

Universal Grille Guard Installation Guide

 **Disclaimer:** This is a universal installation guide for aftermarket grille guards. Although it provides the basic procedure for the majority of bolt-on installations, there can be unique fitments for certain grille guards and vehicles. For detailed instructions, always check your manufacturer's manual or call your supplier for model specifications.

Tools You'll Need:

- Socket wrench set
- Torque wrench
- Screwdriver set
- Trim removal tools
- Safety glasses & gloves
- Jack and jack stands (optional for clearance)

Step 1: Get Your Truck Ready

- Park on a flat surface and apply the parking brake.
- If necessary, raise the front end and jack it on jack stands for greater access.
- Disconnect the negative battery terminal if your grille guard comes equipped with integrated sensors or lights.

Step 2: Remove Factory Tow Hooks or Plastic Covers

- Most grille guards use factory tow hook mounting points.
- Take off tow hooks with a socket wrench (keep the bolts – you can reuse them).
- In the absence of tow hooks, take away the plastic lower valance or cover panels where the brackets will be attached.

Step 3: Mounting Brackets

- Find the frame holes or tow hook mounting points underneath the front bumper.
- Mount the provided mounting brackets with supplied hardware or existing factory screws.
- Make sure both driver and passenger-side brackets are aligned and leveled.
- Leave bolts hand-tight at this stage – final torque will happen later.

Step 4: Attach the Grille Guard

- With a second person helping, lift the grille guard and line it up with the installed brackets.
- Bolt the guard to the brackets loosely using the supplied hardware.
- Adjust accordingly to bring the grille guard to the exact position of the vehicle.

Step 5: Tighten and Torque All Bolts

- Tighten all bolts to factory specifications using a wrench after aligning properly.
- Inspect all the connections, especially at frame mounting points.

Step 6: Reinstall Accessories (If Necessary)

- Replace any trim panels you removed.
- If your grille guard has lights or sensors, restore the wiring harness.
- Reattach the battery terminal if removed.

Final Check

- Give the grille guard a firm shake – it should not move or rattle.
- Take a short drive and recheck all bolts after 50–100 miles.
