Personal Study Answers

- 1. The central character of the Bible is God.
- 2. Seeing each biblical event from God's perspective is important so that we will understand His character and actions, and see ourselves as He sees us.
- 3. To study the Bible chronologically means to study the flow of biblical history from the beginning of the world, considering key events in the order in which they occurred.
- 4. Our approach to studying the Bible is like building a house in that, just as a contractor starts with a firm foundation before he adds the upper structure, we will be establishing a solid biblical base on which we can later build more understanding.
- 5. The two main sections of the Bible are the Old and New Testaments.
- 6. There are 66 books in the Bible.
- 7. The men God chose to write different parts of the Bible were called God's prophets.
- 8. These verses tell us that God guided the thoughts of the prophets so that they wrote exactly what He wanted them to write.
- 9. The Bible is a unified whole from beginning to end because God is its sole Author.
- 10. All of the men, except one, who recorded the contents of the Bible were Jewish.
- 11. God gave His message for the whole world.
- 12. The original biblical texts were written in Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek.
- 13. God's Word will never change because God is its author, and He doesn't change.
- 14. It is important to study the Bible because it is God's personal message to us.
