# WHY WE NEED TO ACT



Unskilled women get pregnant earlier and have more children than their educated peers, continuing the poverty cycle. Orphans also mostly come from unskilled women. Unskilled women are more prone to contract HIV/AIDS and other diseases. Unskilled women are vulnurable to manipulation, such as prostitution, trafficking, and slave labor.



Unskilled women and children face more health issues than skilled women. Educated and skilled women tend to make sure their children are educated and they take care of all their family members. This creates a sustainable community.



The private sector still plays a very small role in poverty alleviation, womens health and family planning; only very few businesses assist voluntarily and have sustainability as part of their D.N.A.



In poor families, young women face a gender bias so are less likely to access as the male is prioritised higher education. With most poor families spending any available funds on their boys education.



More than 12 million women are illiterate and unskilled in Indonesia. Salaries of unskilled Women are usually 50% less than the official area minimum salary.



Indonesian women in particular are affected by the need to continue with their household and cultural duties versus the increasing need to contribute economically.

# **OUR PROGRAM AND STUDENT**



#### 1. WOMENS'S SKILLS EDUCATION

Bali WISE gives a 6 month Hospitality, Tour & Travel based Skills Education Course to Marginalized Women from all over Indonesia. Besides this 6 month Skills education course, Bali WISE provides an expense allowance of between \$70 – \$90 per month, so students can send money home, while they focus on their studies; dormitory style accommodation; 3 meals per day; uniforms; study books; transportation; school room library and more.

#### 2. WHERE DO THEY COME FROM

#1- Referrals from past and present Bali WISE Students.

#2 - Regional Education Departments (Registered poor families)

#3 - Orphanages

#4 - Children's and other Foundations (Bali Children Foundation, East Bali Poverty Project)

#5 - Church groups (Bali WISE is not a religious Foundation or affiliate, and teaches no doctrine).

### 3. HOW DOES BALI WISE RECRUIT POOR AND MARGINALIZED WOMEN?

#1- Bali WISE has a full time Recruitment Officer

#2 - All poor families are registered with Social Department and have certificate.

#3 - Bali WISE Recruitment Officer gives presentation all over Bali, Lombok,
Flores and East Java.

#4 - Marginalized Women are welcomed to apply from all parts of Indonesia and all religions.

#5 - All students must pass an entrance exam, on a first come first accepted basis.

(Must have at least a limited English proficiency).

#### **HER STORY - PRIMA**



In Ni Luh Primayani's family both parents work really hard, her father as a farmer and her mother as a construction worker. Due to her family's financial situation, Prima had to bury her dream of attending college after high school. Luckily, she heard about Bali WISE from her friend and joined the program in April 2015. During her studies at Bali WISE, Prima gained a lot of hospitality skills that enabled her to become a hotelier and probably open her own business one day. After completing the 6 months training program at Bali WISE, Prima began to work as a waitress at a restaurant in Seminyak earning Rp 1.930.000/month as starting salary with the opportunity to become restaurant supervisor within 5 months and an increased

income up to Rp 3.500.000/month.

#### **HER STORY - LURI**



18-year old Ni KomangLuri was born in SerayaTimur, Karangasem regency. She is a smart, brave and active girl. Her father works as a farmer, planting banana and mahogany trees. Her mother works as a pandanus mat weaver. With a joint monthly income of IDR 900.000, her parents struggle to raise 4 children, which requires the coverage of different costs, also for traditional ceremonies. After Luri graduated from High School, her parents asked her to work as a housemaid in Denpasar. However, Luri is very intent to continue her education because she loves learning. A turning point in her life was the day when her father threw books at her because she was learning very seriously for a test instead of helping her parents. Luckily, at the age of 16, Luri received a scholarship that allowed her to attend High School in Amlapura for 3 years. However, that scholarship only covered the school fees, Luri was forced to work as a housemaid to cover the costs for transportation to school and her living needs. After her graduation, she heard about the Bali WISE Program and the great opportunities this scholarship provides. On the one hand, she knew that her parents needed her help. On the other hand, she was also aware that, in order to gain access to a well-paid and rewarding job, she needed to gain more skills and qualifications. Luri dreamed of becoming a professional SPA Therapist. In October 2015 she joined the Bali WISE program. After finishing her 6 months course, she

has worked at The Grand Hyatt Hotel as a Spa Therapist until now. Luri is very grateful of what she has received during her studies at Bali WISE and the incredible skills she has gained. Luri is contributing her time and energy to help other women by teaching Yoga to our Basic Work and Life Skills students at Bali WISE which is part of the three month training program.

### **OUR RESULTS**



An average of 85% of our students obtain a fare waged full-time job within three months of graduating from the Bali WISE program. The first stepping stone towards their future career.



In 2016, 110 Women from a marginalized background have completed their vocational course, graduated and gained worthwhile employment.



From 2007 to the end of 2017, Bali WISE has educated and skilled 1227 disadvantaged women.


#### **JOIN FORCES WITH A TRUSTED NAME**
