The Importance of a Biblical Worldview

We live in an increasingly chaotic world.

It seems as if everything we have believed about Christianity is being attacked to-day. And those of us sitting in the pews are crying out for answers that will help us make sense of life and rise above the confusion.

The good news is that our God does not want His children to live in confusion or fear, thus He has provided the answers that can bring clarity to our lives in His personal diary to us, the Bible.



To some who read this, there most assuredly are doubts regarding the above statement, and this is understandable. We live in a battlefield of ideas and it is difficult to know which ideas are true and trustworthy and which are not. The purpose of this series is to confront those ideas head-on as we compare and contrast God's IDEAS against those of the opposing world-views of today. In each the 12 categories of life that we investigate, you will find:

- 1. A summary of what the God of the Bible promises as blessings to those who follow His precepts, as well as the curses that must come to those who choose to live by another worldview.
- 2. A summary of the various opposing worldviews that permeate our world.

As we do so, we will reveal the main points of difference between each. We will weigh each of these worldviews using history, logic, and reality-based statistical examples of the results or consequences of following each worldview. We encourage everyone to not blindly trust our interpretations, but to examine for yourselves if the conclusions we are drawing from the evidences are true. This course is designed to develop critical thinkers.

A fundamental principle in this series is that <u>laws are necessary for life</u>.

Without law there is chaos. Simply consider for a moment the results if all traffic signals stopped working at rush hour!

Science has revealed over 20 Natural (physical) laws that govern the universe, and all are finely tuned to allow for life. If just one law was to go out of tune by even the tiniest fraction, all the other laws would collapse. The result would be no life!

This is a fact that cannot be ignored without consequences. Furthermore, in these videos we will demonstrate that the physical laws enforce the moral laws presented in the Bible.

This leads to the logical conclusion that there are

universal moral laws, as well as universal physical laws; and the moral laws are even more consequential when disregarded and disobeyed.

Therefore, whatever worldview one chooses to embrace must take into consideration the fixed laws that govern life. To ignore the power and consequence of the universal physical and moral laws is to live in a fantasy world outside of reality.

Our claim is that the Bible contains the Moral Laws that, when obeyed, give life.

What is a Worldview, and Why Does It Matter?

In this first video, you will clearly see that all worldviews (and the cultures that are framed by those worldviews) are not the same. Worldviews are composed of ideas; and ideas - when embraced – will lead to moral choices that will have consequences, either positive or negative.

We will begin by displaying the Biblical blueprint for a successful worldview, followed by examples of what happens when that blueprint is lived out in a nation. We will then define the ideas that make up the basic worldview found in America today, along with the results that have proceeded from those ideas.

Over the last 5 decades, Christianity has taken a beating in the western world. Our faith and our God have been accused of being the source of all the world's problems. This lie has been repeated for so long without opposition in our state education system and in the media that most people believe it to be true. After watching this video, we are confident that both Christians and unbelievers will view Christianity's influence over our world in a much different light than that which the world has painted it to be!

As the saying goes, we can choose our own opinions but we can't choose our own facts. Living in a fantasy world cannot be sustained. Sooner or later the illusion will be exposed and only the consequences will remain. It is much wiser to choose carefully those ideas we will build our life upon... and live in reality.



Session 2: Day 1

The Christian Worldview of History



Read the following section before watching the video of session 2.

istory is either of extreme value, or it is of no value at all.

We live in an era where history is often re-written for the purpose of achieving a personal or political agenda. Today' modern ideology states that the only thing we learn from history is that nothing can be learned from history. Those who hold to this viewpoint might simply say that history is random and unguided – just like evolution.

The Christian worldview is quite the opposite. The Bible views all history through the eyes of God. All history, therefore, is HIS-story. Our God is the AUTHOR of all history. He has a plan and He is working it... through us!

With this in mind, the foundation for our worldview of history is the Bible. Thus, we will begin by considering the proposition that the Bible is a SUPERNATURAL source of truth and knowledge; and as such, it is absolutely reliable as our basis for true history. As we investigate this principle, we will compare the reliability of the Bible alongside the most highly revered secular writings in all of history. How does the Bible stand up?... We'll see.

Next, we will consider the proposition that God is still as INVOLVED in the lives of His people today as He was in the times of the writing of the Bible.

Our purpose in this class is to awaken the church to the reality that our lives are playing an active part in God's plan whether we acknowledge it or not; and on That Day when we meet Him face-to-face, we will be rewarded or reprimanded accordingly for our participation in His plan.

Is our knowledge of history valuable and even vital? Yes!

Can our knowledge of history protect us from repeating the same mistakes of generations past? Absolutely!

Will that knowledge lead us to wiser choices for our future? You can count on it!

Yes. HIS-story is worthy of our study!

The people could easily be manipulated by those who are being deceptive. We can then be controlled and kept ignorant of the effects of the ideas that history has proven to be harmful to us.

Examples abound in today's school system regarding the true history of Christianity's influence in the world and

America's founding fathers; the history of socialism, abortion, traditional marriage, homosexuality, "free speech" rights; the history of the civil rights movement, etc.







The church is the living representation of Christ on earth. When the church adopts this attitude of history,
the world loses the priceless knowledge of God's works in the past that brought us to where we are today.
Without that knowledge of the past, we lose the power of working with God today to affect life in the future.

opposing God's will, inhibiting the people from knowing God's joy, and are not to be promoted.

Also, this right (the pursuit of happiness) can be traced to the principle of the Sacred Rights of the Conscience

which God has planted in every man's heart and which he should never be forced to violate.

Session 3: Day 1

The Christian Worldview of Theology



Read the following section before watching the video of session 3.

Every worldview always begins with our view of God.

- Is there a God, or does evolution guide all life?
- If there is a God, what is He like?
- What does He like? What doesn't He like?
- What does He say is right? What does He say is wrong?
- *Is He personally involved in this world, or not?*
- Are we accountable to Him; and if so, to what degree?

Even among those who claim to not believe in a god, it is impossible to live without one. Why? Because a god is simply defined as who or what occupies the central place of importance in your life. Thus, a god can be you, your car, your looks, your favorite sports team. Or it can be something that impassions you, such as politics, the environment, or the natural universe. God is whatever idea or entity we make the center of our life.

We may worship one – or many – gods in our lives. In other words, we may place several "god(s)" on pedestals

around which our lives revolve.

Our theology – our view of god - determines our religion, even if we say we aren't religious. This is because a worldview is the same as an ideology or a religion: all are defined by the ideas we embrace and consider to be true and valuable.

An important principle to contemplate is that all the world governments revolve around the dominant religion of that culture, to one degree or another.

The question is, who or what is the center of your life? Who or what is your god? And will he/it lead you to prosper in life, or fail?

Let's compare the worldviews/religions of the day and see which makes sense to live by – or not.

Because this verse states that the physical universe will pass away someday, but His Words will always remain, it is obvious that his Moral Laws carry far more weight. We can violate the physical laws

with sometimes no consequences at all; but if we violate the moral laws there will always be consequences, both in the physical world (though not necessarily immediately) and in the spiritual world.

9. What physical consequences may come from disobeying God's Moral Laws?

Carrying the internal guilt can cause anxiety that the body will suffer from.

If we steal, lie, or murder, we may suffer imprisonment or death.

If we covet property that others have, it can lead us to stealing from or injuring another - which can lead to penalties suffered as a result.

God clearly states that everyone born has been given knowledge of God (con-science means "with knowledge"), by God Himself. Therefore no one can, in truth, deny His existence.

The conscience tells us all that stealing, lying, murdering, coveting, committing adultery, and dishonoring parents is wrong. It condemns our hearts when we do those things

How Can We Know God?

General Revelation

He is revealed generally in **CREATION**.

It reveals the glory of God. Creation confirms in the material world what God's Word reveals in our understanding.

5. What are some results if one chooses to not believe in ALL the words of the Bible?
We will miss the mark. We can fall into a ditch of errors that will bring heartache and sorrow to
ourselves and others. We will choose which words we agree with and which words we don't. When we
look at the Bible that way, we are making ourselves judge and jury of God's words. Why even have a Bible?
It really is all or nothing.

What is the God of the Bible like?

God is Ruler

1. He is King of kings and Lord of lords. Read Exodus 6:6; 7:5; 10:2; Leviticus 18:4; Matthew 7:21, and Isaiah 45:5-6. What does God mean when he says: "I am the Lord?"

He is the only God, the One we are called to obey

2. **He is everlasting.** *Read Nehemiah 9:5; Psalm 41:13; 90:2; 145:13, Hebrews 13:8, and James 1:17.* What assurances and strengths can we receive from these passages?

Because He has always been, and forever will always be, we can count on Him to be forever good, true, righteous, compassionate, and present.

3. **He is omnipotent** (all-powerful). *Read Genesis 1:1; Exodus 9:16; Joshua 4:24*. How shall we respond, knowing how powerful He is?

God showed His power in Pharaoh – the most powerful man on earth at the time – by humbling him. It is better for us if we humble ourselves! Maintaining a healthy fear of God is the beginning of wisdom – remembering who He is and who we are not. We are to praise him with a grateful heart because we don't deserve His grace, mercy, and love.

4. He is omniscient (all-knowing). Read Job 21:22; 37:16; Psalm 19:2; Proverbs 3:19-20; 10:14; Daniel 2:21; Luke 8:10. What do these passages say about God's knowledge?

There is nothing that can be known that is outside of Him. All the universe shouts out the glory of His brilliance and wisdom. All the universe was made by His wisdom and knowledge. He controls the seasons, the rulers, he is the giver of all wisdom. We can never attain His knowledge ourselves.

5. **He is omnipresent** (present everywhere and at all times). *Read Jeremiah 23:24; Job 34:22; Isaiah 29:15; Psalm 139:7.* Why might knowing this bring fear to some, and comfort to others?

There is nowhere we can go out of His sight – not even in the darkest places. Even our very thoughts are known by Him. This is frightening to those who are lost, but immensely comforting to those who are found!

God is Righteous

1. He is Holy, Perfect, always Right, always True, always Good. The word "Holy" means set apart. Set apart from what?

Anything that is joined to Sin, darkness, and evil. He is set apart from doing or saying or even looking at anything that God defines as sin in his Word

2. *Read Isaiah 6:1-5 and Revelation 4:1-11*. Here God is praised as being Holy, Holy, Holy. If you were there in each of these situations, what do you think would be running through your mind?

(Personal responses) Ex: I'm NOT Holy or worthy to stand in His presence! "Maybe if I beg for mercy,

He'll grant it to me –that's my only hope."

God is Relational

- 1. Read Genesis 2:18; 5:24; John 3:16; Hebrews 13:5. How do these scriptures testify to a relational God?
- 1) God cared that man was lonely, so He did something to remedy it. 2) We can walk with God.

How does the God of the Bible compare to all other "gods"? The Humanist Manifesto I (a partial list of their beliefs)

- Religious humanists regard the universe as self-existing and not created.
- Humanism believes that man is a part of nature and that he has emerged as a result of a continuous process.
- We are convinced that the time has passed for theism, deism, modernism, and the several varieties of "new thought".
- (As man evolves...) there will be no uniquely religious emotions and attitudes of the kind hitherto associated with belief in the supernatural.
- Man will learn to face the crises of life in terms of his knowledge of their naturalness
 and probability. Reasonable and manly attitudes will be fostered by education and

supported by custom. We assume that humanism will take the path of social and mental hygiene and discourage sentimental and unreal hopes and wishful thinking.

• ...A socialized and cooperative economic order must be established to the end that the equitable distribution of the means of life be possible. The goal of humanism is a free and universal society in which people voluntarily and intelligently cooperate for the common good. Humanists demand a shared life in a shared world.



1. What does Humanism believe about God? He is a myth, and a crutch, for the weak and unintelligent

2. State at least one logical positive or negative result in a person's life if he/she embraces this worldview?

He will be his own god and have no supernatural, all-powerful Father to guide and watch over him.

He will have no absolute Truth to instruct him to determine right from wrong. He will miss out on the

blessings that come from following Christ's example of putting others first (it is more

blessed to give than receive). There appears to be nothing positive.

3. From the video and the highlighted beliefs of Humanism above, can you explain what relationship religion has with politics and education, if any?

Politics and religion are both belief systems that determine what is moral (right or wrong). The ideology that proceeds from each will form the basis of the education system that comes from it. Since the politics of a nation are an extension of the religion that dominates that nation, the education system will follow whatever religion dominates the political.

Today in America, Humanism is the primary religion that dominates our political system, which, in turn, rules over the education system.



 - 2. Science will show no constraint in their experiments to "be like God"

 - There will be no foundation for unchanging law. Justice will be dependent upon which judge rules.


What significance does this have and how might this affect us today?

Islam

Islam is a monotheistic religious faith that developed in the Middle East in the 7th century. Islam, which literally means "surrender" or "submission," was founded on the teachings of the Prophet Muhammad. The Quran, the sacred text of Islam, contains the teachings of the Prophet that were claimed to be revealed to him from Allah. Essential to Islam is the belief that Allah is the one and true God with no partner or equal. Islam has several branches and much variety within those branches. The two divisions within the tradition are the Sunni and Shi'a, each

of which claims different means of maintaining religious authority. One of the unifying characteristics of Islam is the Five Pillars, the fundamental practices of Islam. These five practices include a ritual profession of faith, ritual prayer, the zakat (charity), fasting, and the hajj (a pilgrimage to Mecca).

In the book titled "Unveiling Islam" (by Ergon and Emir Caner, page 118): "Allah's heart is set against the infidel (kafir). He has no love for the unbeliever, nor is it the task of the Muslim to "evangelize" the unbelieving world. Allah is to be worshiped, period. Any who will not do so must be defeated, silenced, or expelled. The theme is conquest, not conversion, of the unbelieving world. Allah has called the Muslim to make the name of Allah alone to be worshiped."

It should be noted that the Koran never defines Allah as a God of love.

The following scriptures from the Koran are just a small sample of the many which convey the same ideology to both the leaders and the common people:

Prophet, make war on the unbelievers and the hypocrites and deal rigorously with them. Hell shall be their home: an evil fate. (Koran 9:73)

Believers, make war on the infidels who dwell around you. Deal firmly with them. Know that God is with the righteous. (Koran 9:123)

1. In relation to rulership, describe Allah?

He is absolute ruler, but he rules alone. Submit or perish is the rule for survival. Because he rules alone, he has no understanding of mutual compassion or love.

2. Regarding Islam, what strikes you about the descriptions of Allah?

He is cold, insensitive, uncaring - even to believers. To unbelievers, he is full of terror and hate. There is no forgiveness (as we know it). If he was my father, life would appear endless work to please him, and it would not be fun!

3. "Even though Islam has proven that it is able to $\underline{\mathcal{D}} = \underline{s} \underline{t} \underline{r} \underline{o} \underline{y}$ civilizations, it has yet to $\underline{\mathcal{B}} \underline{u} \underline{i} \underline{l} \underline{d}$ one." Have you seen evidence of this in our world today? If so, give examples.

Iraq, Iran, Syria, etc are impoverished. Before Israel returned to the land, the Muslims had run the country into the ground. Much of it was a virtual wasteland. But within 20 years of Israel's return, it became one of the most lush, rich, and fruit-bearing nations in the world.

- 4. What dangers do we see proceeding from this worldview today? (Personal responses) For example:
- 1. The spread of terror, subjugation, and intolerance.
- 2. The overrunning of other nations with no regard for the people and customs of those nations
- 3. Great fear among the more peace-loving Muslims to speak up or stand up against those who live by terror
- 4. Tremendous intimidation among those who have different worldviews to comply and submit
- 5. Personal question: Why do you think Islam is growing at the rate it is?

Their religion encourages many children per family.

Per Wikipedia: Globally, Muslims have the highest fertility rate, an average of 3.1 children per woman—well above replacement level (2.1) due to young age of Muslims (median age of 23) compared to other religious groups. Separately, their growth appears faster because they force many to convert, submit, or die.

Buddhism

Main doctrinal principle: This life is suffering, and the only way to escape from this suffering is to dispel one's cravings and ignorance by realizing the Four Noble Truths and practicing the Eightfold Path, thus attaining Nirvana. Rebirth is one of the central beliefs of Buddhism. We are in an endless cycle of birth, death and re-birth, which can only be broken by attaining nirvana. Attaining nirvana is the only way to escape suffering permanently.

- Explicitly rejects a creator

• There is no god; or – IF there is, he is unknowable and uninvolved
Buddhists do not believe "God created man in his own image"But that Man has created "God" in his image.

2. If there is no formal "god" in Buddhism, and Nirvana is only attained by one's efforts; might it be said, then, that the individual becomes his/her own god? Why?
(Personal responses) Answers are subjective. It could be said that we become our own god because we
must "do things", i.e., work - for our "salvation"
3. Is Buddhism a Relational religion? Why or why not?
No. Nirvana is not a place like heaven, but rather an eternal state of being. It is the state in which the law of karma and the rebirth cycle come to an end. It is the end of suffering; a state where there are no desires and the individual consciousness comes to an end. There is no God to relate to; and if the
greatest "heaven" is the absence of anything other than what might remain of self, it personifies aloneness.
4. Buddhists believe that Life is an <u>I I I u s i o n</u> . Therefore, the people are <u>I N d i f f e r e n t</u> to issues of the world.

Hinduism

induism claims to be the world's oldest religion. It has no human founder. It is a mystical religion, leading the devotee to personally experience the Truth within, finally reaching the pinnacle of consciousness where man and God are one. One can believe a variety of things about God, the universe, and the path to liberation and still be considered a Hindu. Most Hindus are devoted followers of one of the principal gods Shiva, Vishnu or Shakti, and often others besides, yet all these are regarded as manifestations of a single Reality. Perhaps the most well-known Hindu saying about religion is: "Truth is one; sages call it by different names."

Hindus believe in the existence of an enduring soul that transmigrates from one body to another at death (reincarnation); and the law of karma that determines one's destiny both in this life and the next.

1. If there is not a single source – or holy book – that defines what ALL Hindus believe, what problems might arise because of this?

Confusion, resulting in lack of unity within the society and among nations.

2. Imagine if there were many "gods", what problems might arise among those who followed them?

Again, lack of unity. Chaos would reign in the culture. Great divisions would exist from community-to-community.

3. Can a Hindu have an assurance of "heaven"? No What difference might that make in a person's life?
Hope would be short-lived. There would be no reason to live a "righteous life". Little incentive to
make a difference in the world.
4. What are the consequences of the caste system in Hinduism?
Poverty. Because the system offers little or no rewards or possibilities for advancement, it destroys
personal initiative to work and apply one's talents and energies for one's own benefit or for others'
assistance.
5. From the video and from your experience, what are the results/consequences of this worldview in the people and societies that have embraced it?
 Due to the caste system of the four set castes (which a member belongs to by birth, called "varnas"), Inter-varna mixing, is strongly disapproved; thus it is only appropriate for a Hindu to have a job suitable for their caste. Very little upward mobility is possible or allowed



 Both heaven and hell are on this earth while you are living. Based on your past karmas you create your own hell and heaven in this life. If you are leading a miserable life, you are in hell. If you have all the amenities of life and have achieved inner peace, you are in heaven, and
 - 2. Another point of view refers to the Vedas, Upanishads, the Bhagvad Gita and the Puranas and suggests that heaven or hell is situated somewhere up there.
