

SA Australian of the Year Presentation Evening 2021



A word from the CEO



Our Awards Program

Through our Award Programs across 2021–2022 we were uplifted by so many examples of people who didn't wait for someone else to create a social enterprise or address a community issue. They responded. We have heard of young community leaders preserving their culture in remote Aboriginal communities.

We've rejoiced in young people giving expression to their own culture using multiple languages and through the power of music as a voice that speaks to marginalised young people. There are other stories of people's contributions over many, many years as a volunteer. These are heroic people who have contributed to their communities in so many ways: supporting a community café; fundraising for important health causes like breast and prostate cancers, firefighting, rescuing animals, supporting our most vulnerable citizens; saving protected species; providing drought relief; and importantly providing hope when hope may have been lost.

Some have realised their deepest vocational ambitions borne out of their desire to serve their communities or to respond to the most challenging of circumstances. How does anyone get up and fight the good fight for prevention of veterans' suicide after losing one's own son to suicide? Well, they were determined to see a Royal Commission and managed to galvanise over 400,000 signatures. We also amplified through these

programs the dedicated campaign to change the law on the Voluntary Assisted Dying Act and someone heavily involved in ensuring that South Australia's efforts would get this legislation over the line, having witnessed her own young son's choice to end his life. The power of ordinary citizens carrying out extraordinary acts has been brought home to us through our Award Programs.

We live in a connected world. As just one example, having witnessed the suffering of the people of war-torn Afghanistan, we saw how members of the Afghan community created fundraising opportunities for South Australians to respond to the humanitarian crisis. It is good to be reminded that the voice or actions of one citizen is essential to a robust, vibrant, and civil society. It is also reassuring to be reminded of the outstanding service that happens each day in our communities, so often invisible to most of us.

Each of the recipients across our Award Programs and those who have been commended continue to build the social and cultural fabric of our society. These recipients demonstrate their capacity for selflessness, the quality of their relationships in some instances over decades and their desire to connect and support most often very vulnerable people.

Amplifying our Inspirational Australians

We were so keen to ensure Grace Tame the 2021 Australian of the Year was able to come to South Australia and present to the community. Her presentations at the Rex J Lipman event and the Australian of the Year Breakfast were powerful and, as an advocate against all forms of sexual violence against women, she brought home the important message to the community of tackling this issue head on. We have also been fortunate to have such outstanding award recipients, namely Tanya Hosch, Isobel Marshall and Richard Bruggemann. These great Australians, each with deeply human stories, hold a strong desire to see change. We are uplifted by their advocacy and passion for a nation that is positively seeking to ensure a fairer and more respectful society for all.

It was an honour to travel intrastate this year and take Dr James Muecke AM, Tanya Hosch and Isobel Marshall to Port Pirie, Port Augusta and Whyalla in November 2022. We then took our 2020 National Local Hero Bernie Shakeshaft along with our 2022 State Recipients, Professor Helen Marshall AM, Mark Le

Messurier and Monique Bareham, to Naracoorte and Mount Gambier in May 2022. It is so important that our regional communities have access to hearing from fabulous recipients. We were thrilled by the reception we had for both Tours of Honour that amplified the work and contribution of our inspirational Australians. Our forums in each of the three cities attracted diverse crowds and rich opportunities for engagement.

Australia Day - A Day of Meaning for the South Australian community

We were again privileged to collaborate with our Open Circle Discussion Group comprising Kaurna elders and representatives of First Nations communities across our state. Our Open Circle Discussion Group worked alongside our First Nations producer Gina Rings to formulate engage and appropriate content for all the events in our Australia Day 2022 program.

We extend a huge thank you to all South Australians for coming along and supporting the inaugural Aus Lights on the River and for again supporting the Smoking Ceremony and Aus Day in Rundle Mall events that made up our Australia Day Program 2022. It was extraordinary to see so many people taking part in the centrepiece of our program, Aus Lights on the River, with over 45,000 people engaging over four nights. Amid all the challenges of unseasonable weather and COVID-19 our free outdoor events for the community provided an opportunity to enlarge our national story. During this challenging time we have had to become more agile than ever and this was particularly given expression by our many hundreds of community organisations who participated in Rundle Mall or ventured into Elder Park.

On the morning of 26 January, a supportive crowd of more than 1000 South Australians observed the moving Smoking Ceremony (Mourning in the Morning) hosted by senior Kaurna leaders on Kaurna land, Elder Park/Tarntanya Wama.

We thank our First Nations Peoples who have generously invited our SA community to join in and understand more fully First Nations perspectives on Australia Day.

Special thanks and congratulations are extended to the creative team behind Aus Lights on the River, led by Creative Director Sam Wark from Campfire, the wonderful team at illuminart, production partners, media partners and suppliers. We also want to sincerely acknowledge our incredible volunteers and wonderful intercultural community organisations for their tireless contributions.

It is with immense gratitude that I thank the Board of the Australia Day Council of South Australia for the opportunity to serve the Board and receive their wise counsel and strategic directions. Rex J Lipman Public Event presents Grace Tame Australian of the Year 2021

14 September 2021

Grace Tame, Australian of the Year 2021 generously shared her story to an audience of young people, educators, and parents at the Rex J Lipman Fellows Program Lecture. We sincerely thank St Peter's College, Adelaide, and the Rex J Lipman family for partnering with us to deliver this free public event for our wider community. Grace's presentation delivered in a O&A format with MC Jess Adamson was powerful and as an advocate against all forms of sexual violence against women, Grace brought home the important message to the Australian community of tackling this issue head on.

Australian of the Year Breakfast

15 September 2021

Grace Tame, Australian of the Year 2021 joined Tanya Hosch, SA State Recipient Australian of the Year 2021, Isobel Marshall, Young Australian of the Year 2021 and Professor Richard Bruggemann, SA State Recipient Senior Australian of the Year 2021 for an unforgettable Australian of the Year Breakfast. These incredible changemakers addressed some of our society's deeply challenging issues; sexual violence against women, incarceration rates of young people especially Aboriginal children, people with disabilities who have suffered systemic abuse in our system and the real issue of period poverty in Australia and overseas. The diverse audience represented at the National Wine Centre for this experience was encouraged to continue to learn about, speak out and to act against all these issues. It was a morning that uplifted and provided much hope for all. We were proud to align with presenting partner St Peter's College and supporting partners Lexus of Adelaide and Kytons Bakery Australia.

SA Australian of the Year Awards Presentation Evening

21 October 2021

Each year the Australian of the Year Awards amplifies the achievement and contribution of inspiring Australians. These Awards honour outstanding Australians who have gone the extra mile to create a better country for us all. Over 400 people attended the South Australian Presentation Evening held at the iconic Adelaide Convention Centre, announcing the four finalists who would represent our State in Canberra for the National Announcement. Her Excellency the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia and The Honourable Steven Marshall MP, former Premier of South Australia presented the 16 recipients with their Awards.

Tour of Honour – Upper Spencer Gulf

11 and 12 November 2021

The communities of Port Pirie, Port Augusta and Whyalla embraced the opportunity to hear from three inspirational South Australians during our Tour of Honour on November 11 and 12. Free public forums in Port Pirie, Port Augusta and Whyalla gave local people the chance to hear from 2020 Australian of the Year, pioneering ophthalmologist and diabetes campaigner Dr James Muecke; 2021 Young Australian of the Year, social entrepreneur Isobel Marshall; and SA State Recipient of Australian of the Year 2021, changemaker and visionary Tanya Hosch. We had a terrific response and diverse representation in each location, including secondary school students, Elected Members and staff of local Councils, police cadets, business leaders and community groups, with the Port Pirie forum booked to capacity. After individual keynotes, presenters from ABC Radio North and West SA hosted panel sessions with all three speakers. Many attendees took the opportunity to meet the speakers individually after the formalities.

We could not have held the Tour of Honour without support from our sponsors - Elders, Marshall & Brougham, MGA Insurance, Sundrop Farms, Des's Minibus and ABC North and West SA and venue partner University of South Australia. We also acknowledge the valuable support of the District Council of Port Pirie, Port Augusta City Council, and Whyalla City Council.

The Tour of Honour was a great way to showcase the value of the Australian of the Year Awards to these communities and to encourage more nominations from the regions in the future.

Aus Day in the Mall

20 January to 26 January 2022

On 20 and 21 January activations were hosted in Rundle Mall by beloved Adelaide chef and food writer, Rosa Matto and MasterChef star and business owner, Callum Hann.

From 22 to 26 January, Gawler Place Canopy in Rundle Mall, came alive with colour and movement as we reflected, respected, and celebrated – we're all part of the story through a free daily program of live music, storytelling, and performances. Hosted by Rosie Panetta from Mix 102.3.

On 22 January we presented an Official Ceremony to launch the program commencing with a powerful Smoking Ceremony and Welcome to Country by Uncle Moogy Sumner and followed by a soulful performance by First Nations artist Rob Edwards.

Alongside the food and cultural performance program in Rundle Mall we also ran a participatory art activation. This was delivered by community artist James Parker and invited us to explore the title 'Australia From My Window – We're All Part of the Story'.

The Aus Day in Rundle Mall 7-day activation reached 15,000 people and featured over 34 intercultural community organisations, an incredible achievement during challenging COVID/Omicron variant restrictions, as well as providing an engaging program that truly represents our diverse story of South Australia and our nation.

Aus Day in Rundle Mall was presented in partnership with the City of Adelaide and Vili's Family Bakery. The event was assisted by the Australian Government through the National Australia Day Council and supported by the Government of South Australia.

Australia Day -Smoking Ceremony

26 January 2021

The morning of Australia Day again commenced with a traditional Smoking Ceremony, entitled 'Mourning in the Morning'. The 2022 'Mourning in the Morning' Smoking Ceremony was curated by Gina Rings, First Nations Producer in conjunction with consultation via the Open Circle Discussion Group.

Kaurna Elder Uncle Frank
Wanganeen presented the
Welcome to Country, Kaurna Elder
Rosemary Kudnarto Wanganeen
addressed the topic of truth telling
and healing, Zibeon Fielding SA State
Recipient Young Australian of the
Year 2020 was an engaging MC and
the ceremony featured musician
Rob Edwards, and Uncle Moogy
Sumner and dancers.

Artist Derik Lynch, in collaboration with Uncle Frank, created a magnificent sand painting during the preceding nights at Aus Lights on the River and it was unveiled during the Smoking Ceremony. The design represented the Kaurna shield and surrounding Aboriginal nations. The Smoking Ceremony was attended by 1,500 attendees with VIP attendance by Her Excellency the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia, the Honourable Steven Marshall MP, Premier of South Australia, the Honourable Peter Malinauskas MP, Leader of the Opposition, Senator the Honourable Simon Birmingham, Senator for SA and the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor of Adelaide, Ms Sandy Verschoor.

The Mourning in the Morning Smoking Ceremony was presented in partnership with the City of Adelaide, SA Power Networks and SARAH Constructions. It was assisted by the Australian Government through the National Australia Day Council and supported by the Government of South Australia.

Aus Lights on the River

22 - 26 January 2021

More than 48,000 people experienced Elder Park/Tarntanya Wama as never before at Aus Lights on the River, held over four balmy nights from Saturday 22 January to Wednesday 26 January 2022. This immersion of sound, light and vision was created to explore our connection to nature and belonging to Country and wrapped around the thematic Reflect. Respect. Celebrate –We're All Part of the Story. This concept was a first for Australia Day in Adelaide.

The Aus Lights on the River program enabled us to reflect on this great land and its peoples, starting with the oldest living cultures, our First Nations, to our most recent arrivals, the refugees fleeing Afghanistan who now call Australia home.

On the evening of Australia Day, ADCSA hosted a spectacular official ceremony for our key leaders, Members, Sponsors, Council Mayors, intercultural communities and Australia Day Ambassadors. This VIP event titled Aus Lights on the River Official Ceremony – We're All Part of the Story included VIP attendance by Her Excellency the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia, The Honourable Steven Marshall MP. Premier of South Australia, The Honourable Peter Malinauskas MP, Leader of the Opposition and the Deputy Lord Mayor of Adelaide, Cr Arman Abrahimzadeh OAM.

Aus Lights on the River was presented in partnership with the City of Adelaide and was assisted by the Australian Government through the National Australia Day Council and supported by the Government of South Australia.

Aus Day across the State

There were many ways that local communities across South Australia acknowledged Australia Day 2022. 68 SA Councils delivered either a COVID safe face to face or virtual Citizenship Ceremony and/or presentation of their local Citizen of the Year Awards. 15 intercultural community organisations across SA delivered COVID safe community events and activities.

Australia Day Awards

30 March 2022

An individual who has tirelessly fundraised for his community to assist bushfire and drought recovery, a woman's determination following the death of her son to campaign to change the law on voluntary assisted dying in SA, and a woman's strong drive to reunite people with their beloved family members.

The Australia Day Awards acknowledge South Australians who enable their communities to be stronger as a result of their tireless efforts. These individuals offer outstanding service each day and so often this is invisible to us. They don't do it for the praise or recognition - they do it simply because it makes a difference to the people of our community.

This year's Australia Day Awards was held 30 March 2022 on the grounds of Government House (it was rescheduled from 19 January 2022 due to SA's peak COVID/ omicron variant wave). This rescheduled twilight event was held post the State Elections end of March and at Government House to an audience of 360 attendees. The Awards attract outstanding community member nominations from across South Australia. This year was a stunning presentation of recognition and celebration that illuminated these extraordinary individual's achievements.

Her Excellency the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia, hosted the Australia Day Awards and presented the South Australian Citizen of the Year, Young Citizen of the Year, Community Event of the Year and Award for Active Citizenship. The Inspiring South Australian Women Award recipients were proclaimed and presented by The Hon Susan Close MP, Deputy Premier. The Award for Leadership in Languages and Cultures recipients were proclaimed and presented by The Hon Blair Boyer MP, Minister for Education, Training and Skills.

The Australia Day State Citizen of the Year Awards are proudly presented by Local Government Association of South Australia, IWS, MGA Insurance, On the Run and SARAH Constructions and administrated by local Councils across South Australia.

Tour of Honour – Limestone Coast

18 - 20 May 2022

The communities of Naracoorte and Mount Gambier embraced the profound opportunity to hear from five inspirational Australians during our Tour of Honour from 18 to 20 May - Bernie Shakeshaft, Australia's Local Hero 2020, Professor Helen Marshall AM, SA Australian of the Year 2022, Mark Le Messurier, SA Senior Australian of the Year 2022, Dr Trudy Lin, SA Young Australian of the Year 2022 and Monique Bareham, SA Local Hero of the Year 2022.

We had wide reaching and diverse representation in each Local Government area, including primary and secondary school students, Members of Parliament, Elected Members and staff of Local Councils, Citizen of the Year recipients, business leaders and community groups. The Tour of Honour was a unique opportunity for our Australian of the Year Award recipients to connect with young people and explore important topics of mental health and wellbeing, self-worth and identity, advocacy, and social justice and how we can all be agents of change.


