

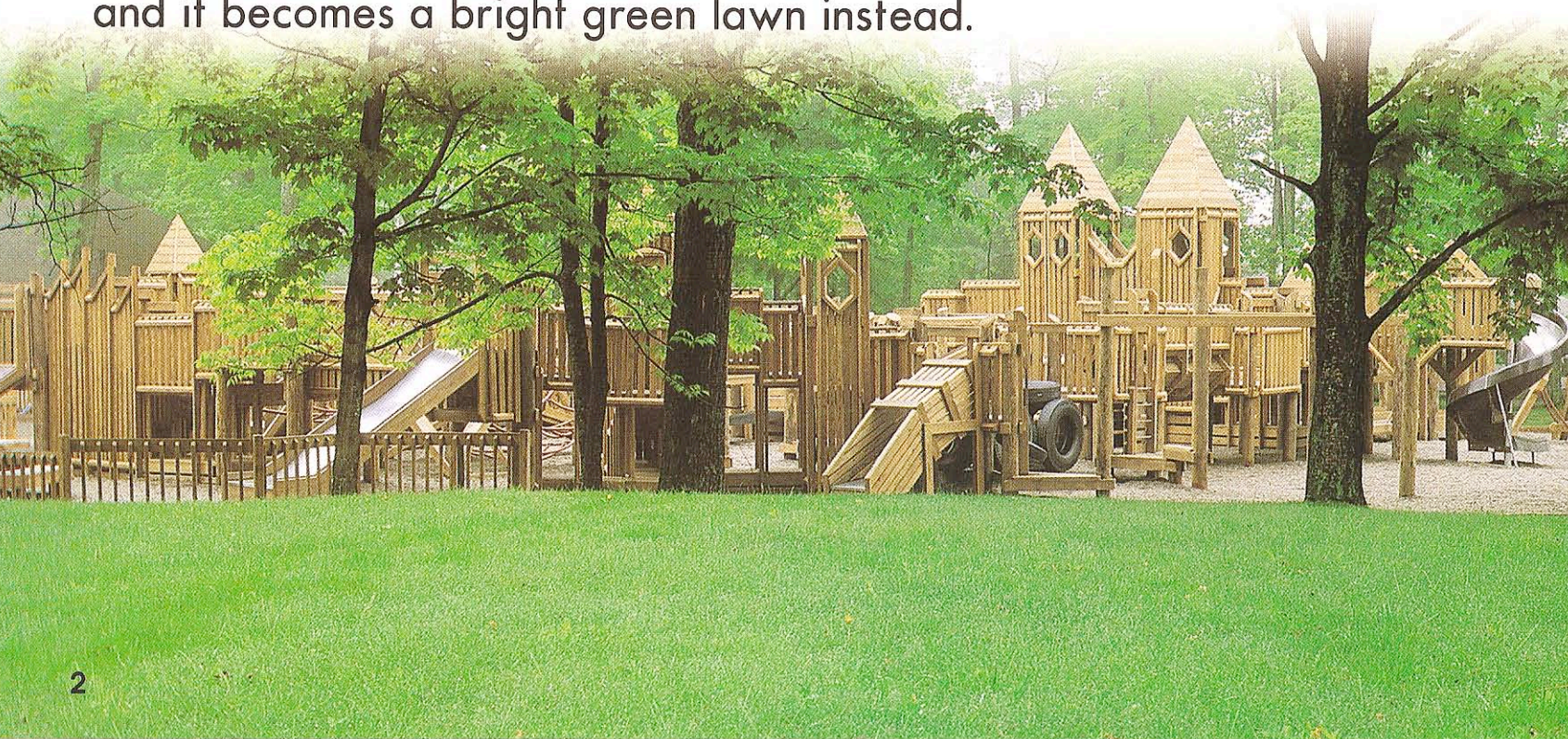

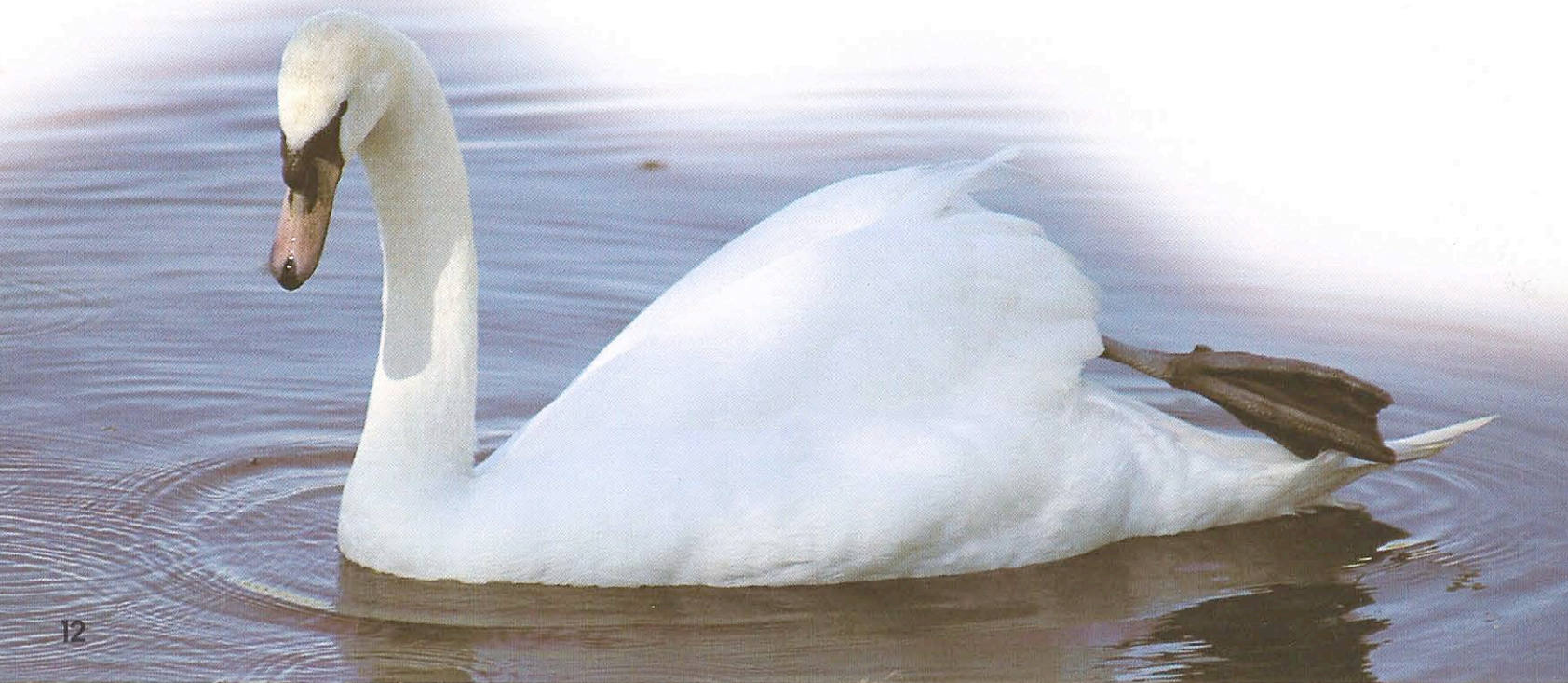
LOOK ONCE

LOOK AGAIN

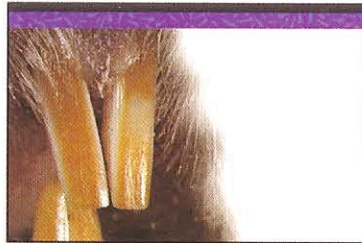
With her front feet,

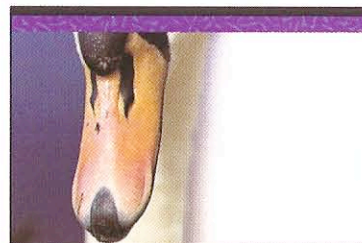

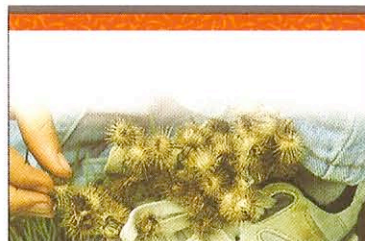
