Kwanzaa originated in the African - American community in the

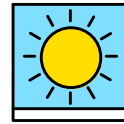
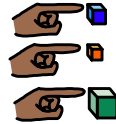
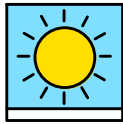


United States. Kwanzaa is a word that means " first fruits " in



the African language, Swahili.

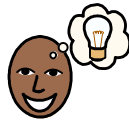

one of "The Seven Principles of Kwanzaa."

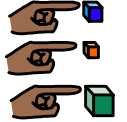


A family who celebrates Kwanzaa has a special candlestick, the

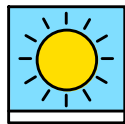
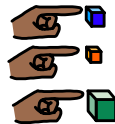
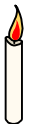
"kimara," with seven candles. The "kimara" is placed on a "mkeka,"



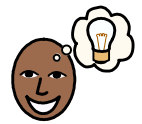
a straw mat. One ear of corn is placed on the mat for each

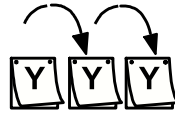
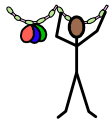




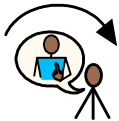
On the mat there is also a fruit basket, called a "mazao"



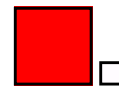
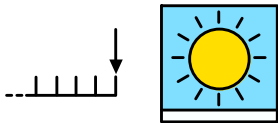

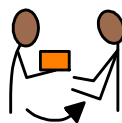
Families decorate their homes with traditional African crafts and
