

# Former college chairperson claims he has been vindicated of fraud accusations

The former chairperson of Tshwane South College Council, Themba Ncalo claims he has been completely vindicated of a fraud accusation by current Public Protector Advocate, Busisiwe Mkwebane as a result of her investigation into and corruption report on tenders at the Tshwane South College.

Nealo claimed to the Tshwane Sun that the public protector did not find any remedial action against him. He claimed "It is now clear that he who laughs last, laughs the best... the chickens have to come roost against the principal of the college and her syndicates who have violated the Public Management Act through allocation of illegal tenders, worth over 28 million rand. It is also a happy time for lecturers and workers who have been wrongfully dismissed by the principal of the college. The workers and lecturers have achieved major victory in terms of the Public Protector Report which orders the Minister of Higher Education and Training, Blade Mzimande to open a commission of inquiry to review illegal disciplinary hearings which led to the unfair dismissal, and also consider compensation accordingly. The Minister of Higher Education in fairness and accordingly, has 60 days to launch the commission of inquiry for the lecturers and workers to have a legal recourse to institute a lawsuit in class action of millions of rands. It is up to the Minister to choose as to whether he wants a hard ball game in favour of a thief masquerading as a principal, Nealo continued.

He added that as a vindicated former chairperson, in order to cleanse his name and integrity, he is launching legal action against the College and the Department of Higher Education and Training for an amount of R15000000. He said "According to the Public Protector Report, the Minister must suspend the principal and those involved with immediate effects."

involved with immediate effect The government must largely get involved and suspend the rest, and MEC of Education, Barbara Creecy and Minister of Basic Education, Angie Motshekga for failing the law and allowing corruption to flourish at the college. The Minister of Higher Education must disband it for its failure in fiduciary duty to take care of the council's financial affairs, Nealo said. "We have approached the Hellen Susan foundation to assist and ensure that the remedial actions, recommended by the public protector, should be binding and implemented in 60 days. The lectures and workers must prepare themselves and return to work and if not, they must occupy the office of the Minister of Higher Education because they would be justified to embark on such action," Nealo said. He added that there is a big lawsuit of R15 000 000 on the way. In 2011, I went to the public protector it has been a long wait for this report. "It is time that the assets that are in the name of Principal Joseph Chiloane and his corrupts friends are attached and the

money collected from the coffers of the College. The hawks have been waiting for the report



Most addicts relapse because they do not know what to do after rehab and this is a gap we plan to close. We are also working closely with the municipality to defeat this monster." she said.

Mishark Mahlangu from Tshwane North Outreach Development Centre which sased in Winterveldt said, "We train most of our youth in various skills to give them job opportunities. Our aim is to partner with the Tshwane Municipality to rein on all companies and businesses around Tshwane so that it becomes easier for our youth to obtain jobs within those companies at no cost to the youth. We also want to guide them during their in-service, internships and further trainines. As NGO's we are a better

vehicle that both government and business can use to develop youth while simultaneously helping them in the work areas."

Mongezi Thabethe of Entokozweni which is based in Mamelodi also reiterated the need for the forum. "Our purpose is to work in partnership with the Department of Social Development and the city of Tshwane to minimise the challenges facing our communities with regards to unemployment, inequality and poverty. We are better placed to address these challenges and also to help combat the challenges of drugs especially Nyaope. We are open to all NGO's who share the same vision and also welcome those newly established NGO's that require mentoring in our different areas" he said:

Atteridgeville following a shootout with the police on April 8.

It is alleged that the suspects have been involved in a number of incidents concerning taxi violence in Atteridgeville. Police Services Tracing Unit followed a tipoff when they spotted and pursued the suspects. Police spokesperson, Captain Agnes Huma was quoted saying, "We were told that five men were believed to be involved in many taxi violence incidents occurring in Atteridgeville. The suspects were spotted, in the morning, by the police, when a shootout ensued. One suspect was shot and wounded; two others were arrested while the other two are still at large. The suspects are aged between 25 and 37. A case of attempted murder has been opened at the Atteridgeville Police Station. The police will continue with investigations."

Police were conducting stop-and-search operations when a suspicious green car was spotted. After inspecting the car, the police found items amounting to R10 000, a laptop, a laptop charger and a car amplifier which they suspected could have been stolen. The police interrogated the suspects; who were then arrested because of unsatisfactory answers. The suspects are aged between 20 and 30. A case of possession of suspected stolen property has been opened at the Laudium Police Station. They will be held in police custody for further investigation. All suspects will appear in the Atteridgeville Magistrate's Court soon," Huma said.

Atteridgeville police spokesperson Captain Thomas Mufumadi told the Tshwane Sun that he is calling on the residents of informal settlements in Saulsville and Atteridgeville to stop taking the law into their own hands and work with the police, as well as with the community police forum of sector one. Residents need to stop practicing mob justice as they will be apprehended. 'Cases of mob justice will be

investigated... this month, we have arrested four people who were involved in such incidents. Residents must think twice before they act impulsively. Call the police instead to arrest the criminals, if they are caught. We are appealing to the residents to work with the police to end the scourge of crime in our community and stop taking the law into their own hands" said Mufumadi.

Commuters have yet again urged the Atteridgeville police department to patrol the area around the Saulsville Hostel Units, as without visibility from authority, they become easy targets for criminals who time their schedules to and from work.

Commuter Jamson Selemela told the Tshwane Sun that they are urging the police to increase their visibility at night and early parts of the morning.

"Many commuters are victimized, especially those who utilize the train as a mode of transport. It worries us that at this rate; along with thievery, rape & mortality rates will also increase... as

these criminals target vulnerable woman. We are urging the police to visit the dilapidated hostel buildings which criminals use as hideouts." Selemela concluded.

"We don't feel safe! Especially early in the morning when I am on my way to work via the road adjacent to the Saulsville Family Units Home. Criminals are on the prowl there. I appeal to the Atteridgeville police to patrol the area." said another concerned commuter, Pertunia Mazola.

When the Tshwane Sun tried to contact Atteridgeville police spokesperson, Captain Thomas Mufumadi, he was unavailable for comment.

# Man angered by false rape charges

49-year-old Jacob Mawasha from Atteridgeville claims he was falsely accused of raping his 13-year-old niece. He wants to know the truth, about who committed the crime he has now been acquitted for.

Jacob told the Tshwane Sun that in 2004, he was accused of this crime and arrested. He spent three months in prison. Thereafter, he was released on bail. The case went to trial and in 2006. he was found innocent. He said that he was accused of the crime because his sister-in-law did not like him, hence they always fought.

The charges against him have tarnished his image in the community because some people still think of him as a rapist, he said. All he wants is answers from his brother's wife as to why they accused him of such a horrid offence. Mawasha pleaded.

"In the past, I had a good relationship with my brother... but after he married his wife, our relationship started to change. We live altogether in my parents' home. They fight with me and uptil today, there is no peace! My brother, his wife and my niece have to provide me with answers as to why they accused me of rape. I was even found innocent in court. I can't find peace in my life unless I have answers. It has been a painful experience... I was falsely accused of being an evil person

who doesn't respect women in society," said Mawasha emotionally. He concluded that he wants the community to know that he is innocent and has been acquitted of the accusations in a court of law. When the Tshwane Sun tried to contact Jacob's brother, Victor Mawashe for comment, his phone was off.

# Drug dealer leaves residents incensed

Residents have expressed concern about a drug dealer who is selling Nyaope at the Atteridgyille Stadium Centre adjacent to the police station and they claim the police are doing nothing to make sure that this dealer is behind hars.

A resident who asked for anonymity and who lives close to the Atteridgeville Stadium Plaza said that the drug dealer in their area has been selling drugs for months and although they have reported him to the police no action has been taken against him. He claims that the drug peddler sells his wares in close proximity of the police station without any fear of the police. The unnamed resident furiously said, "The police know that people are complaining about these drug dealers but they are not making any efforts to make sure that these

dealers are off the streets."

He added that the reason their area has a high level of drug abuse was due to the police dragging their feet in arresting this dealer.

"We are also sick and tired of the drug addicts who are smoking nyaope at the Stadium Shopping Centre, which is also close to the Atteridgeville police station. We are appealing to the police to investigate that site because we suspect that there is also a drug dealer positioned in the vicinity, selling drugs to these addicts. I do not understand how the police can be oblivious to this," he fumed.

The resident further claimed the situation was proving that the police were ignorant when it came to drugs because they could be cleaning up the streets if they started with just one arrest. If an arrest were to lead to the source of the drugs then the scourge of drugs which is affecting parents of these drug addicts could be stopped.

He added, "We are frustrated as a community when we see drug addicts smoking their drugs adjacent to the police station because it means that the police are lax."

He added that drugs were a contributing



factor to the high levels of crime in the area.

Atteridgeville police spokesperson Captain
Thomas Mufumadi said the police would
investigate this matter adding that they have

arrested several drug addicts at the shopping centre.

#### Commuters utilizing the Atteridgeville Bus services are miffed as they claim that the buses are constantly late, in the mornings, causing them to arrive late at their workplaces.

Many commuters were already unhappy with increased ticket fares which took effect some months ago. According to them, these bus services take advantage due to a lack of competitors in the area. Commuter, Jane Masemola, claimed to the Tshwane Sun that some of the buses are not roadworthy. "We have received information that this year, the bus company is again going to increase ticket fares! It is already very difficult for us... over and above that, their drivers are very rude. Commuters have to stand up against the bus company or we will end up lossing our

jobs in the future. They don't care about customers; they are only interested in making money!" concluded Masemola. Another commuter, Marriam Letsoalo says that they raised the issue with the management; however, their complaints were swept undern the carpet. "The Minister of Transport needs to do something about this. Maybe only then will they pull up their socks and render genuine services. Government intervention is needed," said Letsoalo.

# Drug dealer infuriates residents

The residents of Saulsville have expressed their rage about a Nyaope drug dealer who has emerged on Maserumule Street. Residents claim that they are fed-up of the scourge of drugs in their community and appeal to the police to arrest these dealers as soon as possible.

A concerned resident who lives near the alleged drug dealer, told the Tshwane Sun that the dealer has been selling drugs for months and that complaints to the police station have been in vain. Many organizations such as the local drug-action committees have been sending memorandums to the police, urging them to take action but to no avail.

"As a community, we are frustrated! We even see drug addicts smoking their drugs adjacent to the police station... proving that the police are not determined to solve this problem. Drugs are contributing to high levels of crime, especially crimes such as burglaries which obviously affect the community," concluded the disappointed resident.

Atteridgeville police spokesperson, Captain Thomas Mufumadi said that the police are happy about the fact that residents are supplying them with information regarding drug dealers.

# Hostel residents rage on!

Hostel residents claim that they feel neglected by the council. They are sick and tired of staying in unstable houses which pose constant threats to their lives.

Hostel resident, Samson Maringe told the Tshwane Sun that they have been waiting a long time to be assigned proper houses. "The roofs of these old hostel houses can be blown away by strong winds. We have reported this matter to the council but to no avail. We also face threats of poisonous snakes and rodents as a result of unkempt long grass," added Maringe.

"There was a time when we had to kill a giant snake. We are appealing to our councillor to tend to the grass as it is neither safe for us nor for our children. Our council sends us from pillar to post in this regard. As hostel residents, we feel as if our opinions are overlooked. Our houses are complete, yet they remain unassigned to us," said another hostel resident, Ace Malatije.

Hostel residents who live in old houses are urging the council to supply them with mobile toilets as the ones they utilize now are roofless and broken, making it difficult to answer the calls of nature during inclement weather conditions. "shockingly the toilets are shared by both, men and women," another hostel resident exclaimed. When the Tshwane Sun tried contacting the Ward 63 Councillor, regarding these pressing issues, his phone was off.

# Leaking pipes not fixed in over a year

Hostel residents in Saulsville claim that a rusted pipe which supplies water to a water tank in their area has been leaking and water has been wasting for over a year. The residents are angry that these pipes having been leaking for so many months — while people were asked to reduce their usage of water.

A resident at the Saulsville Hostel, Lazarus Masingeta, said that he gets frustrated because water is being wasted daily while many people struggle to get water.

He said that if these pipes had been leaking in someone's yard, the Council would have been quick to fine or charge exorbitant rates!

Lazarus who was overly emotional said, "What makes us so angry is that we have reported this matter to the council but nothing is being done to alleviate this problem. The tax payers' money is being wasted and the hypocritical government officials who preach that people should save water are doing nothing to fix the busted pipe." He said he believes that the council is irresponsible in not dealing with this matter because he has reported it on numerous occasions to the municipality and although officials from the council visited the hostel and promised to fix the rusted pipes, nothing has been done to date.

Lazarus in desperation added, "The drainage inside our kitchen is also blocked and we have also reported this matter to the council but our complaints fall on deaf ears. There is such unnecessary wastage of water; it makes me cringe when I think that people are experiencing water cuts while we have so much unnecessary wastage." Another frustrated resident, Masemola



programmes. These programmes include Basic Firefighting Level 1 and 2 and First Aid Level 1, 2 and 3. The programmes are accredited and certificates are effective for between 2-3 years.

Lesego Matalane, Programme manager of Rearabilwe said, "A lot of institutions and businesses have approached us for assistance in training their staff in basic evacuation procedures and to help them establish policies around health and safety processes.

She added though, that for them to train staff effectively, they needed to partner with qualified training institutions such as KTI. Through KTI, the Rearabilwe Community Development Project is able to offer suitable health and safety processes and procedures to companies and businesses at minimal rates. Sharon Mabokela who is the training facilitator and coordinator at KTI stated.

'We offer these courses to ordinary individuals and youth, if they require it. Courses include, basic firefighting, first aid, policies and procedures towards health and safety programmes and even evacuation processes. We also saw a



need to train the communities around us since winter is coming and most of us will be starting fire to warm ourselves. These fires are the main causes of death and destruction within our communities so educating our communities will help minimise these and also help people to deal with emergency situations. Lesego Matalane further elaborated,

"We would like to partner with some of our government institutions. We have seen in the past that our police officers are placed in situations where they are ill-equipped to deal with people during evacuation processes and this is

sad. We expect too much from them, although most of them have not been through the most basic of trainings to be able to deal with these kinds of eventualities. We have sent a proposal to some government institutions to request to train people at no cost to them; however we do charge a minimal cost to cover overheads and the certification process. For further information interested people are encouraged to contact Lesego Matalane at their offices which are at Phase 5, Lotus Gardens.




