


# LOOK ONCE

## LOOK AGAIN

. . . mouse.


With their sturdy teeth,

have barn cats!




## LOOK ONCE

Can you “sniff” out the answer?




## LOOK AGAIN

A duckling uses its little bill to hatch out of its egg. The bill has a sharp "egg tooth." With its egg tooth, a duckling jabs at the eggshell until it cracks open. Soon the egg tooth will fall off, because the duckling no longer needs it.








