THE BIG PLASTIC PROBLEM

Single-use plastics are a problem but living a plastic free life is a privilege. Some people can't afford plastic free products, healthcare workers need plastic to protect themselves, and some single-use plastic products are essential for people with disabilities.

I'm not anti-plastic. Plastic has its place. I'm anti-plastic-privilege. I believe that if we have the privilege of making a sustainable choice, that's what we should do. For those of us who can use sustainable, plastic free and reusable everyday essentials, it's our shared responsibility to do so. Single-use plastics should be reserved for the people who need them most.

Globally, we produce over 380 million tonnes of plastic every single year and more than 50% of it is designed for single-use only. Every year, we make enough plastic bubble wrap to stretch the distance between the earth and the moon. Microplastic particles have been found in the arctic, on the summit of Mount Everest, and at the bottom of the deepest oceans. All the plastic we've ever made still exists on earth today. It doesn't decompose. It doesn't biodegrade. It just breaks down into tiny microplastic particles and ends up in our waterways, our oceans, and our environment.

Humans are now consuming around five grams of microplastic particles every week - that's about the size of a credit card. Ugh! This isn't just my opinion, this is science, and science is telling us that single-use plastics are a problem.

The truth about coffee cups.

Single-use coffee cups are a big problem. They feel like paper but they're lined with a thin plastic film and the lids are plastic too. They're tricky to recycle because they're made from a mix of materials, so most of the 2.7 million single-use coffee cups thrown away in Australia every single day *aren't* recycled, and instead, they end up buried in landfill or drifting around in our oceans.

The thin plastic film that lines disposable coffee cups is a threat to our environment but it's also a threat to our health. When that plastic film is heated with boiling hot water or coffee, it leaches harmful chemicals and toxins into your coffee and into your body.

Disposable coffee cups are lined with polyethylene, a petrochemical plastic. Most single-use coffee cups aren't recyclable. It's time to ditch single-use coffee cups. Make the switch to a sustainable and reusable alternative. Reduce, reuse, recycle.

The truth about plastic water bottles

Over half the plastic in the ocean comes from single-use products like plastic water bottles.

Globally, 1.2 million plastic bottles are sold every minute.

14 million tonnes of plastic end up in our oceans every year.

PET is the third most widely used type of plastic in single-use bottles and it's made with chemicals that disrupt our endocrine system and toxins that are known to cause cancer.

The process of producing bottled water requires around six times as much water per bottle as there is in the actual bottle.

Plastic drink bottles are made with non-renewable fossil fuels like crude oil and natural gas.

373 million plastic water bottles end up in landfill in Australia every single year.

So what's the solution?

Sustainable home cleaning.

Common household cleaning products packaged in single-use plastic bottles pose a triple threat.

Firstly, most off-the-shelf home cleaning products are a chemical concoction of health hazards, so they're no good for us. They're made with cancer-causing chemicals like formaldehyde, endocrine-disrupting ingredients like butyl cellosolve, and toxic synthetic fragrances that cause asthma and skin irritations.

Secondly, they're terrible for our waterways. When we use toxic chemicals in the home and then wash them down the drain, they end up in our oceans, impacting biodiversity and poisoning our marine wildlife.

Thirdly, and most importantly, they're packaged in single-use plastic bottles which end up in landfill, scattered through our environment, or floating around in our seas.



The truth about cling wrap.

Cling wrap, plastic wrap, gladwrap, whatever you call it, it's plastic and it's a big problem.

Cling wrap is made with polyethylene which is a thermoplastic polymer made from non-renewable ethylene gas or petroleum. When it's heated (for example, covering your food in the microwave) it leaches harmful cancer-causing chemicals and toxins into your food.

It's a health hazard but it's an even bigger environmental hazard. It's been around since the 1950s and because we've only recycled 9% of the plastic we've ever made, it's all still out there – floating around in our oceans and sitting in landfill.

The truth about bottled shampoo

More than 552 million shampoo bottles end up in landfill worldwide every year. Every three years, it's a compounding problem of over 1.6 billion plastic shampoo bottles.

More than 132.8 billion litres of water are used to make all the plastic shampoo and conditioner bottles we use globally every year.

Plastic manufacturing is resource intensive. We use twice as much water to make a plastic shampoo bottle than we do to make the shampoo *in* the bottle.

Common shampoo and conditioners are diluted with up to 75% water.

Common shampoos also contain chemicals such as sodium lauryl sulphate (SLS), parabens, ammonium lauryl sulphate and phthalates. They're toxic ingredients, and when we wash our shampoo down the drain, they impact our marine biodiversity and poison our precious sealife.

Sustainable soap.

Packaged soap is a problem. Firstly, if it's wrapped in soft plastic packaging, that plastic is single-use and it ends up in landfill or it washes into our waterways.

If you're buying hand soap or body wash packaged in plastic bottles, they're pretty nasty too. More water is used to make the plastic bottle than the actual soap product inside the bottle - so they're wasteful in a few ways.

Then there's the water runoff. If soap isn't made with ocean-safe or natural ingredients, when it washes down the drain, it pollutes our waterways and poisons our wildlife.

Soap needs to be natural and biodegradable to be considered eco-friendly, but most common soaps are made with chemicals like triclosan. Triclosan is a synthetic antimicrobial chemical and it's been linked to hormone disruption and increased allergies.

We all like smelling squeaky clean but it's time to rethink our soap habits and buy better products for bathtime!

What's the solution?

Try plastic free bars packaged in paper boxes. Avoid single-use soap bottles. Buy natural and organic soaps. Try refillable and reusable options.

I was the kid at primary school who started a recycling drive, but in my early twenties, I was a fast fashion addict. I ran a sustainable fashion label, but every weekend, I shopped at Supré.

By my late twenties, I had a big problem with fashion. I was shopping on a weekly basis, and the only way to curb my habit was to quit cold turkey.

So, in 2018, I didn't buy a single piece of clothing, except for a \$9 pre-loved outfit from Vinnies for a client's fashion event, some undies and a pair of socks.

Did I have a positive environmental impact that year? Absolutely. Was it hard? **Absolutely.** Will I do it again? Probably not. Why? I'm an ethical and sustainable fashion advocate, and I now realise the world *needs* to buy clothes, I just want the world to *buy better*.

I want to inspire you to make better fashion choices, not to go cold turkey and completely stop buying clothes altogether. I did that for a whole year, and maybe I'm not the kind of person

who copes well with cold turkey, but it actually made me feel worse about fashion when it was meant to make me feel better. It made me question my entire business and who I was, and for 365 days, I felt like a fraud. I was running The Fashion Advocate, an online store selling things, but I was buying nothing at all myself.

Deep down, I think I was punishing myself for spending \$6500 on fashion the year before and maybe it was a way to balance my habit.

But this kind of yo-yo shopping is no different to yo-yo dieting, and it took a year of crazy spending and then a year of no spending at all to work out what was going on in my relationship with fashion.

For someone who lives, loves and breathes fashion, going 365 days without a single new purchase is one hell of a feat, but I had my moments. I was close to breaking point as early as February when my birthday rolled around and I felt like I needed 'something new'. I didn't crack, but I wanted to.

Then there was fashion week in March and all the eyes that would be watching what I was wearing. Then there was a wedding and the people who expected 'the fashion blogger' to look good. Then something else, and another event, and another, and it was *really, really hard.* Every other year I would have bought something new for every one of those situations, but in 2018, I didn't.

The feeling of desperately needing something new to wear every weekend to impress *everyone else* eventually wore off around June, and I started looking at my wardrobe with a creative spark in my eye, instead of looking at it like cold gluggy porridge.

I'd emotionally come to terms with my commitment six months in, and it got a lot easier. There were even moments I absolutely loved it. There were no more stressful last-minute dashes to the shops; I was forced to find something I had at home and just wear it. There were no more endless hours of scrolling through online sales; I knew

I wouldn't buy anything anyway. There were no more impulse buys or the regret that came with them; I was forced to appreciate and use what I had. I saved money and stopped buying a monthly tenpack of coat hangers; there was nothing new to hang on them. I also stopped feeling like I couldn't afford things that were out of my reach; because even if I could, I wasn't buying anything anyway. I became less fashion-stressed and less fashion-obsessed.

It was a far cry from what I once was - **a fast fashion fanatic.** There was a time when my wardrobe spread across one walk-in robe, a custom-built robe (because no store-bought robe could handle the weight of it all), the spare bedroom cupboards, the third bedroom cupboards, plus at least five suitcases in my mother's ceiling storage. My wardrobe occupied an entire house and it was just too much.

Clothing is and always has been a treasure to me, so I've struggled to throw away anything I've ever bought and I'm captivated by pretty things, but as I've decluttered over the past few years, changed my personal direction, and learnt more about the impact of my clothes, I've slowed my buying right down. In the instance of 2018, I completely stopped buying clothes altogether.

But, when 2019 rolled around, I felt like a crazed shopaholic with an unlimited credit card who'd just been let out of jail. I started scrolling through online sales on Boxing Day, relentlessly filling up shopping carts and waiting for 12:01 am on January 1st to roll around. I immediately started stressing about what to wear on New Year's Eve, because for some reason the suitcase of clothing I had with me on holidays, was all of a sudden not good enough. Then, on January 3rd, I bought something new, three days out of my year of abstinence.

So, what did I learn? The fashion industry is rife with social justice issues and it's responsible for millions of tonnes of pollution, but I can't just stop buying fashion and I can't just shut the industry down. Instead, **we need to buy better**. We need to demand more

transparency and better working conditions, and we need to reinvent the industry we've ruined with consumerism and greed. We don't need more meaningless trends, we need more meaningful quality. We don't need polyester, we've lived for thousands of years without it. We need more natural fabrics, more eco-friendly dyes, better standards, and more laws around chemical dumping and water waste in the fashion industry. We need to reverse fashion's impact on the environment.

We can't just stop making and buying fashion because it employs millions of people that rely on that work to live. **We just need to start making fashion better.**

Buying fashion is perfectly fine, there's no guilt in that, so long as it's ethical, sustainable, and it's worn over and over again, for years and years. When something breaks, it needs to be fixed, not just thrown away, and when it's beyond repair, it needs to be reused or recycled. Endless buying and one-time-wearing is the problem, but buying fashion and loving it, living in it, and cherishing it - is not.

I want to inspire you to shop sustainably and <u>buy better</u> fashion, which is why I started The Fashion Advocate a decade ago.

We don't sell polyester. Our packaging is plastic free. We don't sell plastic or polymer jewellery. We only sell ethical labels. We plant a tree with every sale. We only stock ethical brands and we advocate for positive social and environmental change. **Because ultimately, it's not about boycotting buying, it's about buying better.**

THE TRUTH ABOUT

polyester

Polyester is plastic. Uh oh.

70 million barrels of oil are used each year to make the world's use of polyester.

Polyester takes 200+ years to break down in landfill but it never decomposes. It just breaks down into smaller plastic particles.

More than 60% of all fashion is made with polyester.

When polyester is washed, tiny plastic microfibers shed into the runoff water and make their way into our oceans.

Fashion is now responsible for 35% of the microplastic fibres found in the ocean.

The manufacturing process of polyester emits gasses like N2O, which is 300 times more damaging to our environment than CO2.

Don't buy polyester.

Check your garment labels and do your research.

Buy natural and biodegradable materials.

What's the solution?

Sustainable smalls.

Smalls. Underwear. Undies. Socks. Jocks. Lingerie. Panties. Scanties. Undermentionables. Whatever you call them, we all wear them, and when nearly eight billion people in the world own more than a few pairs of everything – bras, socks and undies – that's a lot of smalls.

18 million bras make their way into landfill every few years in the U.S alone and most of them are made with polyester and plastic fixtures.

Every second, the equivalent of a rubbish truck load of fashion is burnt or buried in landfill.


92 million tonnes of textile waste is created annually by the fashion industry.

Annual fashion production has doubled since 2000 but the average piece of clothing is worn 36% fewer times now than it was 15 years ago.

The world has a problem with fashion waste and our underwear drawers are being overlooked. It's time to mix up your unmentionables and start wearing more sustainable smalls.

Do your research and buy better. Avoid synthetic materials and nylon. Opt for natural or recycled fabrics. Recycle old underwear, bras and socks properly.

Little things can have a big impact.
