

# A is for ALPHABET

OBJECTIVE

To determine if students write A-B-C's in alphabet order and form upper/low case letters correctly. OBJECTIVE


To determine if students can write A-B-C's in alphabetical order and form upper/lower case letters correctly.

CHECK LIST

Display the alphabet.

Construct a class list of FIRST names in A-B-C order. (This list is also used in activity N.)

★ Check out appropriate books. (Starred items are always optional.)



### Introduction

This activity celebrates the 26 letters that allow us to communicate with one another. Read each letter on your alphabet chart while your students follow along. An alphabet should be visible for those who may need visual clues.

### **Activity**

Ask your class to write Aa, Bb, Cc, . . . Zz, in alphabetical order while you circulate with the Class Profile on your clipboard. Evaluate each child's knowledge of the alphabet and writing technique.

### **Extensions**

- ★ Line your class up in A-B-C order according to first names. Learn names in order. "Our A people are. . ."
- ★ Play "My Favorite Letter". In this guessing game you say, for example, "My favorite letter can be found in a small animal that says meow." Younger students stick to beginning letters. Older students use any letter in the word.
- ★ Share a story:

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
