


Mom and the girls look out. Fog! Thick, gray fog! So Jan hums. Kate chews gum.




"Bad news!" says Gus.

"No Gumball Pond?" asks Kate.







"Wow! No fog now!" says Jan.
"Good!" says Kate. "No fog now."




"Yes," says Gus. "We are out of the fog. Now on to Gumball Pond!"








"Oh," says Jan. "On Gumball Pond at last! How nice!" Mom nods. Kate nods twice.

## **Interactive Reading Idea**

After reading Out to Gumball Pond, have your young reader draw a picture of Gumball Pond, including the brown van, the gumball boats, and any other objects that might be found there. Encourage your young reader to think about familiar spelling patterns to help him or her label objects in the picture. Provide help if necessary, but do so in a coaching style. For example, ask your child to listen for sounds in the word and to identify what letter(s) makes that sound.
