

# Living History OF PUBS

The Pub is as old as the hills, a part of the very geology of this island, standing since ancient times. Or at least that's how it often feels. But in truth, pubs are about as transient a public place as any that exist. Morphing and blending over the centuries, meaning many different things to many different people. It's this chameleonic ability to adapt that has allowed the pub, or something close to it, to have lasted so long as an institution and stay at the core of many people's lives.

So how have we gotten to where we are? The term 'Public House' is perhaps a little more telling than it might at first appear.

Some of the earliest places that we'd recognise as a pub were in family homes that chose to open their doors to supply beer to their neighbours as a means of making an income. Often situated on the outskirts of towns in later decades ("Quick one in The Traveller's Rest anyone?") or eventually near rail stations ("What about The Head of Steam?"), they would welcome people into the settlement or send them on their way. Pubs were often transitory spaces, liminal safe-houses that served a function; supplying shelter, recovery and literal supplies for journeys onwards.



We're skipping ahead somewhat but once we get to the rise of the Industrial Revolution, the relationships people have with the places they spend their time change pretty drastically. The centralised workplace rises to prominence in people's lives. Suddenly there is a Second Place in the world.

A place that occupies much of your time and energy, and in a way that is not all that likely to make up a part of your social life. It's hard to chit-chat while dodging Spinning Jennys and machine looms; it's understandably more important to keep your limbs and life than to be a sparkling conversationalist.



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Look, nobody is more likely to over-intellectualize and thus ruin something good than the middleclass white man but if we can all grin and bear it a little bit for a moment; pubs, and places like them aid a very real sociological need. They are Ray Oldenburg's Third Place, somewhere outside of the home and the workplace where a person can be, and become, themselves; engage with society, build community and produce culture. This blurring of the boundary between private and public is at the core of what makes many pubs an enticing place to be, even to this day. It is a public space, but one which can be inhabited in a variety of ways by a multitude of peoples. There is room for the private conversations, the open discussions and the silent people watching.

We often pick a pub as Our Local based on its atmosphere. A somewhat vague concept but it's a feeling that we all recognise immediately when we find it. And atmosphere is often bound up in all of the stuff, the very matter of the pub.



The objects you see on the walls, the furniture you sit at, the glassware you use. All of them are talismans. holding the decades and centuries within them. Tables. chairs, glassware, the bar itself of course, all exist to serve functions outside of building atmosphere. they are to be used. These are museum handling collections by another name. It is their use that brings them, and history to life. As well as all the many objects and relics of the past that may fill the rooms of a pub, the walls that construct those rooms are a key part of that history. Pubs often make a point of their age, and bank on it in fact. It's hard to imagine any town or city doesn't have an ongoing debate about the one true Oldest Pub in Town.

One respect in which pubs undoubtedly succeed is in their ability to enliven these historic spaces through casual use, a visitor is situated in their own experience but also in direct communication with the past and in so



accidental learning experience. Not simply learning about the facts of the place, but an internal learning experience, a becoming, a selfactualisation, while surrounded and aided by history. More convincing and immersive than any costumed re-enactment, a person can engage in the activities of the past, since those activities have changed relatively little, with very little effort or consideration. This can become a transcendent learning experience where a person not only learns about culture by being surrounded by its physical evidence, but learns by becoming an active part of it. And more importantly, a person's very presence in that space is a valuable contribution to the environment, and therefore the experience of others. All sounds quite high-minded, compared nipping in for a swift half but it's these internal experiences that really give the pub its value.

Pubs often encourage conversation above all else, in many pubs it may even be the only thing to do. Sat around a table, often a round one at that, ideas can flow easily and comfortably. of the old guy who you see sat at the bar every weekend? Probably not. But these conversations have the opportunity to be much more discursive than you may have chance to come across in other parts of your life. Connections can be made; between the present and the past, between the individual and the community, between experience and reflection, knowledge and understanding. Learning can be an active social process. Ideas can flow, opinions shared openly, emotions felt, connections made and community entered into.

There are few places like this in a lot of people's lives, that enable such experiences. And the ones that do exist deserve our care, respect and protection. Thankfully that is often as simple as stopping in for a pint every now and again, and sometimes it looks more like 1000-ish words about a small part of what makes them such great places to be in.

In October, we teamed up with Leeds Street Gallery to host Fresh Fest – a street art and graffiti festival at our Monk HQ in Leeds, with around a dozen artists working on pieces live in the brewery, DJs spinning tunes, and, of course, plenty of beer. After Fresh Fest, we grabbed Jack, cofounder of Leeds Street Gallery, to ask him about the scene itself.



"We started life back in March 2019 We set out with an ambition to set up places around Leeds that artists can legally paint on, tag, and use. We wanted it to be informal. We worked with local businesses and the City Council to set up legal art sites around the city, where people can go and paint sites in public without any booking ahead. And that's what we've been doing ever since.



"We also hold workshops for groups such as schools, ex-offenders, private clients, where people can come and express themselves and give art a go, even if they've never done it before.

"We also assist with the curation of largescale public murals and community regeneration projects, like the Josh Warrington mural, Kevin Sinfield's at Headingley, and regeneration projects in Beeston, Holbeck, and Crossgates."







"Leeds is definitely growing and, compared to when we started, street art and graffiti is a lot more prominent around the city, which is great to see. But I'd say we've still a way to go compared to Manchester, in my opinion! Elsewhere in the North, Hull has a really great legal wall scene too. Newcastle and Sheffield also have a lot





of history, and it's fantastic to see the scenes in these cities still popping off."

"If anyone was interested in getting involved in the scene, they should check out the Leeds Street Gallery social media channels. There's a list of legal walls on there. Just get out and have fun!"

### A Light From The North

We're always banging on about the North. It's our home and we're proud to be from it. 41.6% of our name is NORTH. But, when planning our series of tenth anniversary releases, we looked even further North. We looked towards skies lit up by the Northern Lights. We looked for the Most Northernly Brewery in the World. We found Mack, in Tromsø, Norway.

A collab beer seemed inevitable. What could be more Northern, than Northern Monk and the Most Northernly Brewery in the World? Sean Bean drinking a pint of cask with Sarah Lancashire somewhere in the Dales, maybe. We settled for our collab. What we found was more than a collab. A new friend to Monk, a Leeds United fan from the cold Norwegian North, Christian Riksheim – the most welcome Norwegian in Leeds since Alfie Haaland.

### HELLO CHRISTIAN. FOR THOSE WHO DON'T KNOW. WHO ARE YOU?

Where do I start? Male, closing in on fifty, father to two, and married to Marit, a pretty blonde girl from the neighboring city, nine hours drive from Tromsø. I worked in sales for most of my life but turned brewery founder in 2014 with a friend. I now work at Mack. I have a deep and intense love of music. Standing in a crowded room, or in a festival, beer in hand, with Marit by my side is just great.

### **TELL US ABOUT MACK BREWERY?**

The Mack Brewery was founded by Ludwig Mack in 1877. Ludwig was the son of a German baker who arrived from Braunschweig, Germany to start a bakery in Tromsø. So the knowledge of yeast was already running through the family veins. One of the first beers produced was a Bayer, and we still make it to this day.



Today the brewery has moved out of the town center and is situated just beneath the Lyngen Alps and has one of the best water sources in the world. Over the last 20 years, breweries in Norway have been bought by foreign owners, but we are proud to say we are the largest Norwegian-owned brewery.

The microbrewery is still in the oldest part of the old factory. Here I produce close to 80,000 litres a year, mostly ales. Most of these beers go to local bars, and customers across the rest of Norway. And this is where the fun begins. Pales, IPAs, sours, pastries, farmhouse beers and a few lagers get rolled out from my doors weekly.

### AS LUCK WOULD HAVE IT, YOU'RE A LEEDS UNITED FAN. HOW DID THAT COME ABOUT?

Ooooh, Leeds. Bring on the pain right! Life, football, and beer isn't easy. Sixteen years of pain, how did we manage to get through it? Beer! Joke aside, my first Leeds love was Gordon Strachan. All the other guys playing football here were wearing red jerseys, but that was

not the team for me. I was the only one supporting Leeds while getting abrasions from the gravel on the pitches up here, trying to slide tackle like Vinnie Jones. But I stuck with it, hurting when we got relegated, and fighting our way back up to where we belong (for a bit).

### MUSIC IS A BIG PART OF YOUR BREWERY, WHY IS THAT?

Have you seen Fight Club with Brad Pitt and Edward Norton? Do you remember the first rule of Fight Club? Never talk about Fight Club! In Norway it is illegal. to show beer commercials, or anything regarding alcohol. We can't advertise. talk about, or show beer. What can we talk about? Music! We started a profile where we use music as the fifth ingredient in beer! All organisms, including yeast, deserves good music. We installed a vinyl player and started buying records. We have produced music, well, beer, for festivals ever since. Not even to mention me, getting to play music, all day. Keeps me quite happy I can tell you.



### WHAT HAVE YOU GOT AT YOUR BREWERY?

The microbrewery is a special place, and a playground for me and the I brewmaster Rune. I get to express myself through the beers. I decided to build a stage with a drumset, bass and guitars in the corner, so we could start having concerts here when there is no production. The microbrewery is a part of the visitors' centre and a large part of the tour where we present the history of the Mack family and the brewery. In the fermentation room, all the tanks are painted with rockstars like Elvis. Patti Smith, Ringo, Johnny Cash, Iggy Pop and a few Norwegians. Somewhere between four and five thousand people walk across my dancefloor each year.

### HOW WAS YOUR TRIP OVER TO NORTHERN MONK FOR THE BREW?

I did not know what to expect, so I did do an honest day's work. I arrived at start. I was greeted by a happy Italian brewer. Vito, and was shown everything. including the deepest darkest secrets of the brewery. And conversations brewer to brewer never get boring. We like to learn from meeting minds attuned to the same thing, and spending the first day as one of the Monks was inspiring. Actually, I was a Monk. Or I felt I was. What I did not expect at all, was the second day where I got to go to the Old Flax Store with Fraser and brew our beer! This was even closer to my heart, and the spirit of Northern Monk.

### **ARE THERE ANY SIMILARITIES** BETWEEN THE NORTH OF ENGLAND AND NORTHERN NORWAY?

Never say die! We are incredibly proud of being Northerners. The spirit of the North is something we often talk about. At Mack we talk about Norwegian We are proud to represent a part of the country that is something different to the people I met while in Leeds. Some of the pictures of the North of the UK could just as well be behind my house. However, we do have more snow. And we have reindeer roaming around our houses almost all year.

### YOU BROUGHT SOME HOPS WITH YOU FROM THE BREWERY — WHAT WERE THEY?

I brought North Norwegian hops, grown at the Mack family cabin. These hops were planted there by Ludvig Mack Bredrup in 1980. However, this is a plant he moved with him so it will most certainly be 30 years older than that. After doing a rub 'n' sniff with the quality department we determined that that were quite citrusy. Because of our long summer nights where the sun never sets, there is not a lot of bitterness to them. But the plant has most definitely seen its share of the Aurora Borealis.





### WHAT'S A TYPICAL SESSION IN A **NORWEGIAN PUB LIKE?**

Coloured by having a pub beneath the microbrewery hosting 72 different Norwegian beers on tap, it is best described as diverse. But most Norwegians mostly drink lagers and lots of it. The pubs function as afterwork safe havens. They drain out around seven and are full again at 11 until closing time. Norwegians drink late in the evenings and, maybe, too

### WHAT'S A TRADITIONAL NORWEGIAN TOAST?

We mostly just say "skål", where all in the group in turn clink their glass together with the person that said skål. If I asked my children they would say two pieces of white bread, joined with ham and cheese, heated until the cheese melts, and devoured as quickly as possible.

TAKK SKAL DU HA. CHRISTIAN!



During the youth crew era, which K started in the mid-80s, the influence of music on the straight edge scene seemed to be at an all-time high. The branches of straight edge that came about during this era originated from ideas presented in songs, and many vouth crew bands had a strong heavy metal influence. The band Youth of ' Today became associated with the straight edge movement, and their song 'Youth Crew' expressed a desire to unite the scene into a movement. Vegetarianism became an important theme in straight edge during this era, starting with Youth of Today's 1988 [] ' song 'No More', which contained lyrics condemning the consumption of meat.

By the early 1990s, straight edge became a well-known part of the wider punk and DIY scene and underwent 1. musical and political shifts. In the early part of the decade, a number of straight edge punks and their bands picked up on the vegetarian and other social justice politics of the mid-1980s and began advocating for social justice. animal liberation, and veganism

During this period, the straight edge scene birthed two major offshoots: the more conservative hardline and the religiously influenced Krishna Consciousness. While the majority of straight edge punks and Hare Krishna converts were pacifists. those influenced by hardline showed a willingness to resort to violence to promote their subculture. Musically, the straight edge scene increasingly was drawing from heavy metal and was a founding influence on metalcore.

In the UK, the scene really began to take hold with the foundation of Steadfast, who were the UK's first selfdescribed straight edge band. Formed in 1988, the group's foundation was to satirise the anarchopunk scene and their commonly held beliefs, such as anarchism and vegetarianism, with their straight edge status being a part of that. Soon a whole host of bands • formed in their wake.

Most of the first wave of UK straight edge bands had broken up by 1991 but a second wave began in the following years, mostly based around Subjugation and Sure Hand Records. This wave saw members of many of the first wave bands form new bands and begin to embrace influences from

The main location for this scene was I the 1 in 12 Club, an anarchist club 🌠 in Bradford, as groups like Unborn. 🕽 Slavearc, Vengeance of Gaia and Withdrawn performed there frequently.

A UK straight edge scene featuring entirely new musicians developed in the 2010s as a part of the New Wave of \_\_\_ While many straight edgers believe that British Hardcore. Mostly based around Leeds, the scene produced groups like Violent Reaction, Big Cheese, Insist, Unjust, Rapture, Regiment, True Vision and Shrapnel.

However, the movement has still never taken off to the magnitude that it did in

Straight edge culture has seen a shift with the rise of social media and other digital communication. Now more than ever there are straight edgers existing in isolation. They are not connected to any local scene but communicate with other straight edgers primarily via social media and forums.

a local music-centered community is essential to the culture, the Internet has allowed straight edge principles to spread further than ever before.

#### HELLO, WHO ARE YOU?

Eyup, I'm Josh Baines and I'm the guitarist in Malevolence.


