an Francisco interior designer Claudia Juestel, a tireless participant in and committee member of Dining by Design, an AIDS fundraiser sponsored by Elle Decor magazine, found herself at square one when her Christmas tree caught fire. It destroyed her entire Nob Hill apartment and the antique tableware in her collection.

"Everything was lost except a couple of bedside tables," said Juestel, who fled with just one heirloom painting from her Austrian homeland.


Undeterred, she found a condominium near Union Square in a 1925 Spanish Revival high-rise by architect John C. Hladik, allegedly built for Bohemian and Pacific Union Club members who needed discreet getaways.

Her new 780-square-foot, onebedroom space - smaller than what she was used to - prompted her to find multiple uses for every space. First, since the walls are of concrete, phone and lighting wires were concealed in soffits. Then, unnecessary doors were removed for a more open plan, and a remodeled galley kitchen now has twin galleys that share the dining area. In the bedroom, an antique armoire provides more storage than a built-in closet could.

While Juestel works in the open-plan living room, her assistant's "desk" is the glass-topped dining table.

The formerly sponge-painted walls are now vibrant shades of saffron and gold to highlight new objects, some bought at Cost Plus or directly from Asia and Africa.

"My ram's-head dining chairs are from India. I bought them for a client, who gave them to me after the fire," says Juestel, who makes her



dining room - the scene of many intimate dinner parties — work hardest of all.




