Sew a Skirt with Elasticated Waistband

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Project Description: Skirt with Elastic Waistband



If you've never sewn any clothes before, this is a good introductory dress-making project. It's easy to sew yet you end up with an item of clothing which makes a real impact. It's a project which can easily be adapted and embellished. Skirts with an elastic waistband are also an excellent choice for children as they are easy to put on and pull off.

What you will need: Skirt with Elastic Waistband

What you will need:

- Fabric for waistband
- Fabric for skirt
- 2.5cm (1 inch) width elastic
- thread
- scissors
- sewing machine




Measurements:

Measure out your skirt. Decide on the length - remember it will jump up a bit with the fullness, so take this into consideration. You can make it whatever you like, from a mini skirt to a balldress length! Add on 5cm (2 inches) at bottom and 2.5cm (1 inch) at top). The width should be approximately 3 times that of the person's waist, but you can make it up to 4 times if you'd like a really full skirt.

Cut out your waistband. It will be the same width as your skirt. It will be 4 times as high as your elastic (so 10cm, or 4 inches). Fold and iron it into 4 along the length.

Measure elastic around person's waist to find out what is comfortable - in my case, I made it the same size as my daughter's waist, then pulled it in by 5cm (2 inches). You will need this length, plus another 2.5cm (1 inch).








5. Now we are going to attached the waistband. You should already have it folded and ironed it into 4 along the length.	6. Fold over the edge of the waistband 1.25cm (1/2 inch) and the same again. Stitch it down so seam is on the wrong side of the waistband.
7. Pin waistband onto front of skirt, matching top edges and with the right side of the waistband facing the right side of the skirt. Make sure you start pinning from the finished end of waistband.	
	8. Pin waistband all the way around the top of the front of the


8. Pin waistband all the way around the top of the front of the skirt. Make sure you over lap the unfinished end of waistband over finished seam. Sew along the gully of the top fold.



9. Fold your waistband up and over, sandwiching the top edge of skirt. Pin from front making sure you catch bottom edge of back of waistband too. Sew neatly into place.




10. You will have a little gap to thread in elastic. Attach elastic to safety pin and thread it through gap, pushing it all the way through to other end. I actually put tape around the safety pin too, so there is no chance of losing the end.



12. Hand sew the little gap at the waistband, being careful not to catch on the elastic. You now have a skirt!

11. Pull elastic through gap, being careful not to lose the ends. Stitch an overlap of 2.5 cm (1 inch). Ease elastic back into waistband.





You may want to add some embellishments - on this skirt, I added bias binding along the hem line.



On this skirt, I added darts along the top so the skeletons sat flatter, and added a net ruffle and bow on waistband.
