
Imagine That


Hey grown ups...

Turn an image into a jigsaw

Take a picture you like from a magazine or old book. Cut it into shapes. Stick each piece on some cardboard. Now give them to one of your friends so they can recreate the image. See if they can guess what it is first!



Did you know that pasta tubes make excellent necklaces? They do! Take some uncooked pasta and a piece of string long enough to work as a necklace. Thread the pasta tubes through it. Now, using paint, draw some patterns on the pasta such as dots and stripes. Leave to dry overnight. You can also make bracelets the same way, using a shorter string.



Be a hunter-explorer

Your house is filled with treasures ready to be found. Pick a few of them, such as a piece of jewellery, a book or a special treat. Hide them around the house. Draw a plan of the house and put crosses where the treasures are hidden. Invite one of your friends to find their exact location.



Make a magic book

Take a bunch of sticky notes or an empty notebook. On page 1, draw a sun at the top of the page. On page 2, draw it slightly further down. Repeat and repeat. On the last page, at the bottom, draw a half-sun. Now flip the pages and see your sun setting. Magic!





Be a lemonade seller

Take some lemons and cut them in half. Squeeze all the juice out of them into a large jug. Add 3 or 4 spoons of sugar, a few sprigs of mint and some ice cubes. Invite your friends and family to come and try your lemonade. Charge them 50p per glass and give the money to a charity or a homeless person.

Have a picnic indoors

Too rainy out there for a bite to eat in the park? No problem.

Take your picnic into the lounge instead! Set a picnic blanket (or a sheet), make some cheese or ham sandwiches, bring a bottle of fruit juice and start a game of I Spy. Picnic Day is saved!

There are 15 differences between these two scenes. Can you spot them?







SHAPE UP

Would you like to transform into an octopus? Here's how!

You will need: a paper plate, card, paint, a pencil with an eraser on the end, elastic





Cut the paper plate in half.



On the back of the plate, mark where you need the eye holes to be and cut out. Draw a curved notch where the nose will be and cut it out.







Paint the mask and set aside to dry.





On the card, draw eight tentacles.

different lengths!








When the tentacles are dry glue them along the bottom of your mask












Poke a hole in each side of the mask with a sharp pencil and thread a piece of elastic through. Knot to secure. Your mask is ready to take you on an undersea adventure!




A CAR MADE FOR RACING

You'll need to wait a while before you can drive a real car. But you can start training to be a racing champ right now with this amazing one! Make it, step into it and... ZOOOM!

You will need: a large cardboard box, two paper cups, ribbon or string, and paint.

Use the piece you cut off to draw the same shape on the other long side, then cut off this top section. Score and fold in the side with the flap that will be at the front of your car.



Trim the width of each flap and push the one at the back backwards to make a spoiler.

For the windscreen, cut out a section of the front flap using a scalpel. Leave about 3cm around all sides.

On the front, draw around the base of two paper cups where you would like the headlights to be.
Cut out holes slightly bigger than the circles you have drawn and push the paper cups in.

Using the offcuts of cardboard from the car, draw and cut out four circles for the wheels, and four smaller circles for the hub caps. Paint them and leave to one side to dry. Now paint the rest of the car.

To make the car wearable, you need to add some shoulder straps. Cut small slits just below the windscreen and spoiler, making sure they are not too far apart for your shoulders. Thread one end of the ribbon or string through the slit by the windscreen and knot to secure. Thread the other end through the spoiler slit and knot. Repeat on the other side.







Cooking is not only the best fun, but it is also the most rewarding of activities, because we get to eat something nice at the end of it.

Here, we learn how to cook a rainbow.

Well, a smoothie made out of rainbow! How magical is that?

You will need:

- 1 orange
- 1 kiwi
- 1 pineapple
- 2 bananas

- 1 bag of frozen berries (including blueberries)
- 2 cups of milk (can be soya or almond milk for vegans)
- Handful of pumpkin seeds
- Blender
- Non-stick frying pan
- 1 bowl

Step 1: Peel the orange and take out 4 segments. Remove the hairy coat of the kiwi and cut it into 4 slices. If you want it to be super fancy, cut it into star shapes! Peel the pineapple, slice it into discs and cut each disc into triangles. Peel one of the bananas and cut it into chunks.



Step 2: Put all the frozen ingredients into the blender with the milk and the other banana. Now whizz until you get a smooth texture.

If it is too thick, add a bit more milk (one spoon at a time).



Step 4: Take a bowl and transfer the frozen fruit mixture into it.


Nuria and Jack were bored. It was raining cats and dogs outside.
