

Capital letters

What is a capital letter and when do I use one?

Rules:



All sentences begin with a capital letter, even sentences that only consist of one word.



The proper name, the name of a specific person or thing, begins with a capital letter.



Titles of books, songs, stories, works of art, magazine articles, tests, and other written materials must begin with a capital letter. Every other important word of the title must also begin with a capital letter. Words that do not need a capital letter <u>unless</u> they are the first word of the title are *a*, *an*, *and*, *of*, *to*, *the*, etc.



The letter I, when used as a pronoun referring to yourself, must always be written as a capital letter. Titles of people when used with their names or in place of their names must begin with a capital letter. For example, My favorite queen is Queen Elizabeth of England.



The first word of a direct quotation must begin with a capital letter. For example, "Who's been sleeping in my bed?" Daddy Bear cried.

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
