees and public programs for their time and goodwill.

As you read the following pages celebrating Craft ACT's 2019 achievements, I encourage you to reflect on the many people and many hands that made this possible, not only in the past year but in the past half a century.

President's report

For the Craft ACT Board of Management, 2019 was a time of transition, growth and planning.

Graham Humphries, the dedicated and effective President of Craft ACT for six years, completed his final term on the board. To ensure a smooth transition, Graham announced his departure at the 2019 AGM which allowed us time throughout the year to learn from his experience and tap into the expertise of recent board appointments. Graham leaves Craft ACT in excellent shape and playing a leadership role in our region's arts ecology, our sector's growth and now with a growing international reach. I would like to thank Graham for his outstanding contribution to Craft ACT. His legacy will be enjoyed for years to come as we continue to seek recognition of Canberra as a UNESCO City of Design and plan for our move to the Kingston Arts Precinct.

Graham stepped down as president

after the December 2019 meeting and the board elected me as interim president. I would like to thank my fellow continuing board members who have contributed significantly to Craft ACT over the past year: Sari Sutton (Secretary and Public Officer), Rob Henry, and member representatives Gilbert Riedelbauch and Julie Ryder. Thank you to Jennie Cameron for accepting the position of interim board member late in 2019. I would like to especially note the dedicated contribution of Treasurer Sam Bryant, a certified practicing accountant who regularly supports the organisation with risk management, workplace health and safety, and financial approvals and reporting. I thank retiring board members Stephen Cassidy (2014) for his experienced and enthusiastic contribution to Craft ACT and DESIGN Canberra over many years, and Andrea Ho (2017) who has provided valued leadership in HR, diversity and communications

My thanks to the Craft ACT staff members, Meagan Jones, Selena Kang, Kate Nixon, Madtilda Skerritt and Madisyn Zabel whose commitment in 2019 has contributed to the outstanding success of the many programs, exhibitions and functions now enjoyed by Craft ACT audiences. The board acknowledges the enthusiasm and expertise of our CEO, Rachael Coghlan, who has provided leadership to the team and whose dedication to the success of the organisation has been demonstrated through a growth in membership, a strong exhibition program and the delivery of another outstanding, profile raising DESIGN Canberra festival.

Craft ACT Members are of course the backbone of the organisation. The growing membership numbers attest to the success of the many programs and benefits offered by Craft ACT and confirm our relevance to the community we serve. Membership was not the only area that grew in 2019: attendances, visibility, sponsorship, digital engagement, recognition and artist income enjoyed significant and welcome increases.

The board, staff, membership and community invested considerable resources in Craft ACT's application to the Australia Council for four-year funding (2021-24). In addition to a comprehensive two-stage application process, Craft ACT developed a new strategic plan to support our application. Bringing together perspectives and ideas from members, stakeholders and thought leaders has resulted in an inspiring road map for the future of Craft ACT. The funding environment for arts organisations is increasingly competitive, and the majority of first-round applications were unsuccessful. Nevertheless, we are hopeful that the undoubted value of Craft ACT will be recognised. We welcome, also, the positive insights into our organisation that have arisen from the careful planning process involved

in preparing the application, which will support us in growing and thriving into the future

I thank the ACT Government, the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy (an initiative of the Australian, state and territory governments), and the Australia Council for the Arts (the Australian Government's arts funding and advisory body) for their ongoing support of Craft ACT. The organisation has also been privileged to receive significant financial support from its growing number of sponsors, without which many of our programs, particularly in the DESIGN Canberra festival, would not be possible. It is heartening to see the corporate community supporting and promoting good design in all its manifestations.


Audience development

Over 61 per cent of audiences were repeat visitors, which was a gratifying example of audience retention. Of the 200+ events, 90 per cent were free and, therefore, accessible to a diverse audience. Of website traffic, 64 per cent comprised interstate or international visitors, indicating increased awareness of the festival beyond local audiences. Interstate visitation remains a key goal of the festival.



Marketing – seek new and significant sources of funding to support additional dedicated marketing programs and resources. Interstate marketing is a priority for 2020.

Reach – expand visibility beyond the ACT border via tourist sector collaborations and build closer relationships with Canberra's national cultural institutions and diplomatic community. Continue to celebrate and promote Canberra as a global city of design with benefits and opportunities across sectors and borders.

Relationships – invest in mutually beneficial relationships with the potential for transformative outcomes – similar to *Glass utopia*, which will be included in the 2020 Milan Design Week. Continue to invest in authentic relationships to support future collaborations for the craft and design sector.





Goal 1: Artistic excellence

Support artists to make excellent work, foster experimentation and grow their profile globally

Exhibitions

Since 1971, Craft ACT has supported artists to make excellent work. One way that we celebrate and showcase artistic excellence in the sector is through our annual exhibition program.

In 2019, we featured five outstanding solo exhibitions by respected members of the Craft ACT community. The hidden sex by Julie Ryder presented a rich collection of textile and mixed media work (including glass, print and collected sea materials) which continued her interest in science and history. Several works by Julie were acquired by the National Museum of Australia and the exhibition received a Canberra Critics Circle award. Gilbert Riedelbauch's exhibition, Form follows fold, presented a new series of sculptural works documenting an exciting shift in his career as a practising artist, for which he also received a Canberra Critics Circle award. Phoebe Porter's Mechanical sampling presented a selection of exquisitely crafted rings made by combining machining processes with traditional jewellery techniques. Jan Hogan's evocative exhibition Rhizoming: Language of print and place explored the entanglement of nature, place and culture through woodcut

installations and Al Munro's exhibition Pattern translation looked at the process of translating textile patterns into painted forms.

Craft ACT's 2019 exhibition program showcased exceptional quality in group shows, illustrating diverse approaches to contemporary craft and design and representing early career and established practitioners. Craft ACT's annual Emerging contemporaries 2019 exhibition included outstanding graduates and emerging craft practitioners selected from institutions from the ACT and surrounding regions including Canberra Institute of Technology (CIT), ANU School of Art & Design, Sturt School for Wood, Canberra Potters Society, University of Canberra and the Indigenous Craft + Design Workshop Program.

Take time featured 10 textiles artists from three generations who reflected on the time they spend in their studio developing and producing artworks through the meditative medium of woven tapestry. Artists included Diana Wood Conroy, Daniel Edwards, Tim Gresham, Rachel Hine, Dimity Kidston, Valerie Kirk, Suzanne Knight, Patsy Payne, Ema Shin and Cheryl Thornton.

This exhibition reflected experimentation with new materials and techniques and an openness to innovation and collaboration from a record number of proposals. Craft ACT selected over 100 works, surveying jewellery, furniture, metal, textiles, ceramics, paper and glass. In doing so we continued to shape and secure the future of craft and design in the ACT and Australia. Kerry-Anne Cousins, in the Canberra Times, commended the exhibition, noting that: 'It is impossible to make mention of all the works in this wellcurated exhibition. It is an exhibition that is extensive and diverse and will reward the diligent viewer' (24 September 2019). Other quality group exhibitions included Shifts in Japanese materiality (Julie Bartholomew, Kyoko Hashimoto, Guy Keulemans, Rui Kikuchi, Liam Mugavin, Yusuke Takemura and Bic Tieu), The teapot project (Hendrik Forster and Kenny Son) and Material codes: Explorations of form via systematic making (Nyx Mathews Kristina Neumann and Thomas O'Hara).

Cupped hands, by Simon Cottrell and Vicky Shukuroglou, was presented in partnership with ACT Parks and Conservation Service and the Australian National Botanic Gardens and explored the infinite complexity of ecosystems within which humans have evolved. Alongside Cupped hands, I thought I heard a bird was an important exhibition grounded in sophisticated research. Curated by Raquel Ormella, the exhibition explored the intersections of nature and culture by a research cluster of artists and designers working in a range of media.

In conjunction with the exhibitions, the symposium *To see ourselves as part of something larger* was held at the Australian National University (ANU). This symposium considered how we might understand our place within complex ecosystems, be these

nature reserves or the streets where we live. Featured speakers included Richard Beggs, Simon Cottrell and Vicky Shukuroglou, Fernando do Campo, Ashley Eriksmoen, Patsy Hely, Joyce Hwang, Madeleine Kelly, Bruce Pascoe, Louise Wallis and Mitchell Whitelaw.

Innovative material-based research underpinned all exhibitions. For example, the poetic work of Jan Hogan in *Rhizoming: Language of print and place* creatively explored, through printmaking and multiples, Gilles Deleuze's theory that rhizomes pertain to a map that is always detachable, connectable, reversible, modifiable and has multiple entryways and exits with its own lines of flight. The group show *Shifts in Japanese materiality* explored the changing nature of materiality in Japanese object-making culture.

In 2019, DESIGN Canberra presented several important research forums. At the inaugural national design writing conference, *Object Subject* (2017), keynote speaker and *NY Times* design critic Alice Rawsthorn called on the design sector to take seriously their social, environmental and ethical responsibilities. This clarion call,

teamed with multiple requests from national and international design writers to repeat the event, was the catalyst for the second design conference in Canberra in 2019. Held over two days during the festival, international and national speakers included Australian singer, writer, director, and advocate Robyn Archer; Indigenous architect, lecturer and advocate Jefa Greenaway (Australia); arts editor Jennifer Higgie (United Kingdom); urban design researcher and editor of Assemble Papers, Jana Perković (Australia); and experimental materials research designer Seetal Solanki (United Kingdom). Selected papers from the conference will be published in a special edition of Fusion

DESIGN Canberra celebrated the architecture of John Andrews, collaborating with Tim Ross, the creator of the award-winning ABC TV series *Streets of your town*, on an exhibition featuring a documentary film commissioned for the project. In collaboration with DESIGN Canberra, *Axon* journal also published a special edition honouring the work of the late

Enrico Taglietti (1926–2019), based on curated content from the 2018 festival.

Craft ACT's collaborative research project with University of Canberra Faculty of Arts and Design, supported by the City Renewal Authority through their City Grants program, culminated in the experimental Dark Crafts Pavilion that formed the centrepiece of the festival hub in Civic Square. The pavilion explored digital knowledge combined with traditional making practices. Computational design techniques, bespoke robotic fabrication, and extensive material knowledge was successfully employed by the pavilion's design team from the Faculty of Arts and Design. The multidisciplinary team of industrial designers, architects and makers enthusiastically embraced the transformative affect of emerging technologies on design practice and production.

The foundation of these successful projects is the generous support of our research partners and sponsors, whose vision and encouragement continue to inspire us.

Professional development

To better support members, Craft ACT presented expanded professional development programs to build capacity, new skills and provide access to professional services.

In 2019, Craft ACT ran an open studios professional development workshop with Richilde Flavell (Girl Nomad Ceramics) and glass artist Harriet Schwarzrock. Both artists have many years experience running popular open studios and were able to offer valuable insights, tips and advice to open studio participants, particularly those holding their first event.

To celebrate the range of beautiful handcrafted work being created in Canberra, and nurture Canberra's talented emerging artists, Craft ACT: Craft + Design Centre presented the 'Ready set market!' program after a successful pilot in 2017. 'Ready set market!' offered a solid foundation for budding production makers, through a series of intensive workshops and step-by-step support in a small group over five months. Lea Durie (ceramics), Kirandeep Grewal (textiles), Ellen Rosalie Gunner (textiles) and Robert Schwartz (glass) were supported to develop market skills that prepared them to promote their brand and sell their work in one of Australia's leading design markets, Undercurrent

Design Market at the National Portrait Gallery, Canberra. Leading stylists, photographer and makers presented the workshops including:

- product development with glass artists, Lisa Cahill, Harriet Schwarzrock and ceramist Richilde Flavell
- crafting your brand with artist, designer and facilitator Yasmin Masri
- product styling and photoshoot with photographer and stylist Anisa Sabet
- market-stall presentation by Sydney based prop stylist Lynsey Fryers

Considering the importance of beautiful images recording any maker's practice, Craft ACT facilitated several studio sessions with photographer Brenton McGeachie. Each session was well attended by members and provided several print-publication and online quality images.

To develop skills in presenting to the public, established accredited professional members Janet DeBoos and Sharon Peoples hosted floor talks for the annual members show, *Visionaries*. This gave early career makers the opportunity to learn from experienced members about how to communicate ideas, processes and craft skills to the public.

Public programs

Craft ACT continued its partnership with ACT Parks and Conservation Service and established a research partnership with ANU Research School of Astronomy & Astrophysics (RSAA) in support of the 2019 artists-in-residence program. The 2019 artists-in-residence, Sean Booth (metals), Michelle Hallinan (paper), Rohan Nicol (design), Sabine Pagan (metals) and Megan Watson (paper/textiles), spent April researching at Mount Stromlo Observatory and staying at Gudgenby Ready-Cut Cottage in Namadgi National Park. The artists also presented informal workshops during the annual open day at Namadgi National Park to encourage visitors to look closely at their environment. An exhibition of the artists' work responding to the residency will be held in the Craft ACT Gallery in early 2020.

Due to the growing popularity of the artist-in-residence program, Craft ACT again offered a spring retreat, supported by ACT Parks and Conservation Service. Elizabeth Paterson (paper) and Annika Romeyn (paper) spent 10 days immersed in the Tidbinbilla Nature Reserve environment at Corin Cottage.

Embed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander craft and design practice in Australian arts and culture

Craft ACT: Craft + Design Centre acknowledges the Ngunnawal people as the traditional custodians of the ACT and surrounding areas. We honour and respect their ongoing cultural and spiritual connections to this country and the contribution they make to the life of this city and this region. We aim to respect cultural heritage, customs and beliefs of all Indigenous people.

As part of our ongoing commitment to supporting Indigenous craft and design, Craft ACT encourages participation from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists across all our artistic and public programs, including exhibitions, the artist-in-residence program, DESIGN Canberra and retail opportunities.

Participation

In 2019, Craft ACT displayed a selection of skilful and evocative work by seven talented Indigenous artists who participated in Craft ACT's Indigenous Craft + Design Workshop program in collaboration with the Indigenous Jewellery Project, Kemarre Arts and ANU School of Art & Design. The workshop and exhibition were possible thanks to generous donations to a crowdfunding campaign with dollar-for-dollar fundmatching by Creative Partnerships Australia. The Australian Institute of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Studies (AIATSIS) committed to purchasing the pieces created during the workshop for their collection.

Craft ACT extends warm thanks to Cheyne Halloran (Ngunnawal), Cultural Consultant, for his Welcome to Country at Craft ACT's Cupped hands opening and the Object Subject conference. We also extend gratitude to, Jude Barlow (Ngunnawal), Chief of Staff at AIATSIS, for her moving Welcome to Country at the VIP launch of the DESIGN Canberra festival. In profile Jefa Greenaway:

Jefa Greenaway is the Director of Greenaway Architects, with more than two decades exploring the intersection of engagement, Indigeneity and the built environment across private, commercial and educational projects. Jefa is also a lecturer at the University of Melbourne, focusing on Indigenous curriculum development. His project Ngarara Place was exhibited in the Australian pavilion at the 2018 Venice Biennale, he is the founding chair of the not-forprofit advocacy group Indigenous Architecture and Design Victoria, and he is co-author of the award-winning International Indigenous Design Charter. Jefa has been selected, alongside Tristan Wong (SJB) and team (Elizabeth Grant, Tim Ross, Aaron Puls and Jordyn Milliken), to be creative director for the 2020 Venice Biennale Australian pavilion.

Jefa Greenaway was a ketnote speaker at the Object Subject conference, delivering a paper: "An Indigenous Voice to Architecture".

In profile Krystal Hurst:

Krystal Hurst is a Worimi artist and Creative Director of Gillawarra Arts, originating from Taree on the midnorth coast of New South Wales. Krystal is a jewellery designer, painter, printmaker and workshop facilitator whose art practice is centred on 'a way of being' whilst reinvigorating and strengthening culture. Her inspiration derives from Country, memories, stories and community integrated in an innovative and contemporary way.

Krystal specialises in contemporary Aboriginal artworks on canvas and murals and she is an experienced workshop facilitator. She has been commissioned to create artworks for many government, non-government and community organisations as well as supporting fundraising initiatives. Krystal was awarded ACT NAIDOC Artist of the Year in 2017 and was recently featured in the Indigenous women in business Morning Sky Project.

Krystal's Bubble ring (oxidised silver) featured in UTOPIA: DESIGN. AUCTION. PARTY., giving design-lovers the chance to invest in a piece of contemporary Canberra design. Krystal was a finalist in Telstra National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Art Awards for her work from Craft ACT's Contemporary Indigenous Craft + Design Project.

Goal 3: Access

Ensure more audiences have access to, and engage with, Australian craft and design

Participation and attendance

Craft ACT promotes excellence and innovation in contemporary Australian craft and design. Our primary outreach program, DESIGN Canberra, develops new and expanded audiences every year, forging marketplace connections and providing a source of inspiration and collaboration to makers, audiences and industry. Visitors to DESIGN Canberra have grown year on year, with 2019 seeing a record attendance of 114,770 people. Of this, 61 per cent were repeat visitors, and 96 per cent intended to return in 2020, a fantastic indication of audience retention. With a record 90 per cent of events being free, the 2019 festival was the most accessible yet. DESIGN Canberra audiences proved to be highly engaged with an impressive 41 per cent attending four or more events and many now familiar faces attending more than 10.

Increasing interstate visitation remains an ongoing challenge and goal of the festival. While most audiences were from the Canberra region, 38 per cent of interstate

visitors travelled to Canberra especially for the festival and, of those, 86 per cent stayed for two or more nights.

The theme of the sixth annual DESIGN Canberra festival was 'utopia' - a tool to imagine a perfect place, to think about what is important to us and how creativity can help us achieve it. With her acute sensitivity to the materiality of metals and her celebration of the last century of modern and contemporary jewellery design, contemporary jeweller, Phoebe Porter, was a natural choice as the DESIGN Canberra 2019 designer-in-residence. Strongly influenced by the Bauhaus and constructivist movements, Phoebe's signature artwork Elements of balance captured the spirit of the theme and through the collaboration with festival partner Icelab and graphic designer Mat Colley (Foundry) informed the look and feel of the festival.

The festival continued to build on its popular foundation programs, including the opening weekend auction party, open studios, 'Living

Rooms', competitions, 'Design Diplomacy' events and bus tours. Building on the utopian theme, DESIGN Canberra shone a spotlight on architect John Andrews' 'aggressively utopian' designs which place him in a unique category of architectural prominence. Andrews' bold group of projects in Canberra — including Cameron Offices and Callam Offices — are key in the context of his internationally renowned practice and were celebrated in a public conversation with Tim Ross, bus tours, exhibitions and a photography competition. Inspired by a call to action from the ACT Government's City Renewal Authority and supported by their City Grants program, Civic Square was transformed to become the dedicated site for talks, entertainment, performances, art, wellness and ideas during the DESIGN Canberra 2019 festival. The centerpiece of Civic Square was a large painted ground mural RE/CONSTRUCT by Megan Hinton, an illustrated map by Peita Blythe and the monumental University of Canberra Dark Crafts pavilion. The designs created a dialogue between

the ground plane of Civic Square, it's fascinating history, and a remarkable program delivered by DESIGN Canberra and its partners, close to the Craft ACT headquarters.

Over by the lake in Commonwealth Place, MEDUSA by Berlin-based Plastique Fantastique revitalised the waterfront inviting the citizens into the creative process with a range of programs over three days. MEDUSA became an incubator for gatherings, events, actions and anything else the local community brought to the installation. Similarly, Plastique Fantastique's Twin Minigagarin inhabited the Canberra Airport departures foyer, where travellers from all over the world could rest inside as if they had stopped over at a space station during their journey. The futuristic look of Twin Minigagarin invited people to enter, have fun and be active in public space and Canberra's Instagram community captured beautiful images of the experience. Plastique Fantastique participated in the DESIGN Canberra festival thanks to

generous support from the Capital Airport Group, Goethe-Institut and the Delegation of the European Union to Australia.

Striking a balance between incidental, accessible and deeper engagement is always a goal of the festival. Object Subject, the national design conference, called on the design sector to take seriously their social, environmental and ethical responsibilities. Thought-provoking content and timely conversations from the conference generated critical and creative thinking and ethical creative practice. International and national speakers included: awarded Australian singer, writer, director, and advocate Robyn Archer; Indigenous architect, lecturer and advocate Jefa Greenaway (Australia); arts editor Jennifer Higgie (United Kingdom); craft curator and editor Kevin Murray (Australia); urban design researcher and editor of Assemble Papers Jana Perković (Australia); editor, writer and podcaster Clare Press (Australia); and experimental materials research

In 2019. DESIGN Canberra:

- Included over 250 events
- attracted 114,770 attendees, an increase from 112,844 in 2018
- Retained audiences, 61% of whom were repeat visitors
- Attracted ongoing interest with 41% of audiences attending four or more events
- Expanded interest and reached an audience of 1.9 million through strategic media coverage
- Generated over \$190,000 of income directly to artists and designers, an increase from \$177,000 in 2018

In 2019, we also saw a deepening of relationships with the broader Canberra creative community and a real spirit of collaboration with 14 local arts organisations joining the festival as supporters, hosting workshops, exhibitions, talks, tours and open studios. Craft ACT is committed to supporting a vibrant and sustainable local arts sector and

was pleased to share the DESIGN Canberra platform with like-minded organisations and the artists they represent.

As always, the DESIGN Canberra festival would not be possible without the generous support of sponsors and funding bodies and these wonderful partners are listed in full on page 35.

International

Craft ACT continues to expand its reach onto the global stage, increasing international engagement through the exhibition program, artist-in-residence program, and DESIGN Canberra. A record 13 international artists featured in the exhibition program in 2019 with a highlight being the crosscultural collaborative project, Glass utopia, which featured the work of six Australian artists alongside six Italian artists and collectives. Curated by Milan-based design duo, Mr.Lawrence (Annalisa Rosso and Francesco Mainardi), this stunning

exhibition will travel to Milan Design Week and Venice Glass Week in 2020.

With an inspiring line-up of international collaborators, DESIGN Canberra strengthened Canberra's reputation as a global city of design. The Object Subject conference featured international keynote speakers Jennifer Higgie (United Kingdom) Lauren Kalman (United States) and Seetal Solanki (United Kingdom). The Helsinki Design Week collaboration, Design Diplomacy, returned for a second year, featuring guest speakers Paolo Stracchi (Italy), Matteo Vigotti (Italy) and Yena Young (Germany). DESIGN Canberra enabled Craft ACT to continue building strong relationships with the diplomatic community in Australia through events at the embassies of Italy and Germany and our partnership with the Delegation of the European Union to Australia.

Fresh from the Venice Biennale, Berlin-based experimental architecture group Plastique Fantastique captured audience's

imaginations with their stunning pneumatic installations, *Twin minigagarin* (installed at Canberra Airport) and *MEDUSA* (installed on the Griffin land axis at Commonwealth Place on Lake Burley Griffin). Realised with the generous support of Canberra Airport Group, the Goethe-Institut and the EU delegation, these ambitious projects highlighted the international connections of the city.

Media

Craft ACT and DESIGN Canberra continue to be well-supported by local media, with particular thanks to Meredith Hinchliffe of *City News* and Kerry-Anne Cousins of the *Canberra Times*, for their ongoing interest and coverage of the exhibition program,

and the enthusiastic support of the *HerCanberra* team and *Garland* magazine.

DESIGN Canberra media coverage was once again managed by Melbourne-based public relations firm, Progressive PR. Building on the success of the 2018 campaign, DESIGN Canberra continued to benefit from an established relationship with the hardworking team and achieved impressive media coverage and reach with 268 unique earned media placements, an advertising space rate equivalent of over \$1.1 million and an audience reach of 1.9 million. Once again, Craft ACT hosted two interstate media 'famils' (familiarisations) with Green Magazine and Vogue Living,

both resulting in dedicated online coverage and a feature on Plastique Fantastique in *Green Magazine's*January issue. The festival was also supported by media partnerships with *HerCanberra* and *Dezeen*.

A DESIGN Canberra program preview event in September piqued the interest of a broad range of stakeholders including the Canberra Region Tourism Leaders Forum, festival sponsors, ACT Government, artists and media. A media launch event orchestrated in Civic Square on the first day of the festival (4 November) was well-attended by television, print, online and radio media.

Online and social media continued to be the most effective channels for promoting Craft ACT and DESIGN Canberra in 2019. Both DESIGN Canberra and Craft ACT enjoyed high levels of engagement and an increase in followers.

Active and targeted campaigns on social media, websites, the online shop and through electronic direct marketing (EDM) continued to deliver strong returns. A 36 per cent increase in e-newsletter subscribers, with a total of 78 newsletters sent was supported by Craft ACT's above-industry average newsletter open rate reaching an engaged audience of 5,584 subscribers.

Craft ACT has been fortunate to enjoy an ongoing media partnership with *HerCanberra*, which has been

instrumental in broadening the reach of the exhibitions and public programs and promoting talented members. Thanks also goes to Cassandra Layne, Isabelle Mackay-Sim, Elizabeth Page and Alison Seale for their thoughtful and engaging contributions to the *HerCanberra* website.

Given the increasingly competitive, complex and expensive social media landscape, a Craft ACT pilot program engaged The T!lt Agency to develop a digital advertising and ad buying campaign to reach an interstate audience for DESIGN Canberra. The results of the campaign were impressive with digital ads generating 3 million impressions and over 2,700 clicks. Video link ads generated over 1.4 million impressions and reached over 360,000 people, outperforming estimated figures.

Access and inclusion

Craft ACT aims to be a disability confident and competent organisation. We are working towards a more inclusive future where we can provide leadership in disability and access, support disabled artists, designers and audiences and implement good practice across all our programs and initiatives. In 2019, Craft ACT, with the assistance of an artsACT Community Outreach Grant, partnered with Accessible Arts, the peak arts and disability organisation across New South Wales, to development a Disability Inclusion Action Plan (DIAP) for 2019 - 2025.

Accessible Arts reviewed the organisation's internal and public documents, and consulted with senior staff, board members and members. Two surveys were undertaken providing the opportunity for input from members, staff, board members and volunteers. A group of artists with disability conducted a 'Walk and Talk' tour, visiting several venues used for events at the DESIGN Canberra Festival. The artists provided comments to Craft ACT about building/venue access and programming. Valuable feedback from the interviews, site visits and surveys was analysed and incorporated into the Plan.

Accessible Arts has also set up a reference group of artists living with disability to be consulted on future projects. In addition, Accessible Arts were commissioned to deliver access and inclusion training on disability for all current staff and board members. Learnings from this were rolled out during the induction of volunteers for DESIGN Canberra.

The next phase is to deliver against the DIAP. We will, in accordance with the principles of universal design and the social model of disability, seek to create a more equitable, diverse, and inclusive cultural environment and experience.

Craft ACT has built a reputation as a trusted, collaborative and creative partner to government, universities, retail, business, education and philanthropic sectors. Together, we sustain Australia's high-quality studio practice and support craftspeople, designers and audiences.

Craft ACT is supported by the ACT Government, the Visual Arts and Craft Strategy and the Australia Council for the Arts. This vital support delivered by artsACT has led a surge of optimism, expanded capacity and a field of new partnerships for DESIGN Canberra. We are grateful to the ACT Government including the dynamic City Renewal Authority for their investment in Canberra's craft and design community.

Craft ACT received increased support from the international community in 2019 including the Embassy of Italy in Australia, whose ambassador and staff have supported Craft ACT over the past few years through welcome encouragement, event support, introductions and advice; the Goethe-Institute; the Delegation of the European Union to Australia; and the visionary local team at Canberra Airport Group, Together, they supported a visit of the acclaimed installations of Berlin-based design team Plastique Fantastique soon after their successful appearance at Venice Biennale.





GENE WILLSFORD (1921-2019)

Gene Willsford was instrumental in the establishment of Craft ACT's Watson campus in the late 1970s, helping to design the building that is now the Watson Arts Centre. In fact, an early Craft ACT invitation template featured Gene's sketch of the Watson building. She was granted Life Membership in the early 1980s. The board, management, staff and membership of Craft ACT is sincerely grateful to Gene for her contribution to our establishment, our history, and setting us up for a bright future. We send our heartfelt condolences to Gene's family and friends.



JANNIE FAY SKYRING (1932-2019)

Fay Skyring was a weaver who played a significant role in the cultural development of our organisation, the ACT and the nation. Fav was instrumental in supporting Craft ACT by helping to set up exhibitions and volunteering her services within the community in all manner of circumstances. Fay continued her community involvement by curating exhibitions of ikat weaving (the first in Australia) and was involved with spinners and weavers guilds throughout Australia. Fay sat on numerous boards of governance including Craft ACT. Meredith Hinchcliffe, former Craft ACT executive director, remembers Fay's significant contribution to our community: 'Skyring practised her craft to a very high standard and inspired others to achieve their potential. She made a significant contribution to the development and recognition of weaving in Canberra and in Australia'.



Enrico Taglietti AO was an Italianborn Australian architect, known for designing a number of acclaimed buildings in Australia. In 2007, he was the winner of the Australian Institute of Architects Gold Medal. His contribution to architecture is significant: his thoughtful detailing, aesthetics and sense of place have helped to shape Australia's national capital, home to the most ambitious and most successful example of twentieth-century urban planning in Australia.



Craft ACT paid tribute to the architect and his work, poetics, personal style and contribution to the nation's capital in DESIGN Canberra in November 2018. We were honoured to have received Enrico's blessing to present these programs and are grateful that the great man and his beloved family could attend and participate in so many of the programs to hear, first-hand, about his valued contribution to our city and our lives.
