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1 Peter

Overview: Encouragement

H ow do you react when you receive a long, thoughtful message from a wise mentor or trusted friend? Peter's letter was probably read aloud to each group of Christians who received it. Try to experience the entire letter as its first readers did by having your group take turns reading it out loud. Listen carefully for the major themes or ideas of the letter.

Select different readers for each of the following sections:

1:1-12 1:13-25 2:1-10 2:11-25 3:1-12 3:13-22 4:1-11 4:12-19 5:1-14

1. What are the themes or major ideas of this letter?

Read 1 Peter 1:1-2

2. How does the author of this letter describe himself (verse 1), and how does he describe the people to whom he is writing (verses 1-2)?

What identity, destiny, loyalty, and meaning in life can they find?

Note: To understand the phrase **sprinkled with his blood**, it may be helpful to understand that in the Old Testament, sprinkling with blood was a symbol of cleansing (Leviticus 14:1-7), a sign of being set apart for the service of God (Exodus 29:19-21), and a sign of the covenant between the people of Israel and God, cleansing their past sin and promising their future obedience to God (Exodus 24:1-8).

3. Compare Peter's introduction of himself and his readers with the way you might introduce yourself to others.

4. In verse 2, what relationship does each person of the Trinity of God have to every Christian, *God's elect*?

Read 1 Peter 1:3-9

5. Peter reminds those receiving this letter of the benefits God has given them. What are these benefits and how durable are they?

6. Using only verses 3-5, how would you explain salvation to someone?

7. What perspective does Peter want his readers to have regarding their present troubles?

8. How can understanding the realities of the past, present, and future as explained in verses 3-9 help you keep a Christian perspective on difficulties in your own life?

9. What various trials and testing do Christians suffer today?

10. According to verses 3-9, what relationship can you have with Jesus Christ?

What will the result be?

11. What difference does it make as you face the challenges of daily life to know that you are *receiving the end result of your faith*?

Read 1 Peter 1:10-12

12. What did the Old Testament prophets say *concerning this salvation*?

What did they know, and what did they not know when they spoke?

13. What is *the gospel*? How did Peter's audience hear about it? How did you learn about it?

14. How does this passage influence your attitude toward the Old Testament?

SUMMARY

1. Trace the roles and interrelationships of the Trinity (God the Father, Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit) in this passage.

2. First Peter 1:1-12 discusses what is *lasting* and what is *temporary*. What could you use from this section to encourage Christians who live in danger of prison or death because of their faith?
