# Comfort, O Comfort My People

What a privilege—to be called by God to comfort His people, especially when you've also been the messenger of His displeasure and His forthcoming judgment.

If you studied Isaiah Part 1 (chapters 1–39), you sensed its stern tone—like a father's lecture before discipline.

The tone of the second segment which we are about to study, chapters 40–66, is entirely different. It is more like *after*—when your Father takes you in His everlasting arms drawing you so close you can feel the beat of His heart as your head rises and falls with His every eternal breath.

## TAKING IT IN

- 1. First, let's make sure you know the essential who and when of the book of Isaiah.
  - a. Read Isaiah 1:1-2. Note below the answers to these Ws.
    - 1) Who is speaking and for whom?
    - 2) To whom? Who does this vision concern?
    - 3) When is it given?
  - b. Look at the "The Historical Chart of the Kings and Prophets of Israel and Judah" in the Appendix of this book.
    - 1) Note where the kings mentioned in Isaiah 1 appear on the historical chart.
    - 2) Read Isaiah 6:1 and 14:28. Who among those mentioned in Isaiah 1:1 dies? Write their names.

- 3) Now read Isaiah 39:1-8. Write the name of the king of Judah at this time and the name of the foreign power who visits him. Also note what Isaiah says is going to happen with respect to this foreign power and Israel. (By the way, Isaiah 36–39 focuses on a portion of this king's reign.)
- 4) Finally look at the historical chart again and list the dates of the three stages of Judah's captivity.
- 5) Does Isaiah prophesy before or after the captivity?
- 2. Before observing Isaiah 40, make a Key Word Bookmark with the following key words and color-code them the way you want to mark them. Cut out the bookmark on the back cover of this workbook and use the blank side.

Throughout this study, an asterisk [\*] denotes a key word frequently used throughout the Bible which has a suggested marking on the reverse side of the bookmark.

- a. Jerusalem, \* Zion
- b. nations\*
- c. iniquity, sin\*
- d. comfort (You might use a pink cloud).
- e. glory (Do not mark glorious, glorified, etc.)
- f. references to the coming of the Lord\*
- g. *idol* (You might use a big I in black over the I of idol)
- h. references to *God\**—Seeing what you learn from each occurrence helps you develop your systematic theology on the person of God.
- i. fear (Watch for the phrase "Do not fear.")

- j. references to time\*
- k. geographical locations\*
- 3. Now observe Isaiah 40. In the Appendix you'll find Observation Worksheets to use—the Bible text printed with space between the lines and wide margins, so you can "work" on them.

Mark the key words on your bookmark including synonyms and pronouns. If you've done this before, you know marking key words helps you focus on and retain what God is saying.

- 4. Let's evaluate this chapter's contents.
  - a. Look at what you learn from marking "comfort."
    - 1) Who is to be comforted?
    - 2) Who is giving the order? Who says they need to be comforted?
    - 3) What brought or created the need for comfort?
    - 4) How are they to be comforted?
    - 5) Now look at the other words you marked and see what you observe about them.
  - b. Read Isaiah 40:1-11.
    - 1) What is to be spoken in 40:1-2?

# ISAIAH 1

#### Observation Worksheet

THE vision of Isaiah the son of Amoz concerning Judah and Jerusalem, which he saw during the reigns of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz *and* Hezekiah, kings of Judah.

- 2 Listen, O heavens, and hear, O earth;
  - For the LORD speaks,
  - "Sons I have reared and brought up,
  - But they have revolted against Me.
- 3 "An ox knows its owner,
  - And a donkey its master's manger,
  - But Israel does not know,
  - My people do not understand."
- 4 Alas, sinful nation,
  - People weighed down with iniquity,
  - Offspring of evildoers,
  - Sons who act corruptly!
  - They have abandoned the LORD,
  - They have despised the Holy One of Israel,
  - They have turned away from Him.
- 5 Where will you be stricken again,
  - As you continue in *your* rebellion?
  - The whole head is sick
  - And the whole heart is faint.
- 6 From the sole of the foot even to the head
  - There is nothing sound in it,
  - Only bruises, welts and raw wounds,
  - Not pressed out or bandaged,
  - Nor softened with oil.



7 Your land is desolate,

Your cities are burned with fire,

Your fields—strangers are devouring them in your presence;

It is desolation, as overthrown by strangers.

8 The daughter of Zion is left like a shelter in a vineyard,

Like a watchman's hut in a cucumber field, like a besieged city.

9 Unless the LORD of hosts

Had left us a few survivors,

We would be like Sodom,

We would be like Gomorrah.

Hear the word of the LORD,

You rulers of Sodom;

Give ear to the instruction of our God,

You people of Gomorrah.

"What are your multiplied sacrifices to Me?"

Says the LORD.

"I have had enough of burnt offerings of rams

And the fat of fed cattle;

And I take no pleasure in the blood of bulls, lambs or goats.

"When you come to appear before Me,

Who requires of you this trampling of My courts?

13 "Bring your worthless offerings no longer,

Incense is an abomination to Me.

New moon and sabbath, the calling of assemblies—

I cannot endure iniquity and the solemn assembly.

"I hate your new moon festivals and your appointed feasts,

They have become a burden to Me;

I am weary of bearing them.

"So when you spread out your hands in prayer,

I will hide My eyes from you;

Yes, even though you multiply prayers,

I will not listen.

Your hands are covered with blood.

16 "Wash yourselves, make yourselves clean; Remove the evil of your deeds from My sight. Cease to do evil,

17 Learn to do good;
Seek justice,
Reprove the ruthless,
Defend the orphan,
Plead for the widow.

"Come now, and let us reason together,"
Says the LORD,
"The web ways size are as accelet."

"Though your sins are as scarlet, They will be as white as snow; Though they are red like crimson, They will be like wool.

19 "If you consent and obey, You will eat the best of the land;

20 "But if you refuse and rebel,You will be devoured by the sword."Truly, the mouth of the LORD has spoken.

21 How the faithful city has become a harlot, She *who* was full of justice!
Righteousness once lodged in her,
But now murderers.

Your silver has become dross, Your drink diluted with water.

Your rulers are rebels
And companions of thieves;
Everyone loves a bribe
And chases after rewards.
They do not defend the orphan,
Nor does the widow's plea come before them.

- Therefore the Lord GOD of hosts,The Mighty One of Israel, declares,"Ah, I will be relieved of My adversariesAnd avenge Myself on My foes.
- 25 "I will also turn My hand against you,
  And will smelt away your dross as with lye
  And will remove all your alloy.
- 26 "Then I will restore your judges as at the first,
  And your counselors as at the beginning;
  After that you will be called the city of righteousness,
  A faithful city."
- Zion will be redeemed with justiceAnd her repentant ones with righteousness.
- 28 But transgressors and sinners will be crushed together, And those who forsake the LORD will come to an end.
- 29 Surely you will be ashamed of the oaks which you have desired,
  And you will be embarrassed at the gardens which you have chosen.
- For you will be like an oak whose leaf fades away Or as a garden that has no water.
- The strong man will become tinder,His work also a spark.Thus they shall both burn togetherAnd there will be none to quench *them*.

"Here is your God!"

Behold, the Lord GOD will come with might,

With His arm ruling for Him.

Behold, His reward is with Him

And His recompense before Him.

11 Like a shepherd He will tend His flock,

In His arm He will gather the lambs

And carry *them* in His bosom;

He will gently lead the nursing ewes.

Who has measured the waters in the hollow of His hand,

And marked off the heavens by the span,

And calculated the dust of the earth by the measure,

And weighed the mountains in a balance

And the hills in a pair of scales?

Who has directed the Spirit of the LORD,

Or as His counselor has informed Him?

14 With whom did He consult and *who* gave Him understanding?

And who taught Him in the path of justice and taught Him

knowledge

And informed Him of the way of understanding?

Behold, the nations are like a drop from a bucket,

And are regarded as a speck of dust on the scales;

Behold, He lifts up the islands like fine dust.

16 Even Lebanon is not enough to burn,

Nor its beasts enough for a burnt offering.

- 17 All the nations are as nothing before Him,

  They are regarded by Him as less than nothing and
  meaningless.
- To whom then will you liken God?

  Or what likeness will you compare with Him?
- 19 As for the idol, a craftsman casts it,A goldsmith plates it with gold,And a silversmith fashions chains of silver.
- 20 He who is too impoverished for *such* an offering Selects a tree that does not rot;
  He seeks out for himself a skillful craftsman
  To prepare an idol that will not totter.
- Do you not know? Have you not heard?Has it not been declared to you from the beginning?Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth?
- It is He who sits above the circle of the earth,
  And its inhabitants are like grasshoppers,
  Who stretches out the heavens like a curtain
  And spreads them out like a tent to dwell in.
- He *it is* who reduces rulers to nothing,
  Who makes the judges of the earth meaningless.
- 24 Scarcely have they been planted,
  Scarcely have they been sown,
  Scarcely has their stock taken root in the earth,
  But He merely blows on them, and they wither,
  And the storm carries them away like stubble.

The Everlasting God, the LORD, the Creator of the ends of the earth

4 "Who has performed and accomplished *it*,

Calling forth the generations from the beginning?

'I, the LORD, am the first, and with the last. I am He.'"

5 The coastlands have seen and are afraid;

The ends of the earth tremble;

They have drawn near and have come.

6 Each one helps his neighbor

And says to his brother, "Be strong!"

7 So the craftsman encourages the smelter,

And he who smooths metal with the hammer encourages him

who beats the anvil,

Saying of the soldering, "It is good";

And he fastens it with nails,

So that it will not totter.

- 8 "But you, Israel, My servant,
  Jacob whom I have chosen,
  Descendant of Abraham My friend,
- You whom I have taken from the ends of the earth,
   And called from its remotest parts
   And said to you, 'You are My servant,
   I have chosen you and not rejected you.
- 10 'Do not fear, for I am with you;
  Do not anxiously look about you, for I am your God.
  I will strengthen you, surely I will help you,
  Surely I will uphold you with My righteous right hand.'
- 11 "Behold, all those who are angered at you will be shamed and dishonored;

Those who contend with you will be as nothing and will perish.

- 13 "For I am the LORD your God, who upholds your right hand, Who says to you, 'Do not fear, I will help you.'
- "Do not fear, you worm Jacob, you men of Israel;I will help you," declares the LORD, "and your Redeemer is the Holy One of Israel.
- 15 "Behold, I have made you a new, sharp threshing sledge with double edges;

You will thresh the mountains and pulverize them,

And will make the hills like chaff.

16 "You will winnow them, and the wind will carry them away,

And the storm will scatter them;

But you will rejoice in the LORD,

You will glory in the Holy One of Israel.

17 "The afflicted and needy are seeking water, but there is none,

And their tongue is parched with thirst;

I, the LORD, will answer them Myself,

As the God of Israel I will not forsake them.

18 "I will open rivers on the bare heights

And springs in the midst of the valleys;

I will make the wilderness a pool of water

And the dry land fountains of water.

19 "I will put the cedar in the wilderness,

The acacia and the myrtle and the olive tree;

I will place the juniper in the desert

Together with the box tree and the cypress,

That they may see and recognize,

And consider and gain insight as well,

That the hand of the LORD has done this,

And the Holy One of Israel has created it.

21 "Present your case," the LORD says.

"Bring forward your strong arguments,"

The King of Jacob says.

Let them bring forth and declare to us what is going to take place;

As for the former events, declare what they were,

That we may consider them and know their outcome.

Or announce to us what is coming;

Declare the things that are going to come afterward,

That we may know that you are gods;

Indeed, do good or evil, that we may anxiously look about us and fear together.

24 Behold, you are of no account,

And your work amounts to nothing;

He who chooses you is an abomination.

25 "I have aroused one from the north, and he has come;

From the rising of the sun he will call on My name;

And he will come upon rulers as upon mortar,

Even as the potter treads clay."

Who has declared *this* from the beginning, that we might know?

Or from former times, that we may say, "He is right!"?

Surely there was no one who declared,

Surely there was no one who proclaimed,

Surely there was no one who heard your words.

27 "Formerly *I said* to Zion, 'Behold, here they are.'

And to Jerusalem, 'I will give a messenger of good news.'

28 "But when I look, there is no one,

And there is no counselor among them

Who, if I ask, can give an answer.

29 "Behold, all of them are false;

Their works are worthless,

Their molten images are wind and emptiness.


