



MIDDLE C POSITION (with Bb)



"Look at these funny footprints! They're huge!" cried J. S. Bunny as he compared his foot to the shape in the cement.







Beethoven Bear chimed in, "Doesn't that movie have a song with a funny name? Super-california-delicious or something like that."







"Disneyland!" everyone cried. "I hope we get to see Winnie the Pooh," Beethoven Bear said. "And a princess," added Nina Ballerina.




