

I. Introduction

- A. Revelation. What's your first thought when you hear that? Dragons? The end of the world? Crazy stories that are beyond your wildest imagination? Maybe even a little fear? Uncertainty about the meaning of Revelation can leave you nervous or anxious about the future, and you might be wondering if there's anything in this book that can impact your life right now...I'm here to tell you that there is! The first few chapters contain letters written to seven churches with encouragement and ways they can grow in their faith. So in this new series, *Seven Letters*, we're going to take a look at those letters to see how they can help us grow in our faith right here in the 21st century. But first, let's get a little background info on Revelation.
- **B.** Revelation was written by John, one of Jesus' disciples, around 95 AD (about 65 years after Jesus's resurrection). He begins in Revelation 1:1-2 by saying, "The revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave Him to show to His servants the things that must soon take place. He made it known by sending His angel to His servant John, who bore witness to the word of God and to the testimony of Jesus Christ, even to all that he saw."
- C. John had been exiled to the island of Patmos as a punishment for being a Christian, but God did not let that time go to waste. He sent an angel to John with a message from Jesus and told John to write down everything he heard and saw. Before Jesus ascended back to Heaven, He promised that He would one day return, and a significant portion of this vision has to do with the things surrounding His return. Just as we do now, Christians in John's day lived with hopeful expectation of that great event because life was not easy for Christians living under Roman rule. The imperial cult (worship of the Roman emperor) would persecute anyone who claimed that "Jesus is Lord" rather than "Caesar is lord," so countless Christians were suffering for their faith.
- D. Faithful Christians are under pressure to conform to the world, and some are compromising with it. The temptation to turn away from Christ and join with the world shows up clearly in some of the letters to the seven churches, and Christians today face that same struggle. But in this session, we're going to see what it looks like to recenter our focus on Jesus and remind ourselves that He is the most important thing.

II. Tension

- A. Optional Illustration: Tell a story about getting so busy with a project/activity that you forgot why you even started.
- B. Have you ever done something like this? Started a project, activity, or hobby with good intentions only to become so overwhelmed and carried away that you begin to resent it? Or you don't even remember why you started in the first place? It's so easy to fill our lives with constant activity. And the ironic thing is that these activities can be "good" things! Sure, there may be some time-wasting activities, such as scrolling on social media for hours or binge-watching a show all day, but we can also fill our time with good things like serving the church or giving our time to those in need.
- C. However, it's also easy to get so caught up in whatever we're doing that we forget why we started in the first place. We may have started doing more chores around the house

to help our parents out of love for them, but after a while, doing chores becomes a burden, and we lose sight of why we started. We may have started serving somewhere in the church out of love for Jesus and other people, but after a while, it can become just another thing that we do. Just another part of our routine. We're still faithful to show up and do what we're asked, but the passion and excitement that we once had about it aren't really there anymore.

D. That's the kind of situation that we step into in this first letter. The church at Ephesus had lost sight of their initial motivation behind the things they did. They were doing good things, but the love they once had was no longer there. They needed to be reminded that God wants more from them than just the things they can do. That INSTEAD OF LETTING BUSYNESS CLOUD THEIR VISION AND PURPOSE, THEY SHOULD RETURN TO THEIR FIRST LOVE.

III. Scripture

A. Read <u>REVELATION 2:1-7</u>

- 1. "To the angel of the church in Ephesus write: 'The words of him who holds the seven stars in his right hand, who walks among the seven golden lampstands.
 - a) NOTE: Pause and remind students that Jesus is the one who holds the seven stars in His right hand and walks among the seven lampstands.
- 2. I know your works, your toil and your patient endurance, and how you cannot bear with those who are evil, but have tested those who call themselves apostles and are not, and found them to be false. I know you are enduring patiently and bearing up for my name's sake, and you have not grown weary. But I have this against you, that you have abandoned the love you had at first. Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent, and do the works you did at first. If not, I will come to you and remove your lampstand from its place, unless you repent. Yet this you have: you hate the works of the Nicolaitans, which I also hate. He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says to the churches. To the one who conquers I will grant to eat of the tree of life, which is in the paradise of God."
- **B.** In this letter, we basically have a "good news/bad news" sandwich. Jesus starts with the good things they're doing before pointing out what they need to work on. I'm sure you've received feedback from a parent, teacher, coach, or friend in the same way. It always helps to know you are doing something well before hearing the areas where you need to improve.
- C. In the first couple of sentences, Jesus highlights their good works, service, and patient endurance. He recognizes that they are skilled at determining whether someone is truly an apostle or not, and He commends them for not growing weary in doing good. But in verse 4, He brings up their weakness. THEY HAVE ABANDONED THEIR FIRST LOVE. They are distracted and busy doing all the "Christian things" but have forgotten the true reason for their work. Busyness clouded their vision and purpose. Does this sound familiar? We do this too!
- **D.** Jesus mentions their good works, service, and patient endurance because those are great strengths of the church, but <u>HE DOESN'T JUST WANT THEIR SERVICE</u>; <u>HE WANTS</u>

<u>THEIR HEARTS</u>. There are so many stories in Scripture where people were going through the motions, but their hearts were so far from God. They were doing what they thought was right, carrying out religious traditions, but missed the fact that those traditions were meant to draw them close to their heavenly Father. The church in Ephesus had fallen into the same trap...and so do we.

- **E.** James 1:14-16 says, "But each person is tempted when he is lured and enticed by his own desire. Then desire when it has conceived gives birth to sin, and sin when it is fully grown brings forth death.
- F. Optional Illustration: Tell a story about being led astray by something you desired. It could be friendships, relationships, jobs, money, etc.
- G. James understood how crafty the enemy is and that sometimes our desires can be used against us. Right off the bat, we might think of desires that lead us to bad or dangerous choices, such as drug addiction or sexual immorality. And that's certainly possible, but many times our desires lead us to good choices, such as wanting to be healthy, have a good community of friends, or make a difference in the world.
- H. But what happens when the enemy influences our desires? Can he turn good desires into obsessions or take us down a path that God never intended? Absolutely. THE ENEMY CAN TAKE OUR GOOD DESIRES AND TWIST THEM INTO SOMETHING DESTRUCTIVE. For example, caring for the poor and oppressed is a God-given passion, but the enemy can twist those desires and cause you to work so hard that you burn out or forget why you even started. Your focus might have been on bringing glory to God in the beginning, but somewhere along the way, it became about making a name for yourself. Or maybe you felt like you had to earn God's love. Maybe you thought that if you helped enough people, God would love you more. You got so deep in the work of saving others that you lost your initial motivation. You forgot who you are and whose you are. You lost sight of your first love, whether intentionally or unintentionally.

IV. Application

A. Just as the church at Ephesus had areas they needed to work on, we do too. With that being said, I think we need to consider a couple of things as we try to return to our first love, Jesus.

B. <u>IDENTIFY & GUARD YOUR DESIRES</u>

- 1. God gives us good and perfect gifts. They might be talents and abilities, specific people in our lives, or other blessings that He wants us to use for His glory. He gives you and me everything we need to live well, love others, and bring glory to God. Further on in the passage I read a few minutes ago from James, he even tells us that we are a kind of firstfruits, which means the best of the harvest. We are God's masterpiece (Ephes. 2:10). In other words, we are God's prized possessions, and in turn, God is our first love. That's how He created us. WHEN WE SEEK LOVE AND SATISFACTION OUTSIDE OF GOD, WE ARE LEFT BROKEN, HURTING, AND WANTING MORE.
- 2. So, where are you seeking fulfillment and purpose but coming up empty? Is it service and hard work like the church in Ephesus? Is it approval or relationships?

- Is it success or status? Are you focused on climbing the imaginary ladder of popularity? Or is it something else? None of these things are inherently bad, but they can be destructive when they become our main focus and goal. As I said earlier, when the busyness of chasing after these things clouds our main vision and purpose, we stray from our devotion to Jesus. We abandon our first love.
- 3. When you're able to identify your desires, you become more aware of how the enemy may use them against you. And as you get better at being ready for that, you can equip yourself with truth that combats the lies the enemy tries to tell you.

C. RETURN TO YOUR FIRST LOVE

- 1. However hard we try to not get distracted by our desires and the things that we do, it will inevitably happen at some point. So what should we do when we get there? The same thing every time we have to return to our first love. We should constantly remind ourselves that Jesus should be our true motivation for doing the things we do. When we stray away from Him, we should remember all that He has done for us and the great love He has for us.
- 2. If your serving becomes draining and exhausting, return to your first love by asking Him to remind you why you serve and the joy it brings to your soul. Remember that we serve in response to God's love, not to earn it.
- 3. Are you trying to find love and approval in relationships? Remember that God created you to love Him first and foremost and then love others from the outpouring of His love. There is a void in our hearts that only He can fill.
- 4. Whatever trap you have fallen into, know that it's never too late to return to God, your first love. Revelation 2:5 implores us to "Remember therefore from where you have fallen; repent, and do the works you did at first."

V. Gospel

- **A.** Many times, to remember why you do what you do, to return to your first love, you must go back to the beginning. Notice that in verse 7, Jesus mentions the tree of life. Do you remember where the tree of life first appears in the Bible? If not, the tree of life was in the Garden of Eden way back in Genesis, where the story of humanity begins.
- B. In Genesis 1-2, God created the entire universe and said it was good. He also made humans in His image and said they were VERY good. Everything was perfect and beautiful, and God provided all that Adam and Eve needed. He was their first love, and they displayed that love by spending intentional time together walking in the garden. Can you imagine that? You live in paradise, and God physically walks and talks with you every day. What a gift! But one day, a serpent prompted Adam and Eve to question their first love.
- **C.** One question changed everything. "Did God *really* say that you couldn't do this?" The serpent caused Adam and Eve to doubt God's goodness in a few simple words. This question made them wonder if there was something better outside of what God said and designed. And just like that, they abandoned their first love. They disobeyed God and introduced sin into the world. Because of that, their previously perfect relationship with God was now broken. And the only thing that could fix it was a perfect, sinless life, which we could never do.

- **D.** Thankfully, God deeply desires a relationship with us. He longs to be with us, so He sent His only Son, Jesus, down to Earth to do what we never could. Jesus lived that perfect, sinless life and offered His own life up in place of ours. He died an excruciating death on a cross and took all of our sins and the punishment for them on His own shoulders. However, 3 days later, Jesus rose from the grave, having defeated sin and death forever and for everyone who would believe in Him.
- E. Now, because of Jesus's sacrifice, we can have a relationship with God again. We can have salvation from our sins and eternal life. All we have to do is repent of (turn away from/ask forgiveness for) our sins, confess that Jesus is the Savior we desperately need, and commit to following Him with all of our heart, soul, mind, and strength. Jesus frees us from the punishment of our sins and gives us the gifts of a relationship with Him and eternal life in Heaven.

VI. Conclusion

- **A.** The enemy does to us the same thing he did to Adam and Eve every day. He entices us to wander about life outside God's ways, take matters into our own hands, and seek our purpose and joy in other places. The enemy uses our own desires and passions to draw us away from our first love.
- **B.** We all get lost or off track from time to time. We get caught up in so many things that distract us from building our relationship with our first love. Taking a break from the busyness of life is a necessary step in the life of a Christian. We all need time to reflect on what we are pursuing and our motivation behind it. If loving God, bringing Him glory, and inviting others into His family are not the primary motivators, then we should reconsider how we are spending our time.
- **C.** Ask God to search your heart. If He reveals things that you need to shift or leave behind, ask Him for a willing spirit to change your priorities. May we learn from the church in Ephesus to never abandon our first love. And if we do, may we listen to the Holy Spirit's promptings to return.
- D. Let's pray.
