1) Scavenger Hunt Board. Ahead of time, take pictures of animals and plants around your yard to create a scavenger board or use the one provided.

2) Arm the children. Arm the children with all the learning tools they need, magnifying glasses, clipboards, and pencils.


3) Off you go. Start exploring and see how many you can tick off your board.

TIP! Don't just race through trying to find everything all at once. Walk together around the yard, asking children to look and listen for different things. Stop at each find and discuss what you see, what is happening, and the importance of it in Nature's ecosystem.

TIP! It's also an opportunity to discuss enjoying nature safety (for example, look but don't touch spiders and insects and poisonous mushrooms).
