


Zenko Combo - Tutorial & Songbook

Introduction

Dear client, thank you for choosing our **Zenko combo!** The Zenko, created by **Metal Sounds**, producers of the finest percussion instruments, hand making high quality stainless steel drums in France, since 2014.


The Zenko is an 8 or 9 note Steel tongue drum, coming in 10 different models, with many scales and note layouts to choose from. For more information on our Zenko range please visit: https://metalsounds-shop.com



Range

The Zenko Combo comes tuned to Bb3, C#4, Eb4, F4, F#4, G#4, Bb4 and C#5. These notes correspond to the black keys on the piano (Bb Minor pentatonic scale) with an extra F.






Note Layout 1-4


The Zenko Combo's notes are arranged in a cross and an X formation in terms of pitch range. The lowest note (1) is at the very bottom, in the center, and the following three (2-4) are the end points of the cross shape.





Note Layout 5-8

The 5, 6, 7 and 8 notes are located and the ends of the 'X' shape, these differ from the lower notes (1-4) not only by their position but also by their smaller size.




Playing Zenkos Scale

To play the Zenko's scale from low to high notes, start with the note at the very bottom (1). Follow the blue arrows at each of the ends of the cross (2, 3 and 4), then continue following the red arrows at the end of each of the "X" bars (5, 6, 7 and 8). If you want to play the scale from high to low, play the notes in reverse order.

You can play this scale by alternating between right and left hand, starting with the left to avoid crossing them.

Notation

The staff is complemented by a tablature showing which hand to use (right or left) as well as the pitch of every note, represented by a number. In many cases and especially if reading music is not your strong point, it is easier to find the right note via the tablature. For ease of readability, the Zenko Combo's scale is further notated in a F# major staff.

Playing Position

Playing Position

To play the Zenko in a sitting position, place it flat on your lap, with the 2nd note closest to you, making sure it's far enough away that you don't have to bend your arms to reach the nearer notes.



Alternatively you can play the Zenko by placing it on a stool. chair or table top using the foam support provided with your drum.

If you wish to play the Zenko in a standing position, we advise you to use the special Metal Sounds stand which the Zenko can be screwed to.

Technique

The easiest way to play the Zenko is to use mallets. Use the rubber head mallets included with the drum or your own of similar hardness. Playing with your hands is more demanding but gives a richer sound. You can also play with your thumb or index finger. The thumb gives a rounder sound and



is more suitable for the lower notes. The index finger produces a more accurate tone and is suitable for all notes. The best method is to hit the tongue directly letting your finger bounce away from the note immediately to avoid dampening or muffling its resonance.

When playing with your hands, you can dampen the sounds by applying light pressure with your fingertips on the note after hitting it with your hand.



Dampen Sound with Fingertips

In addition to playing with your hands, you can play two adjacent notes simultaneously with one hand by using your thumb and index finger and start a different chord.


This slow and poetic melody is perfectly suited for getting to know the layout of the Zenko Combo's notes. Enjoy yourself!
