We can get taken up with aspects of the gospel such as:
- being forgiven and cleared of guilt
- going to heaven when we die
these are important, but **not the main point.** 

These are not the reasons why Jesus invited anyone to follow Him or become a disciple.

These are wonderful parts, but they are NOT the objective.

The objective is that the Gospel of God reveals a righteousness from God that is by faith

This Leader's Guide is prepared to help the Study Group Leader to keep the discussions moving along. Maybe your people will come up with different answers, or perhaps they will need a little prompting from you.

Remember, you want to encourage your people to fully participate. This is not a 'teaching session' by the Group Leader, but rather a discussion group. The problem with sin is not just that it distorts my life, messes me up, makes me a slave, and leaves me with scars; the problem with sin is that

Sin provokes the wrath of God.

We will not understand the **Cross of Christ** apart from the **wrath of God.** 

The Gospel involves escaping the wrath of God and being restored to the righteousness of God.

All the wrath of God is channeled to Christ SO THAT
All the righteousness of God may be channeled to us.

# The Gospel of God from Romans Part 2 – The Wrath of God

Scripture: Romans 1:18 - 32

- 1. This quick study may well be difficult because we fear that talking about God's **Wrath** is not consistent with God's **Goodness** or **Love.**
- 2. It means **strong vengeful anger or indignation,** and no, we cannot soften the word 'wrath'.
- Man had knowledge of God, but did not retain it.
   So the issue was not intellectual but volitional man's will.

God had revealed Himself so emphatically in creation and in conscience that people were without excuse - and God was angry.

- 4. There is a 'natural revelation of God' available to anyone who will open their eyes and believe what they see. Consider this further.
- 5. Every effect has a cause.

  Behind this moving universe there is either a God, or it is all a fluke.
- 6. The world reveals intelligence, order, harmony and purpose which implies the existence of an intelligent being adequate to produce such a world.

Can you imagine how remarkable it would be if a hurricane blew through a junk yard, and after everything had settled down it had formed a 747 Jumbo Jet able to fly?!

The Universe is either an accident, or it is planned.

7. This argument states that we can only mentally conceive of things that actually exist.

When it comes to God, we are able to conceive the idea of absolute perfection and absolute power even though we have never seen them. We have never seen any equivalent of God, and yet we can conceive of Him, which, in itself is evidence such a God exists.

We cannot have a responsible society without laws. We cannot have laws without judgment. We cannot have judgment without punishment.

It is part of the dignity of being human that we are accountable not just to each other, but accountable to God.

The Gospel of God from Romans Part 3 – The Judgment of God Scripture: Romans 2 – 3

#### 1. There is a **Day Of Judgment** to come - a **Day Of God's Wrath**

This is not something to be either blasé nor cynical about. Judgment is both **necessary** and **logical**.

#### 2. 1. God's Judgment is Individual.

Repeatedly the Apostle Paul uses the pronoun 'you'; not 'we', 'us' or 'them'.

We can be very good at looking at the sins of other people and become oblivious to our own sinfulness.

Paul is very clear. To everyone to whom he was speaking, and to all who would subsequently read his words. **This is about YOU.** 

#### 3. 2. God's Judgment is Internal

We are good at examining the sins of the world, but **do not examine our own hearts**.

The sins of the world **MUST** drive us to our knees in **an examination of our own hearts** - not in condemnation of others.

We have to go **inside ourselves** - which can be painful, and takes courage.

- 4. If we have any hidden agendas, secret intentions or false motives all will be exposed; because it is the heart that is the real issue.
- 5. Paul's statements move from:

The Godless world out there ....
to the people of God in here ....
to the inside secrets of our own heart

#### 6. 3. God's Judgment is Impartial

The great danger is that God's people can develop a sense of elitism - putting ourselves above other people.

7. A sense of elitism and entitlement can soften our consciences and our behaviour.

The fact is: the sins of Christians are far more significant than those of the world at large because we claim to have the resources for a higher standard; therefore our failure is more acute. The world is aware of this.

#### 8. Concerning the universality of sin:

We stand Accused.

We stand **Exposed** to our innermost hearts.

We stand **Condemned** in our own sin.

But there is good news . . . Romans 3:21

# The Gospel of God from Romans

Part 4 – The Cross of Christ Scripture: Romans 3:21 - 31

 As we have been following through with these studies, we now come to a BUT NOW .....

This means there is another side to this story . . . something is going to change. Look again at the start of Romans 3:21

Something is going to happen, and it is from God; so we immediately know this cannot be of our own doing, and it is outside of any capability of ours.

- 2. How can God justly treat the wicked by vindicating them?
  [Note: When Paul speaks of 'the blood of Christ' he is speaking of the Cross]
- 3. The 4 things in this complex statement in these verses are:
  - a. All have Sinned.
  - b. All you have **Sinned MAY** be **Justified**.
  - c. It is a **Gift** of God's **Grace** through the **Redemption** that is in Christ Jesus.
  - d. It is made possible by His blood being a **Propitiation**

It is vital that we understand this word 'propitiation'. To propitiate means:

- i. to turn away wrath by satisfying its demands and requirements.
- ii to appease an offended person.
- 4. a. Who has been offended? It is God!
  - b. Who is going to address His wrath and satisfy His judgment? Christ!

Someone had to propitiate the wrath of God; and that someone was Jesus. Read 1 John 4:10

5. It is by faith ... to all who believe

It is by recognizing that we cannot save ourselves, and we must put our faith and trust exclusively in Jesus Christ.

It is **entirely by faith in Jesus Christ** - acknowledging that **only He** can save us.

#### **Final Thoughts**

What God will do for us is not **earned**, nor is it **deserved**, but it is to be **received as a gift**.

This is our experience of being justified and made righteous before God.

Salvation is not related to what we can earn or what we deserve.

Justification is not God's response to our self-righteousness,
our zeal, goodness or religiosity.

It is a gift that has to be received by faith.

For everyone here reading this God is as big as you let Him be,

There may be many different needs, but:

Is the God you trust - the God who gives life to the dead/ Is the God you trust - the God who call things that are not as though they were? Is the God you trust - the God who has the power to do what He has promised?

If your faith is in Him; then trust Him Allow Him to work through you as only He can.

# The Gospel of God from Romans Part 5 – The Experience of Justification by Faith Scripture: Romans 4:1 - 5 & 16 - 25

1. To any first time reader of the New Testament it will become very evident that a key component to this message is that **we need to exercise faith.** 

Read Hebrews 11:6, and Romans 14:23

But what is that? What does it mean? How does it operate?

2. On previous studies we have already looked at:

The Righteousness of God.

The Wrath of God

and then the Judgment of God.

And then read Romans 3:25 how Jesus Christ was the 'propitiation' to satisfy the justice of God. as our substitute on the cross so that He might offer forgiveness and declare us to be justified

3. Using Abraham as an example in Romans 4:3 Paul presents this as **an instantaneous change of position.** 

Abraham believed God, and it was done. As simple as that.

However Abraham did not actually see the promised son for many years, but he believed in God's ability to deliver on His promise.

#### However read:

- v. 10 12 Abrahams justification was not because of his circumcision.
- v. 13 15 Not because Abraham kept the law.
- v. 16 The promise comes **by faith** so that it may be **by grace** that **God initiates** it; and it is **by faith** that we **receive it**.

This is our standing before God as a legal transaction, purchased and made possible by the Cross of Christ. But our justification is not just a Legal Transaction.

- 4. As mentioned before, Abraham's justification took place in a moment, but his experience of justification took a lot of living out.
- 5. So now see what verse 19 says.

What kind of God was Abraham trusting? - A God who is the antithesis to my trouble and need. Abraham was trusting in a God who gives life to the dead.

- 6. We wait patiently. As in the following verses
  - 4:18 Against all hope, we believe.
  - 4:19 Without weakening.
  - 4:20 Do not waver.
  - 4:21 We are fully persuaded that God has the ability.

That is the issue!
Being fully persuaded that God has the ability.

7. It was credited to him as righteousness because he was fully persuaded that God had the power to do what He had promised - NOT because God had the power to do what Abraham wanted.

The Gospel of God from Romans Part 6 – The Fruit of Justification Scripture: Romans 5:1 - 11

- 4. **2. We rejoice in our sufferings** Romans 5:3 Read and consider Philippians 3:10
- 5. So why is suffering a part of our Christian experience?
  - a. Suffering is a creative force. v.3
- 6. **b. Suffering matures** Romans 5:3 4
- 7. Because of time Charles was not able to include this in his sermon, but as it was part of his original notes we are including here in this study because it is important.
  - c. Suffering softens v. 5

#### Final Thoughts

#### Consider the full cycle of our salvation:

We have been justified through faith
We have peace with God
We have gained access by faith into His grace
We rejoice in the hope of the glory of God

#### Don't stop early in the process.

Are you rejoicing in the hope of the glory of God - not passive in your Christian life, but actively growing?

Are you rejoicing in suffering not bemoaning it, but embracing it as a means of making you more tender, patient and fruitful?

The Gospel of God from Romans Part 6 – The Fruit of Justification Scripture: Romans 5:1 - 11

Laying a foundation is not the same as constructing a building.
 If we start something we have to go on and develop it.
 In Luke 14 Jesus is actually talking about discipleship and the necessity of growth.
 This growth is not accidental or by osmosis, but it is deliberate and intentional.

2. We 'Rejoice'

There are consequences and growth on the basis of our justification.

And this causes us to: "rejoice in the hope of the glory of God."

"rejoice in our sufferings."

'rejoice in God through Jesus Christ."

- 3. There is an escalating list of privileges that come from being justified.
  - "..... we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ"

    Peace with God is nothing to do with how we feel, but rather has everything to do with our position before God. [Not to be confused with 'the peace of God' which has everything to do with how we feel because it has to do with the measure in which we entrust our situation to God
  - ii "..... through whom we have gained access by faith into this grace in which we now stand."Not only do we have peace with God, but now we have access to God which opens to us rich possibilities of our relationship with God.
  - "..... and we rejoice in the hope of the glory of God"

    God created us to be a physical expression of His own character, but if the essence of our sin is that we 'fall short of the glory of God', how can this 'hope of glory' be in us?

Read and carefully consider: Colossians 1:27 and Romans 8:30

It is a process continuing through the Christian life.

- 4. There is a popular theology today that sees no value in suffering, and looks for health and wealth as the blessing of God; but this is contrary to what Paul taught; that we should *'rejoice in our sufferings'*. Our sufferings are our friends not our enemies.
- 5. a. v.3 "... we know that suffering produces ...."

Yes, suffering is a creative force in our lives.

The New Testament understanding of suffering is something that is not avoided, but rather harnessed.

We need to recognize that God does deep things in people's sufferings. We learn a lot more from tears than from laughter.

6. If 'suffering produces', then what does it produce?

Well, suffering is either a positive creative force for good, or it is a negative

destructive force producing bitterness and anger.

Paul tells us that our suffering produces perseverance, which produces character, which produces hope. All good things.

7. We see some people, battered by circumstances, who become bitter, while others become beautiful.

Suffering can draw out the best in us, or it can draw out the worst.

It can draw us **to God**Or it can drive is **from God**- and soften us.
- and harden us.

What is important is not so much the nature of our suffering, but rather, our disposition towards it.
