Option #1:


If one adult is available to supervise the child(ren) while they complete daily lessons, those lessons will be supplied by curriculum providers of your choice and the supervisor simply oversees. No teaching experience is necessary. (See the curriculum resource list below) Joining a co-op is highly encouraged. The annual budget for materials per child can range from \$50 - \$300 per year.

Option #2:

This can allow the parent to work a part or even full-time job if a trusted friend or grandparent can perform the role of supervisor the remaining days while learning at home. There may be small fees for group class programs. b. Locate a University-model school near you, if available. The University-Model "takes the best attributes of homeschooling and com-

National Association of University-Model Schools Most universitymodel schools hold on-campus classes two or three days per week, while the remainder of the week is spent in the "satellite" classroom-the home. Parents do the in-home lessons with their children, but certified teachers have prepared those lessons. Parents and teachers partner in each child's education. The time at home gives parents more time for imparting the values they hold precious. This model allows parents to maintain their God-given responsibility as teachers and leaders, while giving students an opportunity to achieve academic excellence. Micro Schools are similar to the above and are gaining traction among families who are dissatisfied with the quality of public school-
- ing options and cannot afford or do not want to pay for a traditional private-school education. These families want an option other than home schooling that will personalize instruction for their child's needs. A school in which students attend a couple days a week or a small school with like-minded parents can fit the bill. Micro-schools are typically a fraction of the cost of a private school and educate no more than 10 to 15 students at a time. week and do homework 2-4 days at home. Option #3:
