Having trouble with retention on oily skin?

On oily skin, blot the brow area with Witch Hazel to dry out for better implantation and retention.

If you haven't tried Witch Hazel yet...pick up a bottle. It's inexpensive and it really does help with those oily clients! At the studio, we generally use T.N. Dickinson's Witch Hazel.

Oil acts as a barrier and diluent. When we dry up the oil...we remove the barrier and more pigment implants much better and easier. When pigment implants better and easier... less trauma to the skin and that makes for a much better heal and result!



I pre-cleanse with Alcohol, then I wet a cotton pad with Witch Hazel and blot the brows really good. I might even let it sit on brows for a few minutes if really oily.

Do you know what 3 things to look for when inspecting your needles?

Whether you use a Jewelers loupe or a pair of wearable loupes, knowing *what* to look for when inspecting your needles is the most important step. Here are three things to look for that will help you when inspecting your needles.

1. Look for bends in the needle tip.
Bends in the needle tip can be unseeable to the naked eye, which is why we use loupes to inspect our needles.

It's important to eye loupe each and every needle prior to using it to make sure it's in pristine condition. If we were to tattoo with a bent and damaged needle, it can rip and tear the skin, causing more unnecessary trauma to the skin.
