FIREFIGHTER REQUIREMENTS:

- Have at least a high school diploma or GED.
- Courage, strength, and self-discipline.
- Must pass a written exam and a physical test, which includes walking up seven flights of stairs, dragging a 160-pound dummy while wearing 20 pounds of fire equipment.
- Classes in writing, public speaking, and advanced knowledge of firefighting techniques can lead to promotions.
- Since this is a very dangerous job, it requires organization and teamwork.
- Training as a paramedic in a two-year college will increase chances of being hired.
- The average firefighter earns \$34,600 a year; however, most do work more than 40 hours a week, so they are paid overtime.

MUSICIAN

REQUIREMENTS:

- Begin by studying an instrument or taking voice lessons at an early age.
- Many years of instruction with a professional musician or at a college or university program.
- Must have musical talent, creativity, and ability to perform in front of large groups.
 - Constant studying and hours of practicing.
- Because of the competitive world of music, most will never achieve fame and may end up working low-paying jobs to make ends meet.
- The salary of musicians is different, depending on what their specialty is. If he or she is working with an orchestra they may get from \$20,000 to \$90,000.
 If the person is recording for a movie production, he may earn \$250 for three hours of work.

PROFESSIONAL ATHLETE REQUIREMENTS:

- Since very few athletes make it professionally, it's always good to have another job in mind just in case.
- This kind of work is very demanding, both physically and mentally. They may have other duties like going to meetings or watching films about the other teams.
- Most teams have curfews and other restrictions about what they can and can't do in their personal lives.
- A large part of a professional athlete's life is spent practicing his or her sport. Many play in high school and college, as well as for fun.
- Schools usually require students to maintain good grades to play on their sports team, so anyone wanting this career should keep up with their studies.
- Athletes in the minor leagues get paid very little. Only thesuperstars earn millions of dollars a year.
