BIOGRAPHY

Manny Trinh (born 1974 in Saigon City, Vietnam) immigrated to Canada when he was 11 years old. He is a painter and visual artist.

Trinh's practice explores the nuances of contradiction. His vivid impressions of the human landscape of his homeland — dense yet sprawling, chaotic with an underlying order, decaying but full of life and growth — have become major influences on his work.

From engaging with a bright, complementary, almost fauvist or pop colour palette to experiments in greyscale and monochrome, Manny focuses on the entanglement of fantasy and reality; encapsulating a recognizable human core within surreal technology and splintered mechanical landscapes.

The various techniques Trinh employs in wet and dry brushwork found in his acrylic, watercolour and gouache paintings are studies probing the surface and texture of our dichotomous environments, acknowledging generations of cultural evolution. Manny Trinh lives and works in Toronto, Canada.

ARTIST STATEMENT

This body of work was created during the numerous periods of lockdowns throughout the pandemic. During this time, I found myself at home with a lot more time on my hands than ever before. I wanted to give structure to my days so I created a routine where I would begin my mornings painting with watercolours. The subject matter was chosen based on what was around me in my home, found objects from daily walks, and general everyday items. Each item was painted without a specific plan which resulted in a random format. Although the format is random, the act of painting them provided some much needed structure to my days.

During the lockdowns I would keep thinking about activities that you were not allowed to do. I found myself missing human interaction through sports such as basketball, skateboarding and tennis. With everything shut down, I felt it was essential for me to maintain my creativity. The only thing I felt I could do was my art, so I decided to paint these courts that I looked forward to visiting again. Through these paintings I attempted to explore the idea of what we really miss or take for granted in our everyday lives.
