———— According to the Bible, What Is God Like?

That do you think of when you see or hear the word *God*? Share your ideas.

There are many ideas about God, and many religions in the world. How can we know which one is true? Or will any of them do?

We can't see, hear, or touch God. Unless God reveals himself to us, we cannot know anything about God with certainty. Has God ever revealed himself? The purpose of these studies is to see what the Bible says about God and how we can know God. After carefully and honestly examining what the Bible says, each person will be better able to choose how he or she will respond to God. In this first study we begin to see what the Bible says God is like.

Read Genesis 1:1—2:3, looking for all you can learn about what God is like.



1.	Recall the actions of God in Genesis 1:1–2:3. How would you describe God from these verses?
2.	What do the words <i>in the beginning</i> tell you about God, God's existence, and God's relationship to time as we know it?

3.	How is God as revealed in this chapter of the Bible different from various ideas about who (or what) he is? Consider some common beliefs:
	 Nature, such as the sun or moon, are gods; there are a myriad of gods.
	 God is a dispenser of divine favors upon request, to use when you need help, but who can be ignored at other times
	 God is a product of our minds: If you believe God exists, he does; if you don't believe he exists, he doesn't.
4.	In Genesis, God is described not as a created being, but as the source of all life, a living person who made all things including the first human beings. What attitudes do you think are appropriate for people to have toward such a God?
5.	How do you feel about the idea that God, rather than humankind, is central in the universe?



The Bible begins with the assumption that God is eternal, and that God created the universe out of nothing by his power and design. Our abilities to plan, choose, evaluate, communicate, take responsibility, and act creatively—all express how we are in the image of God.
