From the 19th October — 19th November, Tactile Arts and Darwin Waterfront are partnering up to bring you a brand spanking new event like never before. Featuring art on a grand scale, suspended sculptures, paintings, yarn bombing and illustrations, where shopfronts form the canvas, and walkways make the gallery.

This new, exciting and interactive arts and crafts event features installations from local artists and local schools, showcasing some of the incredible creative talent in the Top End.

Encompassing 12 Waterfont locations from Hot Tamale to Adina Hotel, Crepe Escape to Stokes Hill Wharf; check out the map and follow one giant arts trail, providing entertainment, exposure and creative adventures, all in place over four amazing weeks!

... Tactile Arts...

Tactile Arts is one of Darwin's longest established member-based arts organisations, providing ongoing support for emerging and established artists and craftspeople in the Top End.

Their annual schedule of events includes year round back to back exhibitions, member shows, a vibrant workshop program, ever growing craft fairs and an artist-in-residence program.

Tactile Arts is located in the grounds of the Museum and Art Gallery of the Northern Territory, just five minutes from the centre of Darwin. With fully equipped studios, you can paint, screenprint, undertake silversmithing and jewellery making, throw clay on the wheel or construct your glass creation, finishing your work off by firing it up in the kilns.

The People's Choice Award winner will take home \$400 worth of Flight Centre vouchers.


Voting opens on Thursday 19th October, with the winning installation to be announced at the finale of the event.

At Darwin Waterfront's Skybridge entrance you'll find the Felt Leaf Jungle, featuring over 250 leaves created by local schools in collaboration with Tactile Arts.

Shout outs for these mini masterpieces go to St Johns College, Years 8 & 9 Art Classes, Polly Johnstone's Year 10 classes at Palmerston Seniors College, Miss Grills class and after school care at Jingilli Primary School.

...Installation 2...

At the bottom of the glass observation lifts, look up to see the Tutti Frutti Bat Colony, created by artists and art educators, Tiffany Okazaki and Korin Lesh. These Tutti Frutti Bats each hold iconic items that we love here in the Top End. Spot Pauls Iced Coffee, laksa noodles, fruit juice, ice cream, frangipani, as well as vibrant patterns and colourings reflecting the diversity of Darwin.

...Installation 3...

Also at the lower level lift entrance, next to Tutti Frutti Bats, you'll find local artist and art educator Amber Reid's hand painted installation Tropical Matisse. This work focuses on bright colours and simplified forms from nature, influenced by 1960s modernist art and design, including the paper cut outs of Matisse as well as tropical plants and flowers from around the Northern Territory.

Next up on the map is the yarn bombed Tropical Plant Wall, located at the entrance to **Curve Cafe & Bar**. This installation from local artist **Abbey Murray**, features over 250 pom pom plants in mossy jungle colours, textured greenery and splashes of bright yarn, complemented by hand painted poinciana seed pods and driftwood beads.

You will witness a whimsical tropical inspired window display, using the layering effect of 3D images, paintings, paper cutouts and paper machè sculptures, forming the Alice in Wonderland characters we all know.
