There may be many crosses in a church. We can first search for them and count them together to make sure that children understand the importance of this sign before we explain it.



Everyone says, "In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Amen."

Justin remembers what his grandmother told him: "The Father is God because he loves us as his children."

"The Son of God is Jesus," says Mia. "But what is the Holy Spirit?"

"That's more difficult to explain," Simon says. "The Holy Spirit is the power of God. The Spirit is like the wind that pushes us forward and gives us God's special help."

To make the
Sign of the Cross, begin
by touching the forehead (1),

Father." Then touch the center of
the chest (2) and say, "And of the
Son." Next, touch the left shoulder
(3) saying, "Holy." Conclude with
the right shoulder (4)
by saying, "Spirit.
Amen."
