# Walkthrough of Manhattan's Chinatown

# **1 PEARL RIVER MART**

452 Broadway

Celebrating its 51st anniversary, Pearl River Mart was founded as a "friendship store" in 1971.

# 2 JING FONG

202 Centre St

Opening in 1978 with just 150 seats, Jing Fong moved in 1992 to its renowned two-story Elizabeth Street location, which sat nearly 800 people, the largest banquet hall in NYC Chinatown.

### **3 KAM HING COFFEE SHOP**

118 Baxter St

Known for their sponge cakes, Kam Hing opened in 1984, and since then has remained a favorite of both Chinatown residents and those from all over the city.

# **4** KK DISCOUNT

78 Mulberry St

Carrying "a little bit of everything that you might need at home," KK Discount sells carbon steel woks, rice cookers, shopping carts, mahjong sets, and more.

# **5 MOTT STREET EATERY**

98 Mott St

Opening in 2021, Mott Street Eatery is Manhattan Chinatown's first food court, offering 12 different food stalls.

# 6 CHINESE CONSOLIDATED BENEVOLENT ASSOCIATION (CCBA)

62 Mott St

The CCBA was founded by wealthy Chinese merchants in 1883, one year after the Chinese Exclusion Act was passed, and acted as a quasi-government helping Chinese immigrants.

# 7 CHINATOWN ICE CREAM FACTORY

65 Bayard St

Founded in 1978, the Chinatown Ice Cream Factory, with its wide range of Asian-inspired ice cream flavors, is popular among New Yorkers and tourists alike.

# 8 MANHATTAN BRIDGE + FORSYTH PLAZA

Forsyth St &, Canal St Situated at the foot of the Manhattan Bridge, which connects Chinatown to Brooklyn, Forsyth Plaza is a vibrant public space for events and gatherings.

# 9 LIN ZE XU STATUE AND MEMORIAL ARCH

23 Chatham Square
Born in Fujian Province, Lin
Zexu was a Chinese scholar
and official known for sparking
the First Opium War in 1839 by
seizing and dumping British
opium into the Guangzhou
Harbor. Nearby is the Kimlau
War Memorial, completed in
1962 and recently designated
as a historic landmark.

### **10 NOM WAH TEA PARLOR**

13 Dovers St

On Doyers Street is Manhattan Chinatown's oldest restaurant, which opened in 1920 as a tea parlor and bakery that served dim sum on the side.

### 11 TING'S GIFT SHOP

17 Pell St

A multigenerational family-owned business, Ting's Gift Shop is the oldest gift shop in Chinatown.

# **12 MEE SUM CAFE**

26 Pell St

Located on one of the oldest streets of Chinatown, Mee Sum Cafe has been serving up classic fare such as shrimp rolls, zongzi, spare ribs, and more since 1967.

# 13 TRANSFIRGURATION CHURCH

29 Mott St

Also known as the "Church of Immigrants," the Transfiguration Roman Catholic Church is the oldest landmark in this exhibition.

# 14 WING ON WO & CO.

26 Mott St

The oldest shop in New York City's Chinatown, Wing on Wo & Co isn't just a porcelain business but a vital part of the community.

# **15 HOP KEE**

21 Mott St

Current owner Peter Lee's father first opened this popular Cantonese eatery in 1968 after their family emigrated from Hong Kong.

# 16 YU & ME BOOKS

44 Mulberry St

The first Asian American woman-owned bookstore in NYC, Yu & Me Books showcases diverse voices and immigrant stories not typically seen in other bookstores.

# **17 COLUMBUS PARK**

Mulberry Street &, Baxter St Columbus Park is located in one of the oldest residential areas of Manhattan. It is a place where the community can gather and feel at home.
