INSURANCE & LICENCE

Be sure to get a copy of all insurance related to the job, typically workers comp and general liability.

If the contractor does not have a current license or insurance, it's time to move on.

CLUE





Let them prove they have the proper insurance by emailing or faxing a copy to you. That goes for any subcontractors too. If they aren't insured, and something happens on your property, you're on the hook.

SHOW ME THE WORK YOU'VE DONE



CLUE

No examples? No, go!

ACTION

Be sure they have verifiable samples of hardwood floor jobs. A lack of portfolio means they may be inexperienced.

Ask your prospective flooring contractor to show you some samples of his recent jobs.

REFERENCES PLEASE



If the references sound negative or wishy-washy, take it as a red flag and find another installer.





Always check references and give them a call. Previous customers should have no problem telling you everything about their experience with your prospective contractor. Remember to be polite. After all, they're helping you, a total stranger.

Always ask for references. Every experienced flooring contractor will have at least three you can call.

WHO WILL BE WORKING IN YOUR HOME







It's vital that you know who is supposed to be on your property. Since supervisors typically move to different sites throughout the day, be sure to have their contact info in your phone.

If three people are supposed to be working, and two or four show up, call the supervisor immediately.
