SUPERMODEL, ACTRESS AND MOTHER

ON HER ICONIC CAREER, HAVING FUN WITH HER SON AND HER SURPRISING PLANS FOR THE FUTURE



You know what? I feel like I'm at the happiest and healthiest point in my life," says Monika Schnarre.

Serene, warm and friendly, the 51-year-old mom is as captivating as she was back in 1986, when she became the youngest winner of the Ford Supermodel of the World contest and experienced a meteoric rise during the industry's golden era, alongside the likes of Cindy Crawford and Christy Turlington.

"Looking back now, I can't believe all the things I did at 14 years old! But I'm so proud of myself because I was living and working in a grown-up world - and I made it on my own," says the woman who has graced the covers of Vogue, Elle and the Sports Illustrated Swimsuit Issue, to name just a few.

Thirty-plus years later, the Scarborough, Ont.-raised star has evolved her skill set, going back to school (UCLA), working as an actress (she's appeared in more than 50 films and television shows) and, more recently, using the pandemic to focus on a new endeavour, real estate – a passion she's quietly nurtured behind the scenes.

But Canada's first supermodel hasn't turned her back on her first love. Most recently, she lent her famous features and status to Lemonwood, a Canadian luxury sustainable lifestyle brand. "It was a natural fit," she says.
