IT'S HOME

Let's talk about women's football. You've probably noticed it more in the past year than ever before, seen the headlines recounting the Lionesses' European glory on home soil or even flicked over TV channels and stumbled across a game being broadcast. There's been record breaking attendances at all levels and uncanny murals of players popping up wherever you look. No matter what your interests are, women's football will have floated across your periphery and cemented its being in the back of your mind. There's just no escaping that feel-good feeling of when something succeeds and in this case, that success story belongs to the women's game.

As the FIFA Women's World Cup waits patiently around the corner in Australia and New Zealand, now is as good a time as ever to begin immersing yourself in the culture of the game. A culture that has been slowly brewing for some time,



kept alive by die-hard fans who pride themselves on inclusivity and a pure love for the sport. A culture that, once you come across it, you'll just simply never want to leave. And, whether it's international or domestic football, this culture doesn't waiver, if anything, it just gets more tribal. On matchdays you'll find yourself in a sea of team colours, shirts and bootleg merchandise littered all around you. It's an environment you'll get addicted to. I know I have.

Take last summer when England hosted the UEFA Women's Euros: a month of football fuelled ecstasy, fleeting encounters and hours spent on public transport. From pregame marches to bucket hats bought, new cities explored and a heatwave endured. It was a month like no other. Full of supporters' groups sharing stories of Euros past and making stories of Euros present. My part in it all? To document the inclusive fan culture that goes hand in hand with the women's game. To drink enough alcohol and consume enough pie that I probably helped UEFA make a profit and, ultimately, to have the opportunity to watch some of the best football I've ever seen.

From Rotherham to Brighton, Manchester to Southampton; England basked in the beauty of the game and created the perfect environment for a summer tournament. A tournament that started off with a new competition attendance record when 68,871 fans filtered through Old Trafford's turnstiles for the opening game between England and Austria. Start as you mean to go on, right?



On the pitch we had creativity in midfield, battles in defence and flair up front and, off the pitch we had an array of different European football cultures mixing together to create a vibrant community of fans celebrating the women's game and backing their country no matter what. If you were in England last July, you may recall snippets of the Dutch in head-to-toe orange or the Swedish with their yellow shirts and blue IKEA bucket hats. They brought over traditions old and new, pregameing together for hours in the fan zones and then going on to

chant for the full ninety minutes. Their antics became one of the key stories of the tournament with people flocking to games to take part in the celebrations, marching in unison towards the stadiums choreographed by a mixture of drums and megaphones. There were open top buses blaring out dance tunes that seemed to hypnotise all those that walked behind,

setting the atmosphere for the games ahead. Positivity doused the occasion and as ticket sales kept rolling in, there seemed to be some sort of attendance record being broken at every game. Matches were end to end, stadiums were buzzing and people were obsessed. For many, the Women's Euros was a true 'welcome to women's football' moment and it was just magic.





And then you look at European domestic women's football this season and the story is very much the same, a thriving community of fans following the game as if their lives depend on it. After all, the Euros wasn't just a one-off tournament that put women's football on the map for a month, it was a tournament that brought in new fans, created idols and gave the game the platform it deserved.

The result of it? Well, there's been countless attendance records broken, a fan online presence like never before and an ever-growing interest in the game at every level. And so, inevitably, the tribalism that comes with football has never been more present as fans have become

louder and are now fully relishing in club rivalries. Pubs are now regularly filled before and after games with supporters coming together to hype each other up and draft new chants. Yes, there may be the odd family friendly marketing campaign by clubs selling matches as being fun day outs instead of sporting events but, the majority of people going to games aren't lining the barriers with 'can i have your shirt signs?' or asking for photos.



No, the majority of fans will be there giving their undivided attention to the ninety minutes of football played, calling out refs and disagreeing with tactics. Because women's football isn't something that comes around whenever a major tournament is on. No, women's football is part of peoples' existence, their DNA. It's something to look forward to and dread week-in-week-out.

And so, the World Cup might be played on the other side of the globe this summer but don't let that stop you from indulging in it all and getting behind your country. Ask your local to put on a game, join up with others for watch parties and start your Panini sticker collection. Embrace women's football because trust me, you won't be disappointed.

Dreaming of sunny beers, we thought we'd take a look at Radlers and their history. So next time you're enjoying beer gardens with friends you can astound and amaze them with your knowledge of the history of the Radler, and its inventor Franz Xaver Kugler.

13,000 CYCLISTS

ARRIVE AT KUGLERALM

KUGLER MIXES PILSNER WITH LEMON SODA

While history can't really confirm nor deny whether the story is true, we like it so we're telling you anyway.

Kugler was an innkeeper in Deisenhofen, Germany. His pub, Kugleralm, was bang on a cycling trail from nearby Munich. Some reports say Kugler himself built the trail – this sounds like a stretch, but we digress.

One beautiful day in June 1922, a fair few cyclists decided to ride the trail. Quite a few did. In fact, some 13,000 cyclists decided it'd be a good day for a bike ride.

By the time this peloton of cyclists got to Kugleralm they were knackered. Knackered and, importantly, thirsty.

Kugler was having the best day's trading of his life when he suddenly realised he was in danger of running out of Pilsner. Not wanting to miss out on business, or piss off 13,000 thirsty German cyclists, Kugler took a genius decision. He mixed what beer he had left with overstock of lemon soda water. It must have been some overstock, but who are we to question Herr Kugler's stocktaking abilities.

Claiming to his patrons that not only was this new drink very refreshing but it would also not get you quite as drunk as quickly as beer, they lapped it up.

The lycra-clad (presumably, not sure when lycra was invented) customers absolutely loved it, and Franz coined his new drink Radlermass, which translates to cyclist-liter in English.

Over the years, this became shortened to Radler and it became incredibly popular in the beer gardens of Munich and beyond.

Now, just over 100 years after Franz Xaver Kugler fluked his way into inventing it, Radler is one of the summer's most popular drinks.

We're having a go at one ourselves. In July, the next in our OFS Sessions series of beers will be a Grapefruit Radler. No need to cycle to Bavaria for a swig; it'll be available from us directly, from our Refectories in Leeds and Manchester, and our usual stockists.

With the day fast approaching, and a long-standing partnership with Don't Mess With Yorkshire, we thought we'd run through some of the quirkiest, weirdest and most Yorkshiriest traditions this vast county has to offer. Add these to your calendar.

THE GREAT KNARESBOROUGH BED RACE

One close to our heart, as we entered a Northern Monk team this year. The Great Knaresborough Bed Race is something completely different: it is part fancy dress pageant and part grueling time trial over a 2.4 mile course through the scenic streets of Knaresborough. Though many cities have tried to emulate the bed race, there is none quite as special as Knaresborough's, which mixes elaborate designs and pageantry with searing competitiveness.

THE WORLD COAL CARRYING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Every year, the World Coal Carrying Championship takes place in the small town of Gawthorpe, near Huddersfield. The race started more than 40 years ago when two local coal merchants settled an argument over who was fitter by running a mile with a sack of coal slung over their shoulders. So obviously this has become an annual tradition.

SCARECROW FESTIVAL

There are several scarecrow festivals dotted up and down the country, but the celebrations hosted in Kettlewell are perhaps the best known. Every August, residents of the small town create their own scarecrows which are positioned all around the village for visitors to admire. Pure nightmare fuel some of them.

The Burning of Old Bartle is held in the village of West Witton in Wensleydale in late August. Following a country gala and fell running races held during the day nightfall sees locals carrying an effigy of "Old Bartle" or "Owd Bartle" through the village, pausing for doorstep drinks at houses along the way. At the edge of the village the effigy is burned, but the revelries continue into the night. Nobody has a clue about the origins of the tradition, or who Old Bartle actually was. But the place gets all Wicker Man every year regardless.

SKIPTON SHEEP DAY

Skipton's heritage as "Sheep Town" is celebrated annually with sheep displays and racing and many other sheep related activities which fill the High Street towards the end of June. We're not sure what more you need to know; they RACE SHEEP THROUGH THE TOWN.

- THE LARGEST PIG IN YORKSHIRE WAS BRED AT RILLINGTON NEAR MALTON IN 1876 AND WEIGHED 51 STONES 11 POUNDS. THAT'S NOT A TYPO. FIFTY-ONE STONE - THAT'S 329KG.
- YORKSHIRE HAD 3,600 INNS, MORE THAN ANY OTHER COUNTY.
- THE LONGEST BAR WITH BEER PUMPS WAS 198 FEET LONG AT BUTLIN'S IN FILEY. IT HAD 20 BEER PUMPS.
- THE FIRST STRAW HAT WEARER WAS ISOBEL DENTON FROM LEEDS, IN THE REIGN OF CHARLES I.
- YORKSHIRE'S GREATEST EVER WALKER WAS POSSIBLY FOSTER POWELL OF HORSFORTH, WHO WALKED YORK-LONDON AND BACK IN FIVE-AND-A-HALF DAYS IN 1773.

IN THIS EDITION OF THE SCRIBE, WE CHAT TO OUR LATEST PATRONS PROJECT COLLABORATOR **BOBBI ABBEY**, AN ARTIST AND ILLUSTRATOR IN LEEDS, TO FIND OUT A BIT ABOUT THEM, THEIR ART, AND WHETHER THEY CAN CAT SIT FOR ME IN SEPTEMBER. EVERYONE I'D USUALLY ASK IS BUSY, SO THIS IS THE LAST RESORT.

HELLO, WHO ARE YOU?

I'm Bobbi and I'm an artist living in Leeds.

HOW DID YOU GET STARTED AS AN ARTIST?

My friends were putting on a gig and asked me to do the artwork for it. I remember seeing the posters up around town and I was stoked from then on.

HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE YOUR ILLUSTRATION STYLE?

My work depicts a trippy collision of characters, popular culture references and anything I'm into. I use a mix of brush and ink, acrylic and spray paint.





WHO WERE, OR ARE, THE BIGGEST INFLUENCES ON YOUR ART?

It started with cartoons as a kid, then realising that these characters were created by actual humans who I then began researching. It was the same with skateboard graphics and album covers. Buying decks or albums with graphics I liked then finding out who made them. Jim Phillips, Robert Williams, Frank Frazetta, Robert Crumb, Jamie Hewlett, Ed Roth are a few examples of those I loved.

WE'VE HEARD YOUR WIFE IS ALSO AN ARTIST – DO YOU EVER WORK TOGETHER?

My wife Emma creates a lot of pattern work, very different to mine. Emma works with clean lines and bold shapes whereas my style is a bit more sketchy. We help each other out on big projects and collaborated on a big in wall in Mabgate, Leeds, last year along with Jameson Rogan. It was fun to bring our three different styles together and create something crazy.

YOUR FIRST BEER WITH US FEATURES A CHARACTER CALLED DEADBEAT. WHAT'S HIS STORY?

Any character I draw I always give them some sort of backstory. For the first release, I thought it would be cool to flesh it out with a little history of the character. Like toys you would collect as a kid when they come with a few words about the figure on the box. For this can I created Deadbeat, a travelling musician who wanders a post-apocalyptic wasteland encountering strange characters on his journey to play gigs and the misadventures he gets caught up in. Who knows maybe he will have his own comic one day...

THIS IS OUR SUMMER EDITION: WHAT'S BETTER – TIME SPENT IN A BEER GARDEN, IN A PARK, OR AT A BBQ?

It would have to be BBQ for me. My old man puts on a mean BBQ and goes all out. And naturally that comes with lots of beer. Cheers CJ!



WHAT DOES 'NORTHERNNESS' MEAN TO YOU?

I grew up in Hull and have now lived in Leeds for the past 12 years so the North has always been home to me. When I think of the North I instantly think of the pubs, the people and the welcoming creative scene.

It changes a lot but at the moment it would be going back in time and doing artwork for a dream band like The Cramps. Or an Elvis/The Cramps double bill poster would be even better.
